FROM THE DESK OF THE DARREN BURKETT, ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL OF CURRICULUM...

As the fun of summertime quickly approaches it is important that both parents and students keep something in mind. Sooner than you think it will be time to get ready to return to school. Summer break is an important opportunity for students to recharge their batteries and have new experiences. While school provides structure and routine, both of which help young adults, summertime allows students the opportunity to make some choices on their own. These decision-making opportunities are important because choices are the essence of being an adult.

One such choice that I hope students, supported by their parents, will make this summer is to stay academically active. As I said before, it is important to step away from school for a bit, but it is also important to keep your brain active. Students can do this in any number of ways. It's hard to believe that the 2010-11 school-year is already over! Students need summer to relax and recharge for the next school year. However, there are things they can do this summer to not only pass the time and get ready for next year, but help to stay busy and out of potential trouble.

Here are three simple things from Denise Witmer of About.com that you should urge your teen to do this summer:

Read to learn something new and for fun. Reading serves more than one purpose. While it is good if you can get your teen to read for fun - because reading is its own enjoyable benefit - it's great if you can get your teen to learn something new through reading. Not only will your teen learn about the topic that he/she has chosen, but he/she will learn how to teach himself/herself something new. This skill will really help your teen when he/she can't understand what their teacher said in class but still has to take the test. Many teens will give up and do poorly, whereas a teen with this skill has the ability to teach it to himself/herself.

Solve problems. Your teen needs to logically think through problems, such as puzzles, on a regular basis. The critical thinking skills that your teen uses to think through a problem should not be put on the back burner for three months. If you keep this area of your teen's brain in tip top shape over the summer, he/she will not only be able to handle math class better, but should also be able to make better decisions in all areas of his/her life.

Get some exercise. Teenagers who sit around the house and do nothing but watch TV or play video games are at risk for childhood obesity for one, growing up to be a social misfit for another. Sign your teen up for a summer sports league or get him/her a pool membership and provide a ride back and forth. Teens, not unlike adults, need exercise everyday.

FREE THE CHILDREN AND EAST NAPLES MIDDLE SCHOOL

Students at East Naples Middle School have been fund raising for the last couple of years, in collaboration with the group Free The Children, to build a school in Kenya. This year they reached their goal, raising a total of \$10,795.28. The total needed to build the school in the Osenetoi area of Kenya was \$8500.

The project was started a couple of years ago, with a school-wide "Day of Silence". Students collected pledges to remain silent for 24 hours. Nearly \$6000 was raised through that endeavor. Since then, Student Council students have raised money through talent shows, garage sales, and some public donations were received as well.

The goal was reached in part through a contest won by the Student Council Sponsor, Carol Williams. She entered O, The Oprah Magazine's "The Beauty of Giving Back" marketing contest, co-sponsored by CoverGirl, and wrote a short essay on what charitable project she would support if she were given \$2500. She wrote about the Free the Children group, and the school's fund raising efforts, and was chosen as one of 4 winners nationwide. Her photo appears in the CoverGirl advertorial in the May issue of the magazine. The money helped East Naples to not only reach its goal of building the school, but also provided school supplies.

Free The Children will keep East Naples Middle School students updated on the progress of the school-building initiative in Osenetoi, as well as information on the community as a whole.

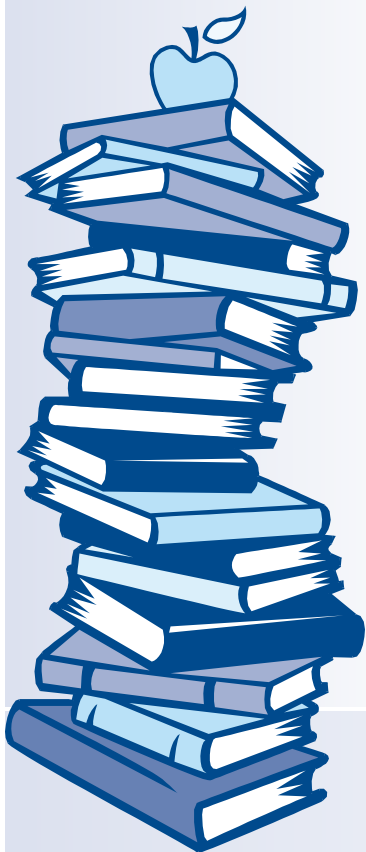

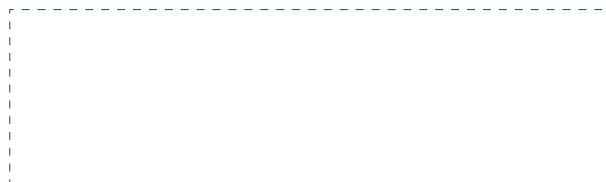

ENMS STANDARDIZED DRESS POLICY 2011-12 (while on campus)

