our student athletes and their parents as we finish the 2017-18 school year.

In the event that your student finds themselves lacking credit as a result of poor performance on final exams, please be sure they visit the counseling office to get necessary information to retake he needed courses (ONLY 2 courses can be completed) in summer school. This is important for them to stay on track for graduation and the ability to participate in athletic competition. The following are the guidelines for eligibility of student athletes:

Students gain or lose eligibility on the first day of the subsequent semester. The first day of the Fall semester shall be interpreted as the first date of practice for the first sport.

(a) Exception: Students who successfully complete summer school to maintain eligibility become eligible the last day of summer school.

Summer school is an extension of the previous semester and courses may be:

- (a) Remedial in nature where a previously-taken course is repeated in its entirety with a new grade being given.
- **(b)** Enrichment in nature where a new course is taken that results in new credit being earned. A maximum of two (2) unit credits earned in summer school may be counted for eligibility purposes.

Summer school credits earned in non-accredited home study programs or non-accredited private schools may **not** be used to gain eligibility. Accreditation recognized under the rule shall be from the Georgia Accrediting Commission (GAC) or a regional accreditation agency (such as SACS) or the Georgia Private School Accreditation Council (GAPSAC).

Students must accumulate units towards graduation according to the following criteria:

- (a) First-year students (enter 9th grade) are eligible academically. Second semester first-year students must have passed courses carrying at least 2.5 units the previous semester in order to participate.
- **(b)** Second-year students must have accumulated five (5) total units in the first year, AND passes courses carrying at least 2.5 units in the previous semester.
- (c) Third-year students must have accumulated eleven (11) units in the first and second years, AND passed courses carrying at least 2.5 units in the previous

semester.

(d) Fourth-year students must have accumulated seventeen (17) units in the first three years, AND passed courses carrying at least 2.5 units in the previous semester.

(e) Students may accumulate the required units for participation during the school year and eligibility will be reinstated at the beginning of the next semester.

Student Parking

ELIGIBILITY: to be eligible to apply for a student parking permit

- Students must have earned enough credits to be academically considered seniors or juniors [17 credits to be a senior, 11 credits to be a junior]
- Students must have less than six (6) unexcused absences in the current semester

APPLYING: to apply for a student parking permit

- If you will have a drivers license and a vehicle by the start of the 18-19 school year;

- If you anticipate recieving your license/vehicle later on during the 18-19 school year;

- The Application will be available from Wed April 18 through Friday May 4, 2018
- Unfortunately, due to limited spots submitting the application does not guarantee a permit
- The list of approved students will be posted outside the AP office by Mon May 14

IF APPROVED, PAY FOR YOUR PERMIT ONLINE DURING THE SUMMER STARTING JUNE 1, 2018
IF APPROVED, PICK-UP YOUR PERMIT DURING THE SUMMER STARTING MON JUNE 18, 2018:

Students must bring the following

- Driver's License
- Valid Proof of Auto Insurance or Motor Vehicle Registration
- Completed Fulton County Vehicle Information Form - https://docs.google.com/ file/d/0B2oBm3o2J0Bib2JWZ05naU8xZjg/ edit?usp=sharing
- Payment for \$90 [online payment receipt, cash or check]*

**Note that payments made through the online payment portal will include an additional \$3.95 credit card processing fee.

Permits may be revoked due to failure to follow parking regulations, excessive tardies and/or absences, or violations of the Code of Conduct. Students must comply with Georgia law. Cars parked without a valid permit properly displayed may be booted or towed at the owner's expense without warning.

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Summer School

Summer School for Face-to-Face, Fulton Virtual, and Georgia Virtual REGISTRATION IS OPEN!

Summer School is an opportunity for high school students to accelerate or recover credits during the summer. Face-to-face facilitation and at home virtual offerings exist. The summer sessions are condensed versions of content provided during the school year, and students must have their course requests approved by their counselor before being enrolled. Summer school registration does not require an online contract. All face-to-face and virtual students who are taking an EOC course must participate in EOC testing which will take place at the Summer School site. The bus for Face-to-Face Summer School will depart from the covered bus loop at Chattahoochee at 7:38AM. Summer school at Northview High School begins at 8:30AM. Afternoon drop-off at CHS is approximately 12:50PM

