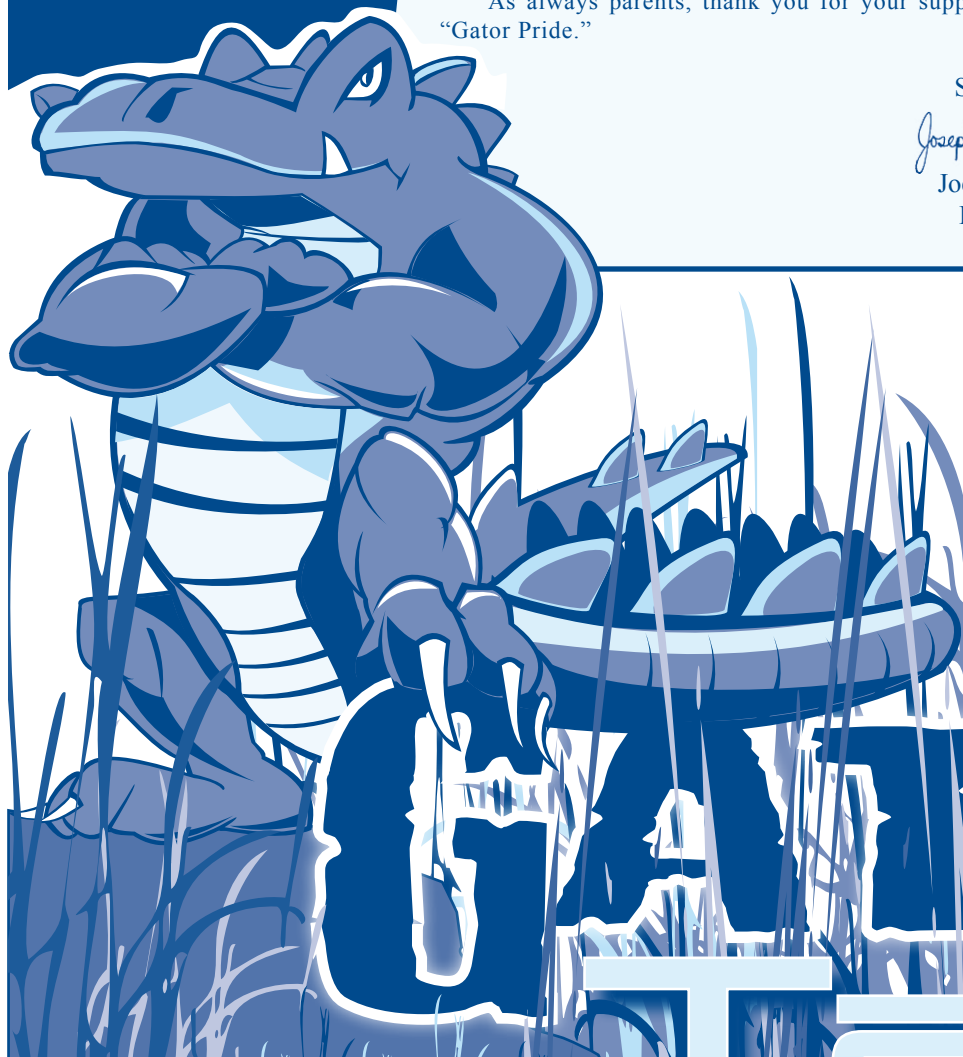

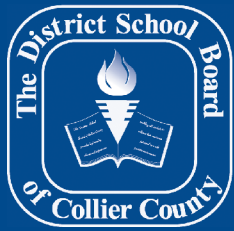

It is hard to believe but we are already halfway through the school year! It seems like just the other day students were getting their schedules and learning how to navigate their way from class to class. Now as students begin the second half of the year there is a familiarity with the campus and faculty, but there are still new classes and experiences.

Please take some time to discuss with students how the new semester is a fresh start from the first part of the year. Teachers will be taking the time to reinforce classroom rules and expectations with students. In addition, parents and students should take time to review what can be done at home to help insure success at school. Do they bring home assignments? Is there a regular pattern of sitting down to do school work or reading at home? Each of these questions leads to an indicator of student achievement. If they are not being followed as of this time, the new semester is the perfect time to begin. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions.

FROM YOUR DEAN OF STUDENTS, GERONIMO MULHOLLAND...

We have begun the second-half push towards the end of the school year, and our Gators are doing a great job! There are a few things I want to bring to everyone's attention as we round up the first semester of the 2011-12 school year.

Dress Code

Only the top two buttons may be unbuttoned on the polo-style shirts. The length of the shirt is determined by putting your hands at your sides at rest (fingers are not straightened out). If it falls beyond the hands, then the shirt will need to be tucked in. Additionally, if an undershirt is worn underneath the polo-style shirt, it needs to be white or one of our base colors (blue, green, yellow, or white), and it cannot extend beyond the shirt. Additionally, shorts need to be knee-length. Some of our young ladies are rolling them up.

Bus Behavior

Students are doing a great job on the busses. However, it is important to remember that riding our busses is a privilege and not a right. Good student behavior is paramount to the safety of everyone on the bus. With that in mind, the follow consequences can occur when a student receives a bus referral:

1. First Referral: Warning
2. Second Referral: 3-day bus suspension
3. Third Referral: 10-day bus suspension
4. Fourth Referral: Loss of bus privileges for the remainder of semester or year

Attendance

Students cannot succeed if they are not in the classroom. It is just that simple. Currently, 85% of our students have five or fewer absences! Just as important though, is being to school on time and staying all day. Parents, please try to plan appointments towards the late afternoon if at all possible. If your child is going to be absent, please notify the office. The following are considered excused absences:

- An illness, accident, or death in immediate family
- An observance of an established religious holiday
- A court subpoena, or personal family business
- An emergency deemed reasonable by the principal
- School-related activity

A student who is habitually late to school and/or chronically dismissed early shall be subject to disciplinary action by the school administration including but not limited to in-school suspension, a required parent conference, and/or referral to Truancy Court.

