

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ILEARN TESTING

STATE STANDARDIZED TESTING HELPFUL REMINDERS

As we look ahead in preparation to the new ILEARN test, here are a few things that you can do to help your child be as successful as possible.

How can students get ready for ILEARN?

- **Be prepared** Cramming for any test is never the best way to prepare. Keep up with your homework and ask your teachers for help when you need it.
- Ask for help If you've had trouble with standardized testing in the past, ask a teacher, counselor or parent about extra help now.
- **Review** Try to take it seriously when your teachers review important information that may help you feel more prepared.
- Double-check your work Get in the habit now of double-checking your work and proofreading your answers on homework to be ready to find mistakes on test days.
- Get plenty of sleep Go to bed a little earlier so you get a good night's sleep. Being well rested will give you an extra boost of energy.
- Have a good breakfast Eating a healthy breakfast will help you perform better. Too much food can make you feel sleepy, so don't overdo it.
- **Take a break** Get some exercise during your breaks or after school to keep your energy up.





What can parents do to help students prepare for ILEARN testing?

- **Stay connected** The best preparation is to provide consistent support for your child throughout his or her education.
- **Know what's expected** Read information available at Indiana Department of Education (https://www.doe.in.gov/) so you know what your child should know and be able to do, reinforce these expectations at home and stay connected to your child's academic performance throughout the year.
- Check grades Your son or daughter may say things are "fine" at school but don't stop checking Canvas, progress reports or, if available, your child's online grades or class progress.
- Check Canvas / Team Newsletters for updates Teachers know how hard students are working, the quality of their homework and what areas need improvement.
- **Stay involved** Nothing will have a bigger impact on your student's success than your involvement in his or her education. If your child is not studying at home, ask why, and double-check with teachers. It's tough to hold the line, but making sure your child does get the proper amount of rest and eat properly is important for academic success as well.
- Ask for help Students who are struggling in a particular class may need extra help after school or with a tutor. Find out from your school where you can go for help and make sure your student gets the help he or she needs. Catching a problem area now can make a big difference.

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SILENT DISCO

In 2022, a need for sensory inclusive spaces has come to the forefront. Many national public facilities such as zoos and sports stadiums have created a family experience that chooses to include children with sensory challenges. Schools, such as Clay Middle, have clubs that encourage celebrating these individuals with special needs. **Friendship Circles Club**, for example, has a mission statement as follows: "This club will allow students with disabilities to benefit from positive peer relationships that lead to greater self-confidence and stronger communication skills. Staff will encourage general education students to lead the chapters and work to develop the leader within them". The unique grant idea includes an after school "**SILENT**

DISCO". 100+ students (grades 6-8) will be given the chance to sign up, volunteer and/ or attend. The event will celebrate and encourage a diverse group coming together to practice empathy while having fun.

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Twenty-first Century

The 21st Century Scholars Program provides income-eligible students the opportunity to earn a scholarship that covers up to four years of tuition and regularly assessed fees. 21st Century Scholars support eligible students and parents with the tools they need to prepare for college, graduate on time and begin a successful career.

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MEDIA CENTER NEWS

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Clay Media Center was thrilled to have award winning author K.A. Holt present to both 7th and 8th grade students, sharing with them her journey to authorship, her writing process and inspirations. Many of K.A.'s books are novels in verse, a type of non-rhyming poetry that tells a story. Her most highly acclaimed book (to date) is *House Arrest*, which is #18 on Clay's top 50 book checkouts for the last year. House Arrest was a Young Hoosier Book Award (YHBA) Nominee in 2018-2019. The book, as well as the audiobook, are highly recommended for middle grade readers and could lead to some really great conversations with their adults. Below are some discussion questions that might be used if your middle schooler has read the book or if you choose to read it together.

- 1. Should Timothy have stolen the credit card to buy medicine for his brother? Why or why not?
- 2. It is against the law for Timothy to steal. Does that make it morally wrong?
- 3. In general, should people do everything they can to obey the law? Why or why not?
- 4. Timothy says about Jose, "He just doesn't even know" (pg. 60) This is a refrain throughout the book. Discuss who else Timothy accuses of "not knowing." What does he think each of these characters

misunderstands about his life?
5. Compare Jose's family and house to Timothy's. What do you think Timothy feels about Jose's family? How does he feel when he's at Jose's house? What role do Jose and

6. Given the incidents at the end of the book, do you think Timothy changed, or developed, through the course of the book?

his family play in Timothy's life?

7. There are many acts of generosity throughout this novel. Which would you say was the most generous gift of all?







SAFESITTER

Designed to prepare students in grades 6-8 to be safe when they're home alone, watching younger siblings, or babysitting.

The Instructor-led class is filled with fun games and role-playing exercises. Students even get to use manikins to practice rescue skills like choking rescue and CPR!



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Learning skills such as choking rescue and CPR is often students' favorite part of the class. Students also learn a system to help them assess and respond to injuries and illnesses.




Students learn tips to manage behavior that will help them stay in control of themselves and the children in their care. Students also learn the ages and stages of child development, as well as practice diapering.