Face-to-Face Facilitation

- Hosted at Northview High School, with transportation provided if needed (see yellow information above).
- A subject area teacher serves as the facilitator for the course and the content is completed
 online. Face-to-face facilitation provides a designated time, location, and the technology
 needed for students to complete courses.
- All EOC courses (9th Lit, 11th Lit, Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology, Physical Science, US History, and Economics) plus Personal Fitness are available for students who have previously failed that specific course(s).
- For students who want to accelerate, the only courses available to take for the first time in the face-to-face setting are Economics and Personal Fitness.
- Students are only allowed to take ONE content area during Face to Face Summer School.
- Students who have previously failed a course (recovery) may take up to two credits at
 no cost. Face to Face summer school must be in the same content area with a max of one
 credit during Face to Face facilitation or a student could to take one content area through
 Face to Face and do a different content area through Fulton Virtual School.
- Students who are taking a course for the first time (accelerating) will not be able to do so
 through Face to Face summer school, unless it is Economics or Personal Fitness. Those are
 the only options for first time courses.
- Course dates are June 11th July 13th. Personal Fitness will only meet June 11th June 29th.
- All EOC testing occurs July 12th 13th.
- School will be closed July 4th July 6th for Independence Day.
- Late Registration: June 4th 8th. Face-to-face students will be able to register in person at Northview HS during this window. Students will not be able to register for classes that are already full.

Fulton Virtual School

- Available to retake a course or get ahead (recovery or acceleration).
- All content is completed online at home.
- Students who have previously failed a course (recovery) are eligible to take up to two credits at no cost.

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- Students who are taking a course for the first time (accelerating) must pay tuition at the rate of \$225 per 0.5 credit (\$180 per 0.5 credit for students approved for free/reduced lunch).
- Course dates and times are June 4h July 13th. EOC testing occurs July 12th 13th at Northview High School. School will be closed July 4 for Independence Day.
- Deadline is June 1st with Late Registration from June 4th to 8th. After June 1, students will not be able to register for classes that are already full.
- There are strict completion benchmarks for online summer classes. If a student is not making adequate progress they will be dropped from the course with no refund.

 - » 50% complete by 6/22 at 11:59pm
 - » 67% complete by 6/29 at 11:59pm

GA Virtual School

- Available to retake a course or get ahead (recovery or acceleration).
- All content is completed online at home.
- <u>Both</u> students who have previously failed a course (recovery) <u>and</u> students who are taking a course for the first time (accelerating) <u>must pay tuition</u> at the rate of \$250 per 0.5 credit if choosing to go through GA Virtual.
- Course dates for the 6-week session are June 4th July 12th and for the 5-week session are June 11th – July 12th. EOC testing occurs July 12th – 13th at Northview High School.
- Students can register and pay for summer classes beginning on March 1st May 31st for the 6 week session. The last day to register and pay for the 5 week session is June 7.

** We advise students to only attempt 0.5 or 1.0 credit of summer courses. **

- 1 semester long course (0.5 credit) requires about 3 hours of work a day
- 1 year long course (1.0 credit) requires about 6 hours of work a day
- Expect 6 to 9 hours of work a day if your student enrolls in an accelerated math course

Other Important Information

Please also note that for high school students there are specific promotion requirements which are based on the number of credits a student has earned. You can check your student's transcript on Home Access on the "Grades" tab, then click on "Transcript". You will need to add up all the credits earned each semester to get the total number of credits earned. Promotion requirements for each grade level are below. If your student falls short on credits, then please know they will not be promoted to the next grade level and they will be assigned to the previous grade level homeroom.

- Students must have at least 5 credits by the end of July in order to be promoted to 10th grade.
- Students must have at least 11 credits by the end of July in order to be promoted to 11th grade.
- Students must have at least 17 credits by the end of July in order to be promoted to 12th grade.

** Promotions are not made in the middle of the school year unless the student is graduating that year (ex: May 2019).

Once a student registers for summer school, it will come to a counselor for approval. Counselors are approving classes daily.





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Summer Literacy Strategies for Teens

8 tips and tools to keep your high school student engaged in learning all summer long!

High school students have packed schedules in the summer. Between part-time jobs, sports, parties, family vacation, and time with friends, most teens take advantage of every sun soaked moment. As parents, it's tempting to just let your child run carefree during the summer months: childhood is brief, right? While of course this is true, and free time is vital to development, it's also important for parents to be aware of the summer slide. Research shows that students lose up to two months of curriculum content over the summer, and teachers often spend weeks re-teaching lessons from the previous grade level. By high school, your child's standardized test scores and GPA become important factors in their future, and literacy becomes particularly important to performing well on exams and keeping up with readings. So, the question becomes, how can parents help their teens avoid the summer literacy slide by retaining — and even building upon — the literacy skills they learned in school? It can be done without ruining your child's summer: just check out these tips and activities for blending literacy practice with engaging, exciting summer fun.

