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Our elective course registration for the 2022-2023 school year starts on Monday, February 14th. The main academic courses (English, Math, Science, Social Studies) follow a District Progression Plan for each subject area which is based on current course, course grades, and testing data in that subject area. Students will be choosing their elective courses using a google document online registration form. This form will open on Monday, Feb 14th, and close on Friday, Feb 18th. Students will have an opportunity to complete the form at school or may choose to complete it at home with their parents. Once submitted, the student will receive an email confirmation with their chosen courses. Students are encouraged to review course choices with their parent prior to making selections but will be able to resubmit their requests through Friday, Feb 18th. Counselors will be available in the Food Court during all lunches for students to ask questions and gain advice on selecting elective courses. All students must submit an elective registration form or their elective courses will be chosen for them.

In May, students will be able to see all their courses that will be scheduled for the 2022-2023 school year on their Student Portal and will receive a printed copy of the requested courses. Any corrections must be submitted to the Student Services Office prior to the end of the school year. Over summer, counselors will turn course requests into schedules. Final schedules will be distributed at orientation. Please remember, we do not have the flexibility to honor course change requests once schedules are complete. Requests for course changes must be submitted prior to summer break.

#### **How to Choose Electives**

Elective courses should align with post-secondary goals. Students wishing to attend a four year university after high school should have academic rigor that includes additional AP, academic, and foreign languages courses. Even though foreign language is not required for graduation, two years of the same foreign language is required for admission to a four year university and the Bright Futures scholarships. Additional academic courses include foreign language, science, AP, and social studies courses such as Psychology, Sociology, and Creative Writing. More competitive colleges want 5-6 academic courses per year while other universities are looking for 4-5 academic courses per year. The minimum number of academic courses needed for university admissions is 18 which would be 4-5 academic courses per year. More information on State University System requirements can be found at www.floridashines.org or on each university's website under admissions. Dual Enrollment opportunities allow students to earn college credit while still in high school and offer additional opportunities at academic rigor, especially for students interested in the state college's 2+2 option. More information on dual enrollment can be found on our website under Student Services, and another dual enrollment information meeting will be held in April. Our Career Academies give students experiences and exposure to different career fields. Most offer industry certifications that prepare students for direct entry into the workforce. Students should use these courses to explore career options, build their work resume, make connections with professionals in these industries, and/or prepare for further education in that field of study. #### Additional Registration Information for Parents

Counselors will host a lunch and learn online Zoom meeting on Tuesday, February 15th from 12:15-1:00 pm to provide parents with more information on the registration process. Graduation requirements, post-secondary planning, and elective selection will be discussed and parents will have the opportunity to ask questions. Look for the Zoom information link on the registration section of our website, on social media, and in an email to students/parents.

#### Juniors

Counselors plan to meet with juniors individually in April to review graduation status, post-secondary plans, and other important information. Students will review their requested courses for next year and make changes as necessary. Don't forget about the ACT School day this spring! These ACT scores can be used for college admissions and qualifying for Bright Futures.

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#### **Seniors**

It is now the final semester of your high school careers. Avoid 'senioritis'! Grades, attendance, and behavior continue to be of high importance. Remember, colleges may rescind acceptance based on semester schedule changes and/or final grades. All courses taken on FLVS/PVS must be completed by May 1st to count for graduation and be included on the high school transcripts. Community Service hours are due April 1st. #### **Polk Education Foundation Scholarships**

The Polk Education Foundation Scholarships are now open!!! All PEF scholarships are local, Polk County donors and 13 scholarships are only for GJHS students. Apply at https://polkschoolsfl.com/pef/ scholarships/ Online submission deadline is Monday, February 14th at noon. When the online application is submitted, students must print the completed application, sign, and turn it in to Students Services with their SAR (Student Aid Report from completing the FAFSA) and any other supporting documents by Friday, February 18th. Recipients are announced at the Senior Awards ceremony.

#### **FAFSA**

**FAFSA** (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) is a crucial component in paying for college. Students who plan on pursuing postsecondary education, whether it be at a university, community college or technical school, should complete a FAFSA. Once the FAFSA is complete, students can work with the financial aid office of the school they are planning to attend to find out their 'cost of attendance' and other financial aid opportunities. The official website is studentaid gov. *There is no charge to complete the FAFSA*. If the site requests any form of payment, it is the wrong site!!

