grade students will also test an additional two days (April 29 and 30).



### How is ILEARN used to assess students?

ILEARN is a summative assessment that measures student achievement and growth according to Indiana Academic Standards. ILEARN assessments are comprised of computer adaptive test segments and performance task segments. ILEARN must be administered to each student annually, according to ESSA. The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) mandates that states assess students in the following subjects and grade levels:

- English/Language Arts (ELA) (Grades 3-8)
- Mathematics (Grades 3-8)
- Science (Grades 4 and 6)
- High School Biology

### CHROMEBOOK ANNOUNCEMENTS



### Virtual Students

Join your counselor or social worker for a Zoom Workshop. Between now and at the end of the school year, you will have the opportunity to meet with your counselor or social worker and classmates via zoom to wrap up the year and plan for next year. Look for the Zoom invitation to come your way soon. Everyone is expected to participate in this opportunity to connect, ask questions, and discuss your concerns.

Teaching Resilience

Resilience is, arguably, an essential life skill. It allows us to learn from past mistakes, adjust our strategies, and try again. The question is: can you teach resilience?

Individuals recuperating from certain medical conditions might be referred to a Physical Therapist to assist with their recovery. The Physical Therapist will determine where that individual is currently functioning and push them to the edge of their competence-

where they are challenged but also sure to succeed. Not only does this build confidence but it allows the individual to work toward an acceptable level of functioning. This technique is called "work hardening."

I couldn't help but wonder how that concept might apply to students. Maybe "work hardening" would involve exposing students to the right amount of challenge, increasing the difficulty level bit by bit, and helping them identify their strengths. For example, suppose a student has three homework questions: one easy, one more difficult, and one requiring higher order thinking skills. Begin with the question that allows the student to succeed while identifying the specific skills needed to answer correctly. After those skills are applied to the second, more difficult question, problem-solve with the student what skills will be needed to answer the final question. Take time to remind the student of the skills demonstrated throughout the first two questions. Finally, praise the student for applying their knowledge to the last question.

The key to "work hardening," is beginning at the edge of competence. No student wants to continue working when he or she doesn't believe they can be successful. Teaching resilience means engaging or re-engaging students who no longer feel confident in their abilities. Reminding students of the skills they have already demonstrated goes a long way to encouraging resilience.

### **SUMMER MEALS REGISTRATION**

Parents/Legal Guardians,

Carmel Youth Assistance (CYAP) is partnering with local organizations including St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, Orchard Park Presbyterian Church, Merciful H.E.L.P. Center, St. Christopher's Episcopal Church, and Carmel Rotary to provide Carmel Clay Schools families with the opportunity to be part of the Carmel Summer Meals Program. The goal of this program is to provide children who qualify for the federal free/reduced meal program in the Carmel community with food items to supplement breakfast and lunch items they would typically receive during the school day.

For the first half of the summer, Carmel Clay Schools will be preparing and distributing meals as a continuation of the program they ran during the school year.

Every Wednesday between **JUNE 2ND - JUNE 26TH PICK UP AT CARMEL HIGH SCHOOL** (located at 520 E Main St, Carmel). Details about pick-up time will be sent out in the coming months.

Every Wednesday between **JUNE 30TH - AUGUST 4TH PICK UP AT ST. ELIZABETH SETON CHURCH** (located at 10655 Haverstick Rd, Carmel) between 4:30-6:30pm. Meals/items will be packed and distributed through the Carmel Youth Assistance Program for the second half of the summer.

Please note, during the month of June, items will be portioned out for each child and be similar to a hot-meal your child would receive in school. During the month of July, there will be more fresh produce and less premade meals.

To be part of this free program, you must sign up your family no later than May 1, 2021. If you register for this program, you will be receiving food items for each child under the age of 18 in your household beginning June 2nd – August 4th.

### To Leave a Message:


- 1. Say and spell the student's last name.

### IS MY CHILD ELIGIBLE TO BE A 21ST CENTURY SCHOLAR?

You can enroll your child as a 21st Century Scholar from the time they enter 7th grade to June 30th of their 8th grade year. To apply for the 21st Century Scholars program, your student must:

- Be a resident of Indiana, both when applying and when receiving the scholarship (determined by the residency of the parent or legal guardian).
- Be one of the following:
  - ♦ U.S. citizen or U.S. national (includes natives of American Samoa or Swain's Island)
  - U.S. permanent resident who has an I-151, I-551 or I-551C (Alien Registration Receipt Card)
  - ♦ A non-citizen with one of the following designations (Un no ciudadano con cualquier de las designaciones que siguen):
    - » Refugee
    - » Asylum Granted
    - » Indefinite Parole and/or Humanitarian Parole
    - » Cuban-Haitian Entrant, Status Pending
- Be enrolled in the 7th or 8th grade at an Indiana public or private school accredited by the Indiana Department of Education.
  - Children in foster care may apply after the 8th grade.
  - Homeschooled students are not eligible for the 21st Century Scholars program.

Be a member of a family that meets the income eligibility guidelines. See chart below for current income guidelines. *Note: students must meet income eligibility guidelines at time of enrollment and each year of college. Learn more about the financial guidelines for college students in English or Spanish.* 

- A student in foster care does not need to meet this requirement.
- A student in 7th or 8th grade who is in legal guardianship does not need to meet this requirement.

### Submit an Application

Get started at **ScholarTrack.IN.gov**. You will need to provide your name and an email address to create a ScholarTrack account. Click on "My Account" to submit an application.

You will receive an email with an application summary and program enrollment information after the application is received. All applications to the 21st Century Scholars program must be submitted before June 30 of the eligible student's 8th-grade year.

Before you apply, make sure you have the following:

- Student Social Security number, date of birth and address
- Parent or guardian's Social Security number, or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number if applicable
- Previous year gross income amounts for all members of the household (Example: if you are applying after December 31, 2020, use 2020 amounts).
- A valid email address. Free email addresses are available from Yahoo!, Gmail and Live.
- Court documents, if submitting a legal guardianship application.

During the application process, you will:

- Answer pre-enrollment questions
- Enter student contact information (address, phone, email, school information and SSN)
- Agree to the 21st Century Scholar Pledge
- Enter income information for parent or guardian
- Review and submit application