- Encourage your student to sign up for Goodreads For the teen who is "too mature" to sign up for your local library's summer reading programs, literary social media sites like Goodreads are a great platform to track your reading, share your thoughts about books and find new books to read in the future. Some high schools even use Goodreads for grading and communication purposes, so your teens might already be familiar with it. Encourage them to use the site for personal use and fun; they might discover some great books, and will definitely find a wonderful literary community!
- Suggest starting an Instagram account or blog to document their summer reading journey Literary-specific sites are not the only platforms to share reading experiences. Instagram is full of young readers, posting artsy pictures of their favorite books, making recommendations, and connecting with other readers across the world. Literary blogs function the same way: for a generation fluent in the art of digital communication, parents should take advantage of the opportunities 6.

available on social media, and encourage their teens to incorporate their reading experiences with their social experiences. It's an exciting new way for young readers to share their passion for literature, and inspire others!

- Prep for SAT/ACT
 - Very few teens want to spend their summer vacation preparing for college entrance exams, but at this stage in the game, this is often the kind of literacy building that needs to take place. To help your teen get motivated, make interactive and quick study activities that don't eat up too much of their day, but work efficiently. You can find online flashcards already made at Quizlet. https://quizlet.com/1022309/college-boardtop-100-common-satact-vocabulary-words-flash-cards/.
- Host a teen trivia night or book club Keeping your high schooler locked away in the house all day away from friends just isn't going to happen. So instead, take advantage of your child's social life. Hosting a teen trivia night at your house will get your more competitive kids — and their friends — motivated to study for college entrance. For talkative or introspective teens, try hosting a teen book club at your house. You could introduce books that were made into movies, and hold a movie night when the kids are finished with the book. For music lovers, suggest that the teen members come up with playlists or write songs to correspond with the novels they read. It will be a lot of work to manage so many excited learners at once, but your teens will thank you later!
- Encourage your teen to tutor a younger child One of the best ways to learn is to teach. Many parents of elementary or middle school kids are often looking for a high school student to tutor their child in a difficult subject. Sometimes parents feel uncomfortable teaching the subject themselves, or feel that their child would respond better to an outside influence — especially a cool older kid. Encourage your teens to seek out tutoring positions in a subject that interests them. They will gain a unique understanding of any subject when forced to break it down into comprehensive steps. They might also gain a new sense of responsibility and self that comes from mentorship.
- Challenge your teen to a reading list that focuses on content, not

Finding a summer reading list is always a great way to kick off a summer reading experience. Find a list of summer reading books that will challenge your high school student in their content, not the amount of books involved. Try a list of books with powerful female protagonists or some that feature culturally diverse narratives. Even explore new media with masterful YA graphic novels, like Gene Lueng Yang's "American Born Chinese" or Cece Bell's "El Deafo". Literature is about sharing experiences through words: challenge your teens to open their minds to the stories of those voices.

- 7. Help them incorporate writing into their daily lives
 - Beyond building reading skills, high school is the beginning of the time where students should be developing their own voices, academically and creatively. Help your child begin to foster a love for writing and incorporate it into their daily lives by providing them with a peaceful and private space to write. If they respond positively, encourage them to enter their writing into scholarship or academic contests. You can also research summer writing programs to really give your teen an immersive writing experience. Follow their interests and support them along the way.
- 8. Be an active reader yourself

One of the greatest ways to motivate your child to read is to read the same books and talk about them. If you've been doing this since elementary school, kudos! You probably already have a great reading relationship with your teen. If not, don't worry- it's not too late! You can always pick up a book that your child is reading, or has read, and strike up a conversation about the characters. Reading with your student will open your eyes to the stories and voices of today's teens, the struggles they face, and might even help you discover something about your child — or yourself! — that you never knew before.

- AP STEM Schools (213 named in 2018) are schools with students testing in at least two AP math courses and two AP science courses (AP Calculus AB, AP Calculus BC, AP Statistics, AP Biology, AP Chemistry, AP Environmental Science, AP Physics 1, AP Physics 2, AP Physics C, AP Computer Science A)
- 3. AP STEM Achievement Schools (146 named in 2018) are schools with students testing in at least two AP math courses and two AP science courses and at least 40 percent of exam scores on AP math and science exams earning scores of 3 or higher.
