DRUG FREE CHARLOTTE COUNTY

Good kids can make bad decisions. That thought rolled around in my head as I listened to story after story of grown adults in recovery talking about the decisions they all made as kids that led to the addictions that destroyed their lives, that robbed them of everything and everyone that mattered to them. None of them were bad kids, and most of them grew up in happy homes with parents that loved them. This scared me a bit and made me think.... then what in the world can us parents do to keep kids from choosing alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs (ATOD)?

So, the good news is that research shows that teens say their parents are one of the top reasons they choose not to use ATOD. That's right, they may act like they know all about everything sometimes, but when you talk, they really are listening. So, while there isn't a book on the right way to raise our kids, but there are steps that we can take to help our kids make good choices when it comes to ATOD. Here are some tips.

Communicate with love and understanding:

- Pick a time that makes sense. You want to make sure that you can devote complete attention to the conversation without
 any distractions. You also want to think about your child's schedule/routine and avoid times when they may be rushed
 or busy getting ready for school/work or doing homework. Picking a time when you and your kiddo are in a good mood
 is also helpful.
- 2. Have a plan. Think about what you want to say ahead of time. This will help you to organize your thoughts and feel more relaxed. When you are relaxed, your kiddo will be more relaxed. However, remember it isn't just about what you want to say but listening as well.
- 3. Practice active listening. Look at your child while they are talking. Show them your listening by mirroring back to them what they are saying. Use comfortable body language and avoid crossed arms or making unapproving facial expressions. Occasionally smiling and nodding your head can let them know your still paying attention.
- 4. Be respectful in your responses. Avoid fault finding, sarcasm, comparing, and belittling. Give them time to express themselves. Use encouragement when they talk about choices that they have made that are positive. Consider telling them that your proud of them for sharing with you.

Listen and hear them when they share:

- 1. Rather then telling them what solution you would do, try guiding them into coming up with a solution by asking guiding questions.
- Don't shoot down their ideas. Ask them about what they think would be the pros and cons of each solution. Praise them when they come up with solutions on their own.
- Don't make assumptions, rather ask questions about the situation.
- Avoid putting people down. Your kids may share about friends. If you start talking poorly about their friends, they may be less likely to share in the future.
- 5. Make sure you are focusing more on solving the problem then the problem itself.



Make sure your kids know where you stand and set clear limits:

- 1. Let kids know that you don't approve of ATOD use.
- 2. Make sure they know your expectations for them.
- 3. Tell your kids why you have set the limits.
- 4. Come up with some specific consequences together if they break the rules about ATOD.
- 5. Make sure to compliment them when they do follow these limits.

Be there for your kids:

- . Spend time with your kids AND their friends. Try new activities. Work on goals together.
- 2. Make time for them every day.
- 3. Take an interest in their hobbies and things they are involved in.
- 4. Be present at things that are important to them.
- 5. When your kids are going to be going somewhere, call and talk with the parents first and make sure there will be parent supervision.
- Meet your kid's friend's parents. Make sure that where they are going is a safe place. Get contact information for the parents as well. Find out the parent's rules about ATOD.
- 7. Know where your child is, ALWAYS. Have your child check in with you when they leave somewhere and when they arrive as well. Call and check in with your child at different times.


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PARENT CONTACT INFORMATION

NJROTC

CHS NJROTC is wrapping up another successful year of service to the school and community. This is the 48th consecutive year of the NJROTC unit being an integral part of CHS. Despite not having access to many of the normally scheduled activities due to COVID, the Tarpon Cadets managed to rack up over 2500 hours of community service and school support, as well as hosting two NJROTC athletic events.

CHS is home to the nationally ranked #10 Air Rifle Team in the country! Our Air Rifle Team won several regional competitions and finished #2 in the state. Air Rifle is an NCAA and Olympic Sport, and Charlotte is home to one of the best! Our JV team will continue practicing for the remainder of the year.

We have a number of other teams that compete in a variety of different activities. The Academic Team placed in the top 10% in the nation in the Navy National Academic Postal Competition and the Academic Brain Brawl Team qualified for States as for their virtual, "Jeopardy" style tournament. The Orienteering Team was able to enjoy an inperson season this spring and finished #5 in the State. We have a dedicated and talented Cyber Patriot team that excelled in the national Cyber Patriot competitions right from our classroom. Cyber security is a growing security concern for the United States and is a growing field for the US military. Our Competition Color Guard Team finished in 2nd place in the SW Regional Color Guard Competition. We continued to have Drill Team and Athletic Team practice to be ready to go to compete against other Florida units next year. We are a competitive program!

We encourage all incoming and current Tarpons to consider NJROTC as an elective for two years of their high school tenure. You can earn all of your PE, Fine Arts, and Hope credits, through NJROTC as well as earning an advanced pay grade if you choose to enlist into the Military. You may also improve your chances of getting an ROTC college scholarship or entrance into one of the US Service Academies, due to our leadership opportunities.

CHS STUDENT ID CARDS


CHS PROJECT GRADUATION 2021

Reserve your spot by May 1st to guarantee your receipt of a Project Graduation shirt. Shirts will be given out as you enter the building.







Charlotte High School has a proud tradition of athletic excellence. The effort put forth by athletes and coaches of the past have laid the foundation for our future. Did you know that since 1990 Charlotte athletics have won 114 district titles and 33 regional titles, 7 team state runners-up and 6 team state champions? So, on occasion, when I reference Punta Gorda as "Title Town" you can see why.

The 2020-21 athletic year was in doubt for our entire state. With the uncertainty surrounding each program due to Covid-19, our coaches and student athletes maintained a strong balance between academics and athletics. In the classroom this year our varsity athletes maintained a 3.22 overall GPA, which is very impressive. Competition wise, the Tarpons had a banner year winning 6 district titles, 4 regional titles, 1 team state champion and 4 individual state champions. We are hoping to add more hardware to this year's haul with baseball, softball, track and field, and boys weightlifting still competing.