#### **Bright Futures Scholarships:**

The Florida Academic Scholars, Florida Medallion Scholars, Gold Seal Vocational Scholars require specific coursework, minimum GPA, minimum SAT or ACT scores, and community service hours. Students have until the June test dates of their senior year to achieve the required scores. The Florida

Financial Aid Application must be completed prior to graduation at www.floridastudentfinancialaid. org. Please see this website for more information.

#### **Testing**

#### **Spring 2022 Assessment Information**

In order to receive a high school diploma in Florida, students must achieve academic requirements which include passing state assessments, specifically the FSA English Language Arts (ELA10 and FSA Algebra End of Course [EOC] exams). The FSA ELA has a one-day Writing section and a Reading section which is divided over two days. The Algebra EOC is also divided over a two-day period.

In addition to these assessments, students are also required to participate in End of Course Exams when enrolled in the following courses: Geometry, Biology, and US History. All EOCs will count as 30% of the entire course grade – which could possibly affect the first semester grade.

Dates below are tentative for Spring Assessments (at the time this newsletter was in the process of publishing, Testing Schedules were awaiting approval).

#### \*\*\*PLEASE MAKE NOTE OF THESE DATES; MAKE-UPS ARE NEVER GUARANTEED.

**February 23 & 24** FSA Algebra EOC Retake for students who completed the course but have not met this graduation requirement.

**February 28** FSA ELA Writing Retake for juniors and seniors who have not met this graduation requirement.

March 2 & 3 FSA ELA Reading Retake for juniors and seniors who have not met this graduation requirement, (you must have completed the Writing session in order to sit for the Reading sessions)

March 29 ACT School Day (non-college reportable/triple time) English section for seniors who have not met the FSA ELA graduation requirement.

March 30 ACT School Day (non-college reportable/triple time) Math section for seniors who have

not met the FSA ELA and Alg. EOC graduation requirement.

March 31 ACT School Day (non-college reportable/triple time) Reading section for seniors who

have not met the FSA ELA graduation requirement.

**April 5** FSA ELA Writing for 9th grade students. **April 6** FSA ELA Writing for 10th grade students.

April 19 ACT School Day (college reportable – standard time) Students will complete all sections

of the test on this day. ALL juniors will be scheduled for this test.

April 26 Florida Civic Literacy Exam (FCLE) for all students taking US Government, including

honors and AP.

May 2 US History EOC for all students enrolled in this course (includes those enrolled in AP

US History)

May 3 & 4 FSA ELA Reading sections for both 9th and 10th grade. (Must have completed the Writing

test in April and complete both sections of the Reading in order to receive a score).

May 10 & 11 Algebra and Geometry EOC for all students enrolled in these courses. Must attend both

May 17 Biology EOC for students enrolled in Biology.

\*Advanced Placement (AP) exams will be given May 2nd – May 13th. Please check with your teacher and the CollegeBoard website www.collegeboard.org.

If you or your student would like to review the computer-based practice test at home, the practice tests and answer keys are available at https://fsassessments.org/families.html/.

Students taking the Algebra or Geometry EOC should practice using the online calculator and the equation editor. Handheld calculators **WILL NOT** be allowed for these EOCs. 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#### GJ + Traviss Technical College = Success!

In order to make this happen Traviss Technical College was invited to GJ in November to highlight both their Medical and Non-Medical career programs to our students. Seniors were also made aware that we had invited Traviss back to do on-site applications in January and March for these same programs.

On January 7th, several students applied to Traviss' Medical Programs, which are highly competitive. We wish these students success that they might gain admissions to any one of the following: Dental Assisting, Surgical Technician, Medical Assisting or Practical Nursing.

On March 2nd all other graduating seniors will be able to apply on campus for Non-Medical vocations such as Avionics, Automotive, Electricity, Culinary, Cosmetology, Welding, etc. If your senior is interested in attending Traviss Technical for any non-medical program March is the time to apply! Underclassmen: This is the first year that Traviss has moved their application to the Open Enrollment process which opened on January 4, 2022 and will close on February 18, 2022. 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
#### **Football**


