Perfect Pumpkin Pie INGREDIENTS

- 1 can of pumpkin (15 oz)
- 1 can (14 oz) of Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon of ground cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon of ground ginger
- ½ teaspoon of nutmeg
- 1 (9 inch) unbaked pie crust

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Mix sweetened condensed milk, eggs, spices, and salt in bowl. Pour into crust and bake for 15 minutes.

Sweet Potato Casserole with Marshmallow and Pecan Streusel

INGREDIENTS

- 3 pounds of sweet potatoes peeled and chopped
- 2 tbsp of unsalted butter
- ¼ cup of brown sugar
- ½ teaspoon of ground cinnamon
- ¼ cup of all purpose flour
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup chopped pecans
- 2-3 cups of mini marshmallows

DIRECTIONS

Peel and cut sweet potatoes,put in pot and cover with water. Bring to boil until tender. Drain and mash to make chunky. Season Mashed Sweet potatoes with butter, milk, cinnamon, brown sugar, and salt to suit taste. Mix topping of brown sugar, pecans, cinnamon, salt, and softened butter around the potatoes. Drop bits of streusel over marshmallows. Bake for 10-15 minutes.

This season, every kid is looking for a meal to remember. Perhaps, try a new recipe, or make some homemade meals! Everyone will also be looking forward to having family gather and celebrate traditions. Make this Thanksgiving a memory by trying something new. 
