Proposed Education Trip to Montgomery, AL



George Jenkins High School US History teacher, Coach Gregg Mays will put forward a request to take GJ students on an educational trip to Montgomery, AL during spring break 2024. The proposed dates are March 8-12, 2024. The current estimated cost, which will be collected by the school, is \$500.00 per person, which will cover transportation, hotel cost, breakfast, and all admissions to the historical sites we will visit. There will be a payment plan available for those who would like to make payments. Students will need money for other meals and

the evening events; the estimated costs are \$75 and \$40 respectively. This would bring the estimated total cost of the trip to \$615. We will only be able to take 36 students on this trip so if you are interested, please pay as early as possible.

If this trip is approved by the district office, students will be able to participate in fundraising activities to help defray the cost. Additionally, there will be an interest meeting at the beginning of the school year in order to gauge the interest and provide the most up to date information for students and parents.

All of our students presented exemplary legislation and displayed their parliamentary procedure skills in chambers; however, several students were individually recognized for their work. Justyce Young served as Commissioner of Agriculture in the Cabinet this year, and she was elected Senate President for next school year. Abby Bourque won Best Bill in Senate, and she was the only delegate in the state to receive the 7-year award. Desirae McCalla presented her legislation to the Cabinet.

Dual Enrollment Opportunities

Students wishing to take dual enrollment courses at Polk State in the fall must apply online at www.polk.edu as a dual enrollment student. Once the application is complete, students will receive an email containing their Polk State ID# and information on how to complete the online orientation. Students will also need 'college ready' test scores which can be achieved through SAT, ACT or the PERT. SAT and ACT scores must be sent directly to Polk State through College Board or ACT. The PERT can be taken through Polk State. The application email will have information on how to request to take the PERT online from home or how to schedule to take the PERT at Polk State. A PERT study guide is available on the GJHS website under 'Academics, then 'testing information'. Counselors will share more dual enrollment information in a dual enrollment meeting in the Auditorium in April. Students should check their school email for meeting details. News from Student Services

We are in the final stretch of the 2022-2023 school year! Students should be diligent in maintaining grades for their final quarter. Only semester grades, the average of quarter 3 and quarter 4, are recorded on a student's academic record and included in their cumulative GPA. The month of May will include many tests including ELA FAST, End of Course exams, and AP exams. End of course exams will be given in US History, Geometry, Biology, and Algebra 1. These EOC grades will also be calculated as 30% of the final course grade. Be sure to pay close attention to the testing schedule and be in attendance, ready to test on the assigned day.

Seniors: It's your final quarter of high school! Enjoy your last few weeks by attending all your classes and keeping all grades up. FLVS courses must be completed by May 10th to count for graduation and be included on the high school transcript. Commitment Day will be celebrated on April 20th. Look and listen for more information in April.

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Spring 2023 Assessment Information

In order to receive a high school diploma in Florida, Senior & Junior students must meet certain academic requirements, which include passing state assessments, specifically the FSA English Language Arts (ELA) and FSA Algebra End of Course (EOC) exams. The FSA ELA has a one-day Writing section and a Reading section, which is divided over two days. The Algebra EOC is also divided over two days. Ninth & Tenth grade students must meet a passing score on the FAST ELA and the B.E.S.T. Algebra 1. (Both new assessments this school year).

In addition to these assessments, students are required to participate in the End of Course exam when enrolled in the following courses; Geometry, Biology, and US History. The EOC will count 30% of the entire course grade – which could affect the first semester grade.

Below are the dates for Spring testing. <u>Please make note of these test dates as make up dates are</u> <u>never guaranteed.</u>

Retakes for FSA Alg 1 (Sr. only) and FSA ELA (11th & 12th grade) for those needing to meet graduation requirement took place from Feb. 21 – March 8th. Multiple opportunities were scheduled throughout the testing window.

- March 28: ACT School Day (non-college reportable/triple time) English section for seniors who have not met the FSA ELA graduation requirement.
- March 29: ACT School Day (non-college reportable/triple time) Math section for seniors who have not met the FSA ELA and Algebra EOC graduation requirements.
- March 30: ACT School Day (non-college reportable/triple time) Reading section for seniors who have not met the FSA ELA graduation requirement.

ACT School Day (non-college reportable/triple time) <u>MUST BE COMPLETED IN ORDER.</u> The Students scheduled for each section <u>must in attendance on time the day the subject is scheduled</u>. April 6: BEST Writing Field Test for 10th grade students.

April 18: ACT JR. School Day (college reportable – standard time) Students will complete all sections of the test on this day. This test is being offered to all juniors that bring their school issued devices charged and ready to test, they cannot test on a personal device; this is an online version of the ACT.

May 1: FAST ELA for all 9th graders

May 2: FAST ELA for all 10th graders

May 3: B.E.S.T. Geometry EOC for all students enrolled in this course. (30% of final grade)

May 4: B.E.S.T. Algebra 1 EOC for all students enrolled in this course. (30% of final grade – Level 3 or above for Graduation requirement.

May 9: Biology EOC for students enrolled in Biology.

May 10: FCLE – For all students enrolled in Gov.

May 11: US History EOC for all students enrolled in this course and AP US History.

Advanced Placement (AP) exam dates please check with your teacher and/or the CollegeBoard website, www.collegeboard.org.

If you or your student would like to review the computer-based practice test at home, the practice tests and answer keys are available at https://flfast.org/families.html.

Students taking the Algebra or Geometry EOCs should practice using the online calculator and the equation editor. Handheld calculators will not be allowed for these EOCs. This information can be found in the FSA Portal (link below) under Testing Resources. Information about the FSA program can be found at https://flfast.org/fast.html.





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The SAT and ACT are entrance exams that are designed to measure a student's readiness for college. These test scores are required when applying to a public university as a high school senior and for the Bright Futures Scholarship program. They can also be used to meet the FSA English Language Arts and Algebra 1 End of Course exam-testing requirements for graduation. It is recommended that juniors start testing in the Spring in preparation for college applications in the fall or meeting the FSA ELA graduation requirement. All juniors will take the School Day ACT on April 19th and should be able to access their scores on the ACT website. Here are the remaining testing dates for this school year. SAT or ACT - Which Test is Right for You?

An Associate's Degree May Be Your Path to Success

Former First Lady Michelle Obama's Reach Higher Initiative is meant to inspire high school students to pursue education after high school whether its technical education, a community college, or a four-year college degree. Our Florida College System offers students the opportunity to earn an Associate of Arts (AA) Degree prior to pursuing a bachelor's degree. This path is called the 2+2 system.



In Florida, any student who completes an AA degree at a Florida college is guaranteed the opportunity to earn a bachelor's degree at a Florida college or university.

The Florida College System includes 28 public state colleges and community colleges at 178 sites across the state. An "open-door" admissions policy allows any student with a high school diploma the opportunity to pursue an Associate's Degree. Students are then required to take the Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (PERT) or submit scores on the ACT or SAT to determine appropriate course placement. College developmental courses may be needed to learn additional college ready skills. The Florida Department of Education defines college ready as a student who

has the knowledge, skills, and academic preparation needed to enroll and succeed in introductory college level courses. College ready scores are as follows:

A Bachelor's Degree is not needed in every career field to achieve a well-paying job. According to the Bureau of Labor and Statistics, many high demand fields like health care, information technology, and logistics have median salaries over \$55,000 per year for graduates with an Associate's Degree. Many other high demand jobs only require specialized or technical degrees. These programs can offer big salaries without spending big on a 4-year college degree.
