Hello CTC Parents, Students, and Staff:

Many of our students continue to demonstrate that they are community contributors and have been volunteering their time and talents for the good of others. Kudos to our SkillsUSA Officers and our Teacher Academy of Maryland (TAM) students who separately organized successful sock and winter wear drives to help those in need this holiday season, by donating hats, gloves, scarves, and socks.

Our school would like to congratulate the 580 students who recently competed in the local SkillsUSA competitions held at CTC in December. Students competed in twenty-seven (27) separate competitions against their peers; showcasing the skills they have attained in their respective technical programs. Students placing first (Gold), second (Silver) and third (Bronze) in the local competitions are eligible to compete at the next level. That next level, the SkillsUSA Regional competition, is scheduled to take place in February.

The next two months are a very important time for our students academically as the current semester ends on January 13th. Our teachers are providing bell-to-bell instruction as we accelerate the learning process to ensure that students master their current program curriculum before moving on to the second semester. Parents are encouraged to continue to monitor their child's progress and contact teachers if there is a concern. Parents can also monitor grades via Schoology, our online grade reporting service.

Finally, as we fully enter the winter season, I want to express my own gratitude for the important business and industry partnerships that CTC has established over the last few decades. Student Cell Phone Use

PARENTS/GUARDIANS

In an effort to work together to ensure appropriate use of cell phones for students, we encourage parents/guardians to review safe cell phone usage frequently, maintain open communication, and utilize appropriate parental controls. For your convenience, a sample contract is provided here. Also, students are reminded of the school's rules for having a cell phone at school, which is linked in case you wish to periodically review them with your child. Regulation 400-18 Electronic Devices -Student Use.

Finally, please reiterate with your child to not use their cell phone for unsanctioned purposes such as: cheating, harassing or bullying others, taking photos or videos of others without permission, checking personal social media accounts, or sexting. Some violations may have consequences not only related to student discipline, but victims have also pursued legal action against both the student and the parent/guardian. Those outcomes are best avoided when schools and parents partner together. We thank you for all that you do to help us reinforce good digital citizenship.



CTC Graduate is One of the Most Influential Woman on TikTok

Take a minute on your phone and google - Deaf TikTok Creators. There you will see CTC's own standing at the top of the list with over a million followers, Chrissy Marshall.

In High School, Chrissy wanted to learn how to be a filmmaker so she decided to attend CTC, more specifically

CTC's TV/Multimedia Production program. Simultaneously, Chrissy's progressive hearing loss had made her profoundly deaf. She gradually lost her hearing due to a birth defect and genetic disorder. Despite her new disability, Chrissy was able to learn entry-level skills in cinematography, editing, lighting, audio production, scriptwriting, broadcasting, and much more. Adam Frank, the TV/ Multimedia instructor, was able to provide instruction and experiences that she was able to use to create a platform on TikTok to advocate for the deaf community and to continue her education in the film industry.

Today Chrissy is at the top film school in the country, University of Southern California, and will graduate this December. She is currently producing his first short film and funding it using TikTok product endorsement funds.

"I use social media to reach millions of people and educate them about the deaf community, access American Sign Language (ASL), as well as provide them with resources and an accommodating place to learn and grow with each other," says Marshall. "My goal is to continue to advocate for representation and to push for diversity in Hollywood."

In addition to raising awareness about deaf culture, Chrissy Marshall hopes that her channel provides a place of support for those who are deaf, especially people who feel isolated and alone. "You need someone to help you and show you that it's going to be okay," she says.

Her TikTok channel, @ChrissyCantHearYou, has over 1.2M followers and she is currently a member of the TikTok Creator consortium. Her influence pushed TikTok to allow creators to easily add captions to their videos for the deaf community.

CTC Alumni Demonstrates Acquired Skills

Nate Tilley, a freshman at Johnson & Wales University, is a former CTC culinary arts and entrepreneurship student

who attended WHS, is home on winter break and did a demo for our current culinary arts students. He is studying Sustainable Food Systems, which is a new major from the College of Food Innovation & Technology focusing on the role of the practicing chef or sustainable food advocate as a leader and agent of change in the food system.

Nate informed current culinary arts and baking & pastry students about WU majors & minors, life after CTC, college life, and all things culinary. He chicken demonstrated and mushroom raviolis with pickled shallots and locally sourced sunflower sprout micro-greens. We love it when CTC alumni come back to share their knowledge, experience, and fresh ideas. Thank you, Nate, and please come back to visit us again soon!

CTC Automotive Technology Students Take 1st Place in Top Tech Challenge

On December 10th, Damon Catlin and Ethan Mentzer traveled to Virginia Beach, VA to represent the Frederick Career and Technology Center in the 2021 Top Tech Challenge held by the Advanced Technology Institute. ATI is a post-secondary trade school offering automotive, diesel, and welding courses to select seniors graduating from related programs. CTC's Automotive Technology program was invited to send a team to compete against other teams from around the east coast, and Damon and Ethan were eager to test their skills. They both competed in their respective local SkillsUSA contest before leaving but did not find out how they placed until the following week. Damon, a junior from Middletown, works at Fountaindale Auto Center after school, and Ethan, a senior also from Middletown, works at Rusty Nuts Diesel in Waynesboro, PA. Both young men are in their second year



in Automotive Technology. The Top Tech Challenge included a written knowledge exam, electrical circuit repair, precision measuring, wheel and tire service, and wheel alignment. When the results came in, they finished first out of all seven teams! Prizes included: shirts, tools, and gear, courtesy of Snap-on, and a \$7,000 scholarship for each. Dynamic Automotive and Euro Motorcars graciously stepped in to sponsor the travel expenses for the two families. Upon returning, they also found out that Ethan finished second in the local SkillsUSA competition and Damon finished third. 


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
