"It's such an honor to be chosen as a Fulbright fellow and one of the proudest moments



of my life," Strein said. "This experience will help me to grow as a globally competent teacher and definitely equip me with more knowledge and skills to better prepare my students to be globally competent."

With more than a decade as a teacher, Strein was already using innovative teaching techniques in her classroom. She prides herself on creating an engaging environment in which her students work cooperatively, a structure that makes for memorable educational experiences that inspire students to think about how they can make a difference globally.

"I've always had a passion for understanding other cultures, traveling, and humanitarian work, but this program put all those passions together and showed me how to integrate them into my classroom in meaningful ways," she said.

Strein is looking forward to an international field experience in 2020 where she will work with teachers in Peru. After she completes the program, she plans to pursue a doctorate in global education or seek another position within the Fulbright program.

Currently there are two teams each competing for victory: *Werewolves versus Villagers*. In order for the villagers to win, the villagers have to eliminate all students who were assigned a werewolf role by prosecution similar to a court case.

The way the game works is Day and Night cycles. During the day there are three prosecutions and court cases. After three prosecutions, the day cycle is over and everyone puts their heads down to "sleep" as it is now the Night Cycle. During the Night cycle, if you have a special role and it is called, you put your head up and perform the action you are required to do. Afterwards, once all night roles have been completed, you will return to the Day Cycle and the people who were eliminated by werewolves are revealed and we proceed to the next day cycle.

Walkie talkies were used to radio back clues to group members. Popcorn was popped in the microwave and enjoyed. Pictures were taken with an infrared camera for students to see how color relates to thermal energy. Diffraction glasses were worn to see the spectrum created with visible light. Bracelets were made using ultraviolet beads which change color outside. X-rays of various animals were viewed and identified by each group. A Geiger counter allowed students to hear the gamma rays it picked up from a variety of objects. All in all, the students learned a lot, while also having fun and working collaboratively with their group.
