Proposed Education Trip to Atlanta, GA

George Jenkins High School US History teacher, Coach Gregg Mays has put forward a request to take GJ students on an educational trip to Atlanta, GA during spring break 2021. The proposed dates are March 19-23, 2021. The current estimated cost which will be collected by the school is \$600.00 per person which will cover transportation, hotel cost, breakfast, and all admissions to the historical sites we will visit. There will be a payment plan available for those who would like to make payments. Students will need money for other meals and the evening events; the estimated costs are \$75 and \$40 respectively. This would bring the estimated total cost of the trip to \$715. We will only be able to take 36 students on this trip so if you are interested, please pay as early as possible. This cost estimate is at the highest end. With fundraising, we expect the cost to be below \$500; maybe even well below.

If this trip is approved by the district office, students will be able to participate in fundraising activities to help defray the cost. Additionally, there will be an interest meeting at the beginning of the school year in order to gauge the interest and provide the most up to date information for students and parents.



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What Do You Want to Do When You Grow Up?

If the average person changes careers 6-7 times in their lifetime, wouldn't it be wise to do some research before choosing a career that's supposed to last a lifetime? The most common reasons for changing a career are disillusionment of the job and not utilizing a person's strengths. Not all interesting and well-paying jobs require a college degree. With technology changing our work force at lighting speed, it's more important than ever for high school students to research careers that will align with their interests and strengths.

Two beneficial resources available to Florida high school students are Bigfuture by the College Board and the My Career Shines at Floridashines.

At bigfuture.collegeboard.org, students can choose topics in which they are interested, then combine these interests to get career ideas. These career ideas can lead to possible college majors. A plethora of information is available for students to learn more about what careers are out there and how to make career choices.

New to the Floridashines website is the Kuder Navigator in the MyCareerShines section. Students can use career assessments to explore careers in areas which their interests, skills, and work values align. Floridashines explains this new tool as follows:

MyCareerShines Kuder Navigator® is an online planning tool made just for students in high school. It gives you everything you need to start planning for your future. You can:

- Assess your interests and skills to connect with careers that are just right for you,
- Explore the extensive catalog of careers to find exciting job opportunities in the dynamic 21st century economy,
- Get information about colleges and financial aid to turn your plan into reality, and
- Create a resume that gets you in the door and moves you up the ladder of success.

COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS

All community service hours are due to Mrs. Higgins by April 1st, 2020. Community service is required for all of the Bright Futures Scholarships. Florida Academic will require 100 service hours, Florida Medallion will need 75 hours and Gold Seal will require 35 hours of community service. If you are an underclassman your hours will carry over until your year of graduation.

<u>**Registration:**</u>

Registration for the 2020-2021 school year started on February 4th. The registration form was given out in 1st period then taken home for parent approval. These registration forms were due back at GJHS on February 7th. Please make sure these forms have been turned in. This registration process is essential to planning courses that will be offered next school year. In May, every student will get a copy of their courses that will be scheduled in the 2020-2021 school year. Any requested changes must be submitted at this time.

<u>Academics:</u>

Student's academic course placement will follow a District Progression Plan for each subject area which is based on current courses, course grades, and testing data in each subject area. These flow charts were created by county office personnel and content area teachers based on research, experience and graduation requirements. Teachers also make academic and academy progression recommendations on the Registration form.

Electives:

Students, with parent input and approval, choose their elective courses. On the registration form, students prioritize their elective choices by placing the numbers 1 - 6 next to their desired courses. Their #1 elective choice is the elective course that is most important to them. Five more elective choices are selected in priority order. Electives are chosen based on college plans, career interests, and participation in performing arts programs. Students must choose these elective courses wisely. The GJHS master schedule and teaching staff is created based on what the students choose at registration. With limits on class sizes, this master schedule does not have the flexibility to honor requests to change courses once schedules have been completed in the summer.

Something to consider when selecting elective courses: In order to be accepted into a four year state college, the State University System (SUS) requires students to have a minimum of 18 academic credits. Academic electives offered at GJHS include additional science courses, foreign language, or even psychology, sociology, or creative writing. Students should visit their prospective colleges' website for information about admissions requirements. More information on SUS requirements can be found at www.floridashines. org. Our Career Academies give students experiences and exposure to different careers in areas where they are interested. Most offer industry certifications that prepare students for direct entry into the workforce. Students should use these courses to explore career options, build their work resume, make connections with professionals in these industries, and/or prepare for further education in their field of study.

