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A Message from the Principal

Dear Ram Families,

2020 continues to be the most challenging year in modern history, but it has also prompted creative problem solving and has forced students, staff, and families to adopt new habits and learn new skills. 2020 has pushed us to our limits, but as a result, we have found ways to adapt and overcome.

We began this school year under a cloud of uncertainty. In hopes of resuming face-to-face learning and activities, we put in place safety protocols for students attending school in person, for athletes competing on sports teams, and for students participating in extra-curricular clubs and other activities. However, we could not say with certainty that we would be able to continue these activities over an extended period of time. I am so proud of our students and staff for their success in reclaiming a sense of normalcy by adapting to our new normal by following safety procedures and protocols.

There is no doubt that we have experienced significant challenges on our journey to resume classes and extra-curriculars, but we are working through those challenges each and every day, and we remain committed to securing a positive educational environment where students can learn and grow.

In spite of uncertainty and significant obstacles, RamNation continues to see students breaking records. Recently, Sierra Poole became the first bowler in our school's history to win a state championship. Further, both our girls' and boys' cross country teams placed in the top four in regional competition, earning the opportunity to compete in the state tournament. Further, both boys and girls participating on our golf and swim teams posted impressive results in state competition. For the first time, science teachers Luther Davis and Steve DeSanto collaborated with TV Productions Logan Malmberg to create an ESPN-style live broadcast of our home football games. And speaking of football, our team finished regular-season play with only one loss and will be competing in playoff competition at home on Friday, November 20th.

Even though I am grateful for the number of successes we have experienced, I am concerned about the students who are not making appropriate academic progress. Some of our students, particularly those who are engaging in online instruction, are not keeping pace. Although there are many valid reasons why some students are underperforming, we want to support all students and families in securing a path to student success.

I ask that all parents and guardians talk to your children on a regular basis about their schoolwork and sit down together to look at Skyward and/or the SCVS platform to discuss grades and set goals for student performance. For our families with children accessing instruction over Seminole Connect, make sure your children are logged into class on time, are shown on video, and are attending to instruction for the entire class period. For our families with children accessing coursework through SCVS, check to make sure your children are making appropriate progress. Remember, all SCVS students should complete their first semester coursework by December 15th, and also, realize that you can contact SCVS teachers to discuss concerns. For our face-to-face parents, understand that students are being asked to submit most assignments through eCampus. If your child is missing assignments, this may be as much an issue of students staying organized enough to submit their assignments online as it is an issue of students failing to complete assignments.

Finally, I would like to underscore that we are all on the same team, the team that wants our students to be successful in their academic pursuits and learn the skills necessary to be prepared for post-secondary education and the world of work. This year has been challenging in that teachers, students, and families have been asked to adapt to new ways of teaching, learning, and navigating daily life. So much disruption in a short period of time

Positive Behavior Supports

At LMHS we make a concerted effort to focus on positive behaviors. We do this through an initiative known as Positive Behavior Supports (PBS). PBS offers a systematic approach to promoting a school wide culture focused on respect and positive behavior. Because students come from different backgrounds and cultures, they may view behavior in their own unique ways. When a student acts out, LMHS views it as a skill deficit; as a result, students are taught appropriate school behaviors and expectations. Consequences are still given for inappropriate behavior; however, students are also rewarded when they model citizenship.

When students go above and beyond in demonstrating excellence, they earn RAM bucks from teachers and staff. During lunch time, students can redeem hot ticket items in exchange for their RAM bucks (gift cards, free entries to events, prom tickets, etc.).

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Student Services

November 9 -November 13 we will be conducting Junior credit checks with our face to face students. November 13th will serve as a makeup day for those students that may have been missed. Detailed information will be mailed out to all Juniors soon including a course history summary sheet and a self-credit check form. Information will go out to connect students for how to schedule a WebEx or phone call credit check appointment for some time the following week (Nov 17-Nov 20).

Students will be completing college applications at the beginning of their senior year and need to have already taken an SAT/ACT. Lake Mary High School's code number is 100883. Students should register for these tests online. When registering for the SAT/ACT, students can indicate the colleges they want their test scores sent to as this is part of the test fee. All juniors will have the opportunity to take the SAT free of charge on April 13 during our SAT school day.

