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A Message from the Principal

Dear Ram Families,

As 2019 draws to a close, I am reminded of the importance of school and family partnerships in securing the best possible educational experiences for our children. One way to promote a positive school environment is to talk to our children about the actions and behaviors that lead to success and to reinforce consistent messages on both the home and school fronts. For years, LMHS has been asking students to Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Engaged as a means to having a productive high school experience. This year, we added Be the Change to our mantra, because we want our students to feel empowered to make positive changes in their school and community. In an effort to articulate what we mean when we communicate our daily mantra, I would like to offer a more detailed description of how our students can take inspiration from these words to secure a successful high school experience.

Be Respectful: Teaching positive behaviors is a critical component of a well-rounded education. Everyone wants to be treated with respect, and it goes without saying that in order to get respect, we must give respect. This year, the faculty and staff at LMHS have a renewed focus on working “with” students, through the use of respectful language and behaviors, to hear their concerns, assist in solving their problems, and support them in reaching their goals. We are committed to providing a system of support for all students, and we are eager to hear from any students or parents who feel we are falling short on this promise.

Be Responsible: Teaching students what it means to be responsible is another hallmark of high school education. For our students, being responsible means getting to class on time, coming to school dressed appropriately, completing homework on a daily basis, and turning in assignments on time. Responsibility also means communicating with teachers and staff members with questions and/or concerns, contributing to our school community in a positive way, and reporting any concerns to staff members. We appreciate family members supporting school efforts to teach responsibility in an effort to prepare our students for post-secondary education and the world of work.

Be Engaged: Students who are engaged in their school community through participation in extra-curricular activities such as sports, clubs, arts, or community service are forced to better manage their time and learn the characteristics of a valuable team member. As a result, involved students report a more fulfilling high school experience. Further, students who are pro-active in engaging with their teachers and peers on a daily basis experience more academic success. Being engaged means fully participating in the high school experience. We encourage parents to ensure that your children find a way to engage in both coursework and extra-curricular activities.

Positive Behavior Supports

Feature Program: Lake Mary Drafting\ C.A.D. & NASA H.U.N.C.H. Program



So, what is the NASA H.U.N.C.H. Program? It stands for High School Students United with NASA to Create Hardware. It is a program where NASA partners with schools to produce different items for the space program. It is a great program for students as it allows them to work with professionals outside of the normal advanced curriculum. Students take pride in partnering with an organization as esteemed as NASA.

For the last three years LMHS has produced elaborate 3D Models that are used at air shows and other events to promote NASA. Many of our print builds of the individual parts take between 60 to 70 hours on our 3D Printer. We are given drawings with very rough dimensions and the students produce amazing results. Two years ago, we worked with two other high schools on a joint project. For our part we produced a 1/100th scale 3D Model of the Mobile Launcher (ML) used in conjunction with the SLS Rocket and the Crawler. Our model of the Mobile Launcher stood 48" tall.

Last year we did a very difficult 3D Model of the Atlas V 400 with the OSIRIS-Rex payload. It was also 1/100th scale. Not only did we make the rocket, but we also created a launch platform and a crane with motion that incorporated an electro-magnet student designed and constructed. The crane would lower and then the electro-magnet would engage and pick up the fairing (capsule). It would then rise, rotate 90 degrees, and deposit the fairing onto the body of the rocket. This was all done by remote control. The Robotics class helped with the motion.

This year we are doing a combination of the past two years. We are combining the Launch Platform and Delta IV Heavy Lifter Rocket with the Parker Solar Probe. Although we have just started this project, I see the same enthusiasm as I did for the projects in the past. I am looking forward to experiencing this with them as I did the past two years. While the projects are being completed it is extremely stressful and we consider not participating in the future. But when the projects are completed, students are proud of their accomplishments, realize the value of such an incredible learning experience, and look forward to another challenge.



Feature Teacher: Mr. Whalen

I am a lifelong educator and a Ram through and through. Currently I am the Drafting\C.A.D. instructor at Lake Mary High School. I graduated from Clemson University with a B.S. in Industrial Education in 1980. I have been a high school teacher in Florida ever since. I arrived at Lake Mary High School in August 1987. My first teaching position was as the Shop Teacher for six years and then I transitioned into my current Drafting position.



I have been very involved in many aspects of LMHS. For several years my students competed in the NAWIC Architecture Contest winning the regional competition almost every year and winning the state competition twice.

For the last three years, we have partnered with NASA and have been part of the HUNCH Program (see accompanying article). I was also very involved in coaching. I coached the Freshmen and Junior Varsity Boys' Basketball Teams when the 1989 Boys' Freshman Team went undefeated at 16-0. I also was the first Varsity Boys' Volleyball coach for 10 years when volleyball was introduced into Florida. Lake Mary has the distinction of winning the first match in the history of boys' volleyball in the state of Florida.

