This past year the WHS TSA chapter has taken home **State medals** in:

- Essay Writing first place
- Software Development second place
- TEAMS 9th and 10th grade second place
- TEAMS 11th and 12th grade third place
- WHS TSA placed eighth in State with over 200 school participating

At the National Leadership Conference our chapter competed with thousands of students from all across the nation, including foreign countries such as Germany and Turkey. The 9th and 10th grade TEAMS earned:

- A second place trophy in Problem Solving
- A second place trophy for TEAMS overall

Aside from the various competitions and conferences attended by the TSA, there is also a partnership between TSA and the Verizon Foundation that yields a great academic task known as the Verizon Innovative Learning App Challenge. This challenge allows both club members and other willing participants to create an app of their own with the advisement of an adult mentor. 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
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WHS NAHS/ART CLUB