DUAL ENROLLMENT at SSC

Spring 2021 registration is soon approaching. **Enrollment applications and Registration forms should be sent to dualenrollment@seminolestate.edu or students can bring the forms in to their nearest campus.** Registration begins November 17th. Application and Registration forms can be found on LMHS website on the Student Services tab.

New students will need to take the PERT placement test which is currently being offered only on the Sanford Lake Mary campus or students can take the remote Accuplacer test if he or she does not have qualifying SAT or ACT test scores.

Bright Futures Scholarships

All Lake Mary High School seniors will complete the online Bright Futures Scholarship application and Florida Financial Aid Form in December through their senior Economics or American Government class. Completion of the Florida Financial Aid Form assures that each senior's transcript will be evaluated for the Bright Futures Scholarship Program and other scholarships awarded by the state for which a student may qualify. After completing the FFAF, students will receive an email from the Florida Office of Student Financial Assistance. This email contains the student's PIN that will enable him or her to access a Bright Futures evaluation, and it also contains a listing of the scholarships for which the student is being evaluated. Please note this is not the FAFSA, which students and parents need to complete in the fall of their child's senior year to be eligible for any need based financial assistance. Transcripts will be sent to the Office of Student Financial Assistance in Tallahassee in February/March for the Bright Futures Scholarship initial 7th semester evaluation. Seniors' transcripts will be sent after graduation for a final evaluation for a Bright Futures Scholarship award. There are three levels of Bright Futures Scholarships available: Florida Academic Scholars (FAS), Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS), and Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV). Requirements for each scholarship level vary.

For eligibility requirements, refer to the "Bright Futures Student Handbook," available online from the Florida Department of Education's Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) at www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org/ssfad/bf/. The FloridaShines Bright Futures Scholarship Eligibility Evaluation measures a student's progress toward meeting the requirements of a Bright Futures Scholarship. Scholarship amounts vary based on GPA, college entrance exam scores, community service hours, and other factors. The evaluation is based on information received from the student's school district and the Florida Department of Education. Any public high school student may use this free online evaluation. To get started: 1. Go to www.FloridaShines.org 2. Under the "Go to College" icon, select "Pay for College" 3. Follow the information for Bright Futures Scholarships 4. When prompted, log in with the school district, student's last name, and the Student Identifier Number (SIN). The SIN may be a 10-digit number assigned by the school or the student's SSN, followed by an X (e.g., 123456789X). 5. Once logged in, simply choose a scholarship level (e.g., Florida Medallion Scholars from the "My Progress" section to display an evaluation of eligibility for that scholarship level. On the right is a quick guide to interpreting the evaluation results. Students are encouraged to verify the results of the evaluation with their high school's Student Services office.

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
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Media Center Update

Testing

SAT Results: Results for the SAT that was taken on Wednesday, October 14th should be available online by November 12th. Students can create a College Board account at www.collegeboard.org. If students have any issues in signing up for an account, they can contact College Board for additional help. Students can set up a College Board account at www.collegeboard.org and can link their account to Khan Academy where they have access to official SAT practice items.

SAT: The SAT will be given at Lake Mary High School on Tuesday, April 13th to all 11th grade students. All students will take the SAT free of charge and do not need to register for this.

ACT/SAT: All colleges, universities, and community colleges require the SAT or ACT for admission or placement. Most colleges/universities will accept both the SAT or ACT. Lake Mary High School's code number is 100883. (Be sure to bubble the high school code on your registration form so that your scores are sent to us.)

Bowling

LMHS Students Commit to Wearing Masks Safely

Following are the CDC recommendations for how to safely wear a mask:

- Wash your hands before putting on your mask
- Put it over your nose and mouth and secure it under your chin. Try to fit it snugly against the sides of your face
- Make sure you can breathe easily
- CDC does not recommend use of masks for source control if they have an exhalation valve or vent
- Don't put the mask around your neck or up on your forehead
- Don't touch the mask, and, if you do, wash your hands or use hand sanitizer to disinfect

And here's what to do after school:

- Handle only by the ear loops or ties
- Fold outside corners together
- Place mask in the washing machine
- Be careful not to touch your eyes, nose, and mouth when removing and wash hands immediately after removing.