My wife, Jennifer, who is a 4th grade teacher at Heathrow Elementary and I have been married for 24 years. Our daughter, Jessica, lives in South Carolina with her husband and has given us two beautiful grandchildren. Our daughter Maria is a junior at USF majoring in Public Relations & Advertising with a minor in English with an emphasis on Creative Writing. I spent most of my childhood and teen years growing up in Puerto Rico where my mother was born and raised. I graduated from Ramey High School on the Air Force base where my father was stationed. When not at school you will find me either rooting hard for my Clemson Tigers, at my church (St. Stephen Lutheran, Longwood) where my family is very active or on one of my motorcycles. In 2010 I completed the #1 item on my bucket list when I did a solo ride from Orlando to the Arctic Circle in Alaska and back on by Kawasaki Concours 1400. I am looking forward to retiring in a few years which will give me the opportunity to spend more time with my grandkids and to ride more in the fall & spring.

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Feature Student: Antonella Rebolledo-Ledesma

Antonella Rebolledo-Ledesma is being recognized among all of our high schools in Seminole County as the Presidential Scholar. She has a 4.63 weighted GPA, and has sought out the most difficult course work throughout her four years, to include 17 AP courses, 5 Dual Enrollment courses, and multiple industry certifications. Antonella has passed every AP exam she has taken with scores of 4 or 5 and was named a National AP Scholar last year. She is highly interested in STEM careers and has taken every opportunity to participate in those avenues at our high school. She is a member of our NASA HUNCH group and worked with a team to design a 3D model of the newest launch platform. Her excitement is visible when she discusses any of her STEM classes, and the more challenging a project, the more animated she becomes. Just listening to her discuss a current assignment, even when one might not understand the complexities involved, you can't help becoming just as enthused!



Antonella is one of the key members of our NASA HUNCH team at Lake Mary. This team consists of a variety of students within our manufacturing and drafting programs. They have developed parts for the Space Station and created a perfectly scaled 3D model of the newest launch platform. This participation, both during school and after, has been tantamount to her increased confidence. She can talk with anyone about these projects and is able to bring a new perspective to others. She is a role model for younger girls involved in our STEM program and the middle school students we host for camps. Guiding them has also added to her increased confidence and ability to relate to others. Congratulations to Antonella on this incredible honor!

Feature Athlete: Blaine Farrell

Blaine was nominated as the Feature Athlete by Coach Ryan Lowe. "Blaine is a true leader and a wonderful young man to have on the team. He is well-mannered, disciplined, and hard-working." As a senior at Lake Mary High School, Blaine is currently the captain of both the cross country and track teams. In cross country, he earned Second Team All-Conference Honors this year by finishing 11th in the Seminole Athletic Conference. Additionally in track, he qualified for University of Florida's Pepsi Relays meet in the 800-meter and 4x800m races his junior year and looks to repeat this accomplishment his senior year. At Lake Mary, he was selected as an AP Ambassador, is president of Lake Mary's Youth in Government club, and is involved in the Spanish Honor Society and National Honor Society. Academically, he excels in math and science, earning a 5 in AP Physics 1 and in AP Calculus BC, as well as other subjects, as he is the current valedictorian for the class of 2020. Outside of school, he works as a math tutor for Mathnasium and has volunteered with Bags of Hope, a non-profit organization, since he was eight years old. After high school, he plans on attending the United States Air Force Academy and has already been accepted.



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Counselors met with juniors in October to complete their credit checks. Students will be completing college applications at the beginning of their senior year and need to have already taken an SAT/ACT. Lake Mary High School's code number is 100883. Students should register for these tests online. When registering for the SAT/ACT, students can indicate the colleges they want their test scores sent to as this is part of the test fee. All juniors will have the opportunity to take the SAT free of charge on March 4th during our SAT school day.

Bright Futures Scholarships

All Lake Mary High School seniors will complete the online Bright Futures Scholarship application and Florida Financial Aid Form, in the beginning of December through their senior Economics or American Government class. Completion of the Florida Financial Aid Form assures that each senior's transcript will be evaluated for the Bright Futures Scholarship Program and other scholarships awarded by the state for which a student may qualify. After completing the FFAF, students will receive an email from the Florida Office of Student Financial Assistance. This email contains the student's PIN that will enable him or her to access a Bright Futures evaluation, and it also contains a listing of the scholarships for which the student is being evaluated. Please note this is not the FAFSA, which students and parents need to complete in the fall of their child's senior year to be eligible for any need based financial assistance. Transcripts will be sent to the Office of Student Financial Assistance in Tallahassee in February for the Bright Futures Scholarship initial 7th semester evaluation. Seniors' transcripts will be sent after graduation for a final evaluation for a Bright Futures Scholarship award.

There are three levels of Bright Futures Scholarships available: Florida Academic Scholars (FAS), Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS), and Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV). Requirements for each scholarship level vary. For eligibility requirements, refer to the "Bright Futures Student Handbook," available online from the Florida Department of Education's Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) at www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org/ssfad/bf/.

