

Happy Second Quarter from the ELA Department!

6th Grade:

We cannot believe we are already into the second quarter! Sixth grade students are very excited to be participating in the Tropicana Speech Competition. Through taking part in the competition, students are learning how to conduct research, reinforcing writing skills, and practicing public speaking. While challenging, the speech competition proves to be a very successful and beneficial experience for our students year after year.

Students participated in their first Write Score assessment on November 6th and 7th! This practice, FSA-style writing experience provides us with specific, individualized feedback in order to help students improve their writing in ways that are meaningful to each individual student.

As always, be sure to keep up with your student's grades through Skyward. You can even download the Skyward App onto your phone for even easier access!


7th Grade:

Our amazing seventh graders are working on writing essays! We have been working on an argumentative essay, and learning how to incorporate a counterclaim into our writing. The students are working on revising their essays and practicing skills to help them with introductions, finding evidence, elaboration, counterclaims, and writing conclusions! Please continue to check Skyward for grades and updates!

8th Grade:

The eighth grade team is working on a Horror Unit, focusing on suspense, dramatic irony, and imagery. In this unit, the students will read classic horror tales like the "Tell-Tale Heart" by Edgar Allen Poe and "The Monkey's Paw" by W.W. Jacobs, as well as an informational article about the genre. Additionally, we are getting ready to dive into writing with two planned FSA-style writing activities during the 2nd quarter. We will discuss how to write a claim, support it with evidence, and elaborate on points. The DBQ writing students have done recently in their history classes will help build writing fluency and build connections across content. Please make sure your child is reading at home at least thirty minutes a night to help develop their reading fluency and comprehension, as well as their overall vocabulary.

Science Department

6th Grade:

Students are learning all about homeostasis in ecosystems! They are able to Explain and illustrate the roles of/and relationships among producers, consumers, and decomposers in the process of energy transfer in a food web. They can also Compare the relationships among organisms such as mutualism, predation, parasitism, competition, & commensalism. Students will soon understand and identify the impact that humans have had on Earth, such as deforestation, urbanization, desertification, erosion, air and water quality, and changing the flow of water.

7th Grade:

Students are going into the Beyond our World unit! They will be able to describe and classify specific physical properties of stars: apparent magnitude (brightness), temperature (color), size and luminosity (absolute brightness). They can also compare and contrast properties of objects in the solar system.

8th Grade:

Students will be working on interactions among the geosphere, hydrosphere, cryosphere, atmosphere, and biosphere. Students will also be able to describe how the composition and structure of the atmosphere protects life and insulates the planet. They will have to recognize that fossil evidence is consistent with the scientific theory of evolution and what methods are used for measuring the age of the Earth and its parts.

Reading Department

The Reading Department in 6th, 7th, and 8th grade just finished up the i-Ready Growth Monitor Assessment. The data from i-Ready has been shared with your students. All three grade levels are working on completing lessons in class weekly. Students are expected to complete 46 minutes on i-Ready each week with a score of 75% or more on each lesson(s). Classroom time has been set aside to allow the students enough time to complete their required minutes. If your student is absent, please have them work on their i-Ready lessons at home if possible. We also encourage you to have your students read for 20 minutes each night. Reading 20 minutes each night helps your child build reading stamina which will help them on lengthy FSA reading passages.





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Social Studies

6th Grade:

During the month of November, 6th grade students will be working on units six and seven. Unit six discusses Ancient China and will include the second DBQ of the year. Unit seven will cover Ancient Egypt and will begin at the end of November and continue through December. Both units will discuss cultural achievements and legacies of both Ancient Civilizations.

7th Grade:

During the month of November, 7th grade Civics students will be working on units six, seven, and eight. Unit six discusses the Declaration of Independence and will include our first DBQ of the year. Unit seven will cover the Articles of Confederation and why the first government of the United States did not work. Unit eight will cover the creation of the United States Constitution and start at the end of November.

8th Grade:

During the month of November, 8th grade American History students will be working on The Declaration of Independence and a DBQ on the American Revolution. In December, we will begin learning about the government system we currently have in the United States.

Math Department

In **6th grade standard**, the students will continue to work on Unit 5-Expressions, in which students will be learning about coefficients, constants, terms, variables and how to write expressions. Please encourage your child to come to class ready to learn, with their needed supplies and ready to SOAR. Students should be reviewing skills on a daily basis to help them be proficient in the 6th grade math standards.

The **6th grade advanced** math classes have a busy schedule for the second 9 weeks. Students begin with an extensive study of writing and evaluating numerical algebraic expressions, equations, and inequalities. This leads right into the study of rational number concepts where students will apply previous knowledge to the system of rational numbers. The 9 week period concludes with students venturing into the 7th grade standard of rational number operations. They will use their knowledge to add, subtract, multiply, and divide rational numbers. We are up for the challenge!

In **GEMS**, the second 9 weeks will focus on 7th and 8th grade geometry standards. Students will draw and construct geometrical figures, solve problems involving angle measures, and explore area and circumference of circles. This will lead into students solving real-world and mathematical problems involving area, surface area and volume. The students will continue their Virtual Bridge independent study of geometry. It is important that students complete these assignments as they tie in directly with the higher level standards that are covered in class. The next virtual bridge assignment will cover the 6th grade standards involving ratios, proportions, and percents.

The **7th grade standard** math students will be mastering skills involving simplifying expressions and solving one and two-step equations. Students then will conquer writing and solving one and two-step inequalities. We really want to stress the importance of students having their TI-30Xa calculator and a pencil with them every day along with a ready-to-learn attitude!

In **7th grade advanced** math, students are learning about angle relationships. Students will be able to find angle measures formed by parallel lines and transversals, along with finding the sum of angles in triangles. After learning how to find the sum of angles in polygons, students will move onto similar triangles and scale drawings. Students will know how to solve for unknown supplementary and complimentary angles and how to construct triangles given angle and side conditions.

Pre-Algebra classes are working on linear functions, where they are learning how to construct graphs, data tables and equations that all work together to represent proportional and non-proportional relationships between the data. Students are learning terms like slope, y-intercept, proportional, non-proportional, unit rate, and function. Understanding linear functions is one of the most important pre-algebra concepts for students to master going into high school.

Algebra I students are continuing to deepen their knowledge on linear functions. Linear functions are 1 of 3 types of functions explored this year. They will be looking at similarities and differences of linear equations and how to solve systems of linear equations using any of the 3 methods. They will finish the quarter by looking at exponential functions and relationships.

Geometry Honors is moving right along as they look at angle relationships and parallel and perpendicular lines in the coordinate plane. They will translate into looking at how triangles are congruent as well as the attributes and properties of triangles. They will end the quarter by studying how triangles relate to all polygons, and how understanding triangles will enhance the understanding of all polygons.