SHIRTS – Boys and Girls

Shirts must be a blue, green, yellow, or white collared, pullover polo-type shirt. Shirts must be solid-colored, including the collar and may be long or short sleeve. To aide in modesty, only the collar button and one button below can remain unbuttoned. Polo shirts must fall below the waistband but not past the finger tips. Any logos must be smaller than a half-dollar, with the exception of ENMS spirit shirts which are only to be worn on designated days.

Undershirts/undergarments must be white, blue, green, or yellow. No other colors are permitted. For the girls this includes camisoles, spaghetti strap undershirts, tank tops, etc. Long sleeved undershirts must be tapered to the wrist and not oversized. **All undershirts must be tucked in for both boys and girls.**

Students who repeatedly break this rule will be required to tuck in their UNIFORM SHIRT for the remainder of the quarter.

BOTTOMS

For girls: Navy blue or khaki pants, Capri pants or walking shorts. Walking shorts should fall just above the knee. Bottoms must be modest and not overly form-fitting. No skirts are allowed. **No blue denims.**

For boys: Navy blue or khaki pants or walking shorts. Oversized shorts/pants are not permitted. They may not be more than one size larger than what would be appropriate for the student. Shorts/pants must be worn at the waist. **No denims.** [Clarification: No athletic-type shorts/pants for either boys or girls]

SHOES/SOCKS

Athletic-type rubber soled shoes must have a closed toe, closed heel, and be laced or strapped. (No slip-ons) Socks must be neutral in color, be ankle length and visible. No ballerina style shoes are permitted.

OUTER WEAR

Base colors of blue, green, yellow, white, black, or grey sweatshirts or sweaters are permitted as long as the polo shirt collar is visible. Hooded sweatshirts must have a full zipper. No Hoodies.

VENDORS

Although parents/guardians are free to purchase these clothing items anywhere they wish, Uniforms Unlimited has agreed to provide the shirts, pants, and shorts for our families. The clothing items at Uniforms Unlimited are guaranteed to meet the parameters of the ENMS Standardized Dress Policy.

ENMS is not promoting or requiring any brand. The only requirement is that shirts, pants and shorts are the appropriate colors and styles without graphics or lettering.

CCPS DRESS AND GROOMING POLICY

Any areas not referenced above will adhere to the dictates of the CCPS Dress and Grooming Policy (CCPS Code of Conduct) listed below but not limited to:

- The wearing or display of flags on our campuses has historically and currently caused dissension along with a potentially unsafe and hostile learning environment for our students. In an effort to provide safe schools and prevent potential disruption, the following flags are the only ones that may be displayed and/or worn on Collier County Public Schools campuses and at off campus school-related activities: (1) The United States and POW/MIA flags; (2) the State of Florida flag; and (3) official school flags. In addition, any related symbols may not be displayed or worn on campus and at off campus school-related activities. Exceptions to this rule may be made for national flags on special occasions or in designated areas consistent with the learning objectives of the district and at the discretion of the principal.
- Any perfumes, lotions, colognes, etc should not be used in classrooms. Excessive use of anything fragrant (that smells) is offensive and irritating and will be considered a disruption to the learning environment.
- Hair shall be clean and neatly groomed and **may not be dyed or styled in a manner that causes disruption** to the learning environment. Hair color and style shall not interfere with the educational process in the reasonable discretion of the principal or designee.
- If makeup is worn, it may not cause distractions in any way. **No heavy/dark makeup is to be worn.**
- **Adornment, which is attached or pierced to exposed body parts, other than ears, is not permitted.**
- The wearing of jewelry that through design projects violence, or sexual innuendo, is strictly forbidden.
- No pocket or wallet chains, hats, caps, bandanas, or other head coverings, or symbols that represent, by administration's opinion, gangs are permitted. No shirts or towels are to be draped around necks or shoulders or tucked into pockets.