The FloridaShines Bright Futures Scholarship Eligibility Evaluation measures a student's progress toward meeting the requirements of a Bright Futures Scholarship. Scholarship amounts vary based on GPA, college entrance exam scores, community service hours, and other factors. The evaluation is based on information received from the student's school district and the Florida Department of Education. Any public high school student may use this free online evaluation. To get started: 1. Go to www.FloridaShines.org 2. Under the "Go to College" icon, select "Pay for College" 3. Follow the information for Bright Futures Scholarships 4. When prompted, log in with the school district, student's last name, and the Student Identifier Number (SIN). The SIN may be a 10-digit number assigned by the school or the student's SSN, followed by an X (e.g., 123456789X). 5. Once logged in, simply choose a scholarship level (e.g., Florida Medallion Scholars)

from the "My Progress" section to display an evaluation of eligibility for that scholarship level. On the right is a quick guide to interpreting the evaluation results. Students are encouraged to verify the results of the evaluation with their high school's Student Services office.

Steps to Link College Board and Khan Academy Accounts

1. Create a Khan Academy account at satpractice.org
2. When prompted, students can agree to link their Khan Academy and College Board accounts
3. Sign in to College Board account at www.collegeboard.org
4. When prompted, students click "Send" to authorize the account linking 5. Students can start practicing on Official SAT practice on Khan Academy

College Board Opportunity Scholarships

Students are eligible to earn scholarships through College Board by taking the following actions during certain windows in their junior and senior years:

- Build a College List (\$500)
- Junior Year Practice for the SAT (\$1,000)
- Junior Year and Fall Senior Year Improve Score (\$2,000)
- Spring Junior Year Strengthen College List (\$500)
- Summer and Fall Senior Year Complete the FAFSA (\$1,000)
- Fall and Winter Senior Year Apply to Colleges (\$1,000)
- Fall and Winter Senior Year Complete the Journey (\$40,000)
- Final Drawing: March 2020 Learn more about this College Board scholarship opportunity at cb.org/opportunity

Credit Reinstatement Information

Students lose credit for class once they reach the 10th unexcused absence in a semester, regardless of a passing grade. We offer the opportunity for students to reinstate their credit by making up missed time due to absences. Students will receive instructions regarding credit reinstatement from the Attendance Office. Students must attend tutoring on Tuesday and Thursday afternoon in the media center, OR they can work with their teacher for the required number of hours in order to have their credits reinstated. Documentation of tutoring is required and must be signed by a teacher or counselor that provided the tutoring to the student.

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College & Career (Mrs. Tate)

Congratulations to all the seniors who have submitted applications to colleges! The LMHS Class of 2020 already boasts acceptances to UCF, FAU, Stetson, Arizona State University, Penn State University, Texas A&M, the University of Montana, Butler University, the University of Tennessee, and the University of Alabama, among others. We can't wait to see where everyone ends up!

The College & Career Center in the Bookkeeping hallway is open for business Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays at both lunches. Come pick up brochures for your favorite college, applications to Seminole State, and information about scholarships. We also have laptops students can use to work on applications! Feel free to bring your lunch.

Seniors, remember that UF requires you send official test scores from the testing agency by December 15 and that you complete your SSAR and link it to your UF app by December 1. UCF has a merit deadline of December 1; they require an official transcript from LMHS and test scores from the testing agency. FSU will take self reported test scores in their portal as late as the December SAT or the February ACT.

Complete your FAFSA! The last FAFSA Lab is on December 4 at 5:30 PM at Hagerty High. Let experts walk you through it!

Juniors: Now is the time to start preparing for your first standardized tests if you haven't already! You will have a free school day SAT in March. Link your PSAT results to Khan Academy through the College Board and start working your way through their free test prep — you have to do the WHOLE THING to see results. 15-20 minutes a day will prep you well for March! You can also buy the book the College Board sells with free practice SATs and start practicing on those real test questions. The more familiar you are with the test, the less anxious you will be come test day.

We are wrapping up the fall college visit season with the University of Alabama on November 14. The past few months, LMHS has hosted over 65 college representatives! We hope our students have learned a lot from interacting with the colleges and hearing about schools they might not have known about otherwise. There are a lot of great choices out there!

Reminder: To make an appointment for a one-on-one meeting with Mrs. Tate, go to the Lake Mary High School website and click on the Student Services tab. From there, click on Counselors and Appointments, and then click the blue link to Make an Appointment.

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SCOIR is a college and scholarship website that helps students identify potential career strengths as well as colleges that might be a good fit. **Every student was sent an invitation to join SCOIR through their SCPS student email.** Through their email invite, students can create a free account. The site features videos about schools, tours, and resources for organizing applications. It is for grades 9-12. SAT

The SAT will be given at Lake Mary High School on Wednesday, March 4th to all 11th grade students. All students will take the SAT free of charge and do not need to register for this.

ACT/SAT

All colleges, universities, and community colleges require the SAT or ACT for admission or placement. Most colleges/universities will accept either the SAT or ACT. Lake Mary High School's code number is 100883. (Be sure to bubble the high school code on your registration form so that your scores are sent to us.)