Meningococcal Meningitis

What is meningococcal meningitis?

It is a serious bacterial infection that strikes between 1000 to 2600 Americans each year. Although rare, this disease can cause meningitis (swelling of the brain or spinal cord) or meningococemia (blood infection).

Who is at risk for getting meningococcal meningitis?

Preteens and teens are at greater risk of getting this disease and are more likely to die compared with other age groups. Death rates from this disease are up to 5 times higher in teenagers and young adults (ages 15-24 years) compared with other age groups.

How do you get meningococcal meningitis?

This disease is spread from person to person through close contact. Everyday activities like sharing a drinking glass, eating utensils, kissing, or living in close quarters can put even healthy preteens and teens at greater risk for the disease.

What are the symptoms of meningococcal meningitis?

Meningococcal meningitis can be hard to recognize, especially in its early stages, because symptoms are similar to those of more common viral illnesses. Unlike more common illnesses, the disease can progress quickly and may cause death within 24 hrs. Symptoms may include high fever, severe headache, stiff neck, confusion, vomiting, exhaustion, and/or a rash.

How can you help prevent your child from developing meningococcal meningitis?

Vaccination is safe and effective and the best way to help protect preteens and teens from the disease. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommend meningococcal vaccine for:

- Preteens and teens 11 through 18 years of age
- College freshmen living in dormitories
- Children 2 through 10 years of age who are at increased risk or if elected by their health-care providers and parents

The vaccine can be obtained through your health care provider or at the Collier County Health Department.

Conjunctivitis

Conjunctivitis (pink eye) accounts for more than 3 million school days lost in U.S. Public Schools.

What is it?

Conjunctivitis is the medical term used to describe swelling and irritation of the conjunctiva – which is the thin membrane that covers the inside of the eyelids and the white part of the eye. Conjunctivitis can be viral, bacterial, or allergic. “Pink eye” is the most common form of conjunctivitis.

How do you get pink eye?

It can be very contagious. Children are susceptible because they are often in close contact with each other. Some of the most common ways to get the contagious form of pink eye are:

- Re-use of towels or handkerchiefs when wiping your face or eyes
- Not washing your hands
- Touching your eyes frequently
- Using old cosmetics and/or sharing them with others
- Improper cleaning of your contact lens

How do you prevent it?

Practice good hygiene. If a child has been diagnosed with infectious conjunctivitis, make sure you do the following to prevent the spread:

- Encourage children to wash their hands often
- Advise them to avoid touching their eyes
- Use separate towels, washcloths, handkerchiefs, and tissues to wipe their eyes or face. Change daily.
- Change their pillowcase frequently

Treatment:

If symptoms persist please follow up with your physician as soon as possible. Antibiotic ointment or eye drops may be prescribed. Students may return to school 24 hours after beginning treatment for infectious conjunctivitis. We want your student back in school and ready to learn.

HEALTH SCREENING

Florida requires students in grades kindergarten, 1st, 3rd, and 6th to be screened for vision, hearing, growth and development, and scoliosis. These health screenings which take place in your child's school are done by staff from the Collier County Health Department. This year an estimated 35,000 students were evaluated and by far, vision impairments were the most common finding. According to the American Optometric Association, 80% percent of all learning during a child's first 12 years is obtained through vision. Of the school age children who struggle to read and comprehend, 70% percent of them have some form of visual impairment which interferes with their reading skills. This shows us that uncorrected vision hinders learning.

State of the art vision equipment is used to screen the children and identify those who may benefit from a complete eye examination. A referral letter is sent home to inform parents of the screening results and if further evaluation is recommended. The Collier County Health Department strongly recommends children be seen by an eye doctor. Only an eye doctor can perform a comprehensive eye exam and prescribe glasses if needed. In these difficult economic times, we offer resources to those who are uninsured and underinsured. The following services are available:

- **Vision Service Plan** (VSP vouchers) – provides free eye care services through gift certificates
- **Florida Heiken Children Vision Program and Florida Vision Quest**- mobile units that travel to schools, and provide free comprehensive vision services including glasses
- **Medicaid or Healthy Kids**- a list of local providers that accept these insurance plans are provided for parents to call and make an appointment.

The school system and the health department strive to assist our students to overcome barriers that hinder learning. If you received a referral letter, please follow-up with the school health contact listed on the letter regarding any information about your child's visit, as we would like to ensure that this year's health screening was effective. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to call your school health contact, whose information is located on your child's referral form.

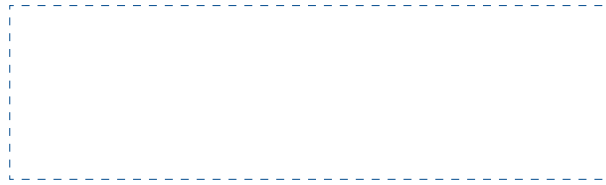

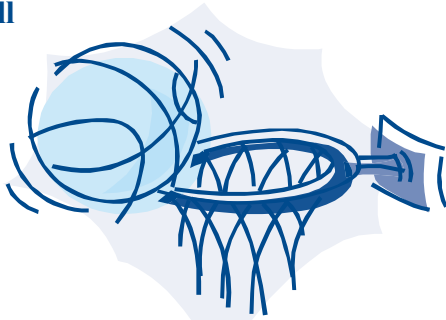