For questions about academic progressions and the selection of elective courses, refer to our website out www.georgejenkinhs.com under 'academics'. Please remember, all students are scheduled based on graduation requirements, Florida Legislative Testing Mandates, Class Size Amendment, college admissions requirements, academic records and course availability. Courses are subject to cancellation due to funding and/or lack of student requests. *Freshmen:*

The first semester of high school is complete! Freshmen should review their graduation requirements to evaluate their progress. The Freshmen Class Power Point Presentation can be reviewed on the GJHS website for reminders about graduation requirements, Bright Futures Scholarships, and college/career planning. It is never too early to plan for the future! Use Florida Shines at www. floridashines.org to start career planning. This valuable resource should be used to plan for Post-Secondary Education and includes information about colleges, technical schools, and careers. Students may also access their unofficial Bright Futures evaluation and high school course records on the Florida Shines website. *Sophomores:*

Sophomores should visit www.floridashines.org to research careers and make post-secondary plans. Students can research what education is required for difference careers; is a four-year degree needed? Is a 2-year degree or technical certification the better route? Then, search for colleges or technical schools that offer that education. Florida Shines is an educational service provided by the Department of Education, the State University System of Florida, and the *continued*





Florida College System to help students plan their education. Sophomores who took the PSAT in October were given their score report and test book in their English class. Students should review their score report and plan to take the PSAT again next October during their junior year. Taking this test as a junior is the only way to qualify for the National Merit Scholarship Program and the best preparation for the SAT. Be sure to use Khan Academy to get ready for the junior PSAT.

<u>PSAT:</u>

Any student who did not receive their scores can pick them up in the Guidance Office. The score reports show how a student would perform on the SAT and detailed feedback on content areas where students are doing well and where they need improvement. Students can review their test to see what questions they got right, what they got wrong, and refer to the website to get explanations of the correct answers. Connecting their PSAT/College Board account to Khan Academy gives students access to personalized PSAT and SAT preparation based on how they performed on the 2019 PSAT. They also have access to thousands of practice questions and four official SAT Practice Tests. College Board research shows that 20 hours of test preparation using this resource will gain a student an average of 115 points from the PSAT to the SAT. <u>Juniors:</u>

Counselors will be meeting with Juniors individually in March and April. Graduation requirements and college and career planning will be reviewed along with the requirements for Bright Futures and State University System (SUS) admissions. Students will be able to discuss what elective choices are best for them in the 2020-2021 school year based on their post-secondary plans. Please refer to the Guidance section of the GJ website for the junior conference video that covers all the information in the conference.

Many colleges require SAT or ACT scores at the time students apply. College bound juniors should start taking the SAT and ACT the second half of their junior year. The College Board and Kahn Academy established a partnership to give all students SAT practice. For ACT, go to ACTstudent. org to register for the ACT tests and find excellent test preparation resources. After taking these tests in the spring, students will have several opportunities to retest before completing college applications in the fall of their senior year or to qualify for Bright Futures. Don't forget! Your junior year is most important when applying to a post-secondary school. Begin planning your college campus visits. Many colleges have special dates set up for students interested in attending their school. See their websites for more information.

<u>Seniors:</u>

Seniors have entered their final semester of their high school careers. Avoid 'senioritis'!!! Grades, attendance, and behavior continue to be of high importance to successfully make it to graduation. Seniors should be paying attention to college deadlines (housing, financial aid, etc), looking for scholarships, completing financial aid applications, and planning for next year. All courses taken on FLVS/PVS must be completed by *May 1st* to count for graduation and be included on the high school transcripts. Community Service hours are due *April 1st*. Remember, colleges may rescind acceptance based on semester schedule changes and/or final grades. Be sure to stay up to date on the latest graduation ceremony information by visiting our GJ webpage at www. georgejenkinshs.com under 'announcements' on the front page.

<u>Bright Futures:</u>

In October, seniors had the opportunity to complete the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) which is the registration application for the Bright Futures Scholarship Program. If this opportunity was missed, students must apply at www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org. Initial



Bright Futures eligibility status checks will be completed in February. Students should check their eligibility status on this website using their log in ID and PIN. If a student is not eligible at this time, he or she will be re-evaluated at the end of the school year.

Remember for Bright Futures:

- Community service is required for all of the Bright Futures Scholarships. Florida Academic = 100 hrs; Florida Medallion = 75 hrs; Gold Seal = 35 hrs
- *Qualifying SAT or ACT scores are required.* Students can continue to take the SAT and/or ACT through the last June 2019 testing dates to achieve the minimum test scores. Students must register on the SAT/ACT websites for testing.

<u>FAFSA:</u>

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) became available on October 1st. Students who plan on pursuing postsecondary education, whether it be at a university, community college or technical school, should complete a FAFSA, Once the FAFSA is complete, students can work with the financial aid office of the school they are planning to attend to find out their 'cost of attendance' and other financial aid opportunities. Use Floridashines.org. for a link to the FAFSA website. There is no charge to complete the FAFSA. If the site requests any form of payment, it is the wrong site!!
