The sixth grade Language Arts students have continued learning about essay writing and had their second practice writing assessment. The Writing FSA is quickly approaching and students are feeling confident in their writing! Students also read Medusa's Head and Yeh-Shen: A Cinderella Story from China, focusing on plot, theme/central idea, and characters responding to change throughout a story. As a final assessment, students had the opportunity to write their own Greek myth or fairy tale to share with their classmates. It's always fun to hear their personalities shine in their creative writing!

7th Grade

6th Grade

During the month of January, students in seventh grade Language Arts started the quarter with argumentative essay writing. They focused not only on choosing a side of an argument, but using transitions, a variety of elaborations and a counterclaim to prove their point. This was in preparation for the FSA writing portion in the spring. The students also wrapped up a unit based on the "Triangle Factory Fire." The pieces used helped our students understand historical fiction and the author's point of view. As we move further into the quarter, we look forward to focusing on poetry and preparing students for the FSA with standards-based questions and more writing prompts.

8th Grade

Eighth graders started off this semester focusing on selected works by Mark Twain. We analyzed an excerpt from Tom Sawyer concentrating on theme and a nonfiction piece, Advice to Youth, analyzing Twain's use of satire. Students continued to take mini benchmark assessments targeting specific skills and test- taking strategies. We will continue to refine our skills of characterization, plot, central idea and theme through our next selections centered on historical fiction and nonfiction. The next writing assessment is right around the corner and students continued to polish their writing skills through various formal and informal writing assessments in class. Thank you for your support and as always, continue checking eCampus for a current list of assignment due dates as well as Skyward.

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Mathematics- Mrs. Misty Naran

Happy New Year, Panthers! It's business as usual in the Math department. With the first semester behind us, we continue to learn new concepts and skills while still practicing those previously mastered. Based on results from our most recent EOQ, teachers are able to focus on standards that were most frequently missed and plan forward. The FSA will be here before we know it. Students will take three sections of this computer based Math assessment. Encourage your child to do their best! ALL CONCEPTS taught up to that point will be considered "fair game!"

Our Math Club is looking for some competitive students to represent LCMS at the county wide competition in April of this year. You do not have to be the smartest student in math or even get straight A's. One simply needs to have a love of math. If interested, please see your teacher.


As we are approaching EOC and FSA exams take advantage of the review and practice materials available through your textbooks online and Math Nation. Khan Academy is also a great resource for additional support outside of class. Please see your teacher if you need help finding these materials

Science- Mrs. Terra Nystrom

In 6th grade the students have been learning about the processes that shape Earth's surface. Students started third quarter investigating some of the physical and chemical properties of Earth's layers from the lithosphere to the inner core. Using this context, they reviewed and applied previous studies on states of matter and density to better understand why the Earth's interior varies and how heat moves through the Earth. They then moved on to studying the rock cycle and learning about how geologists use their understanding of rock formations to make inferences about Earth's history. The end of this quarter will include the theory of plate tectonics and the role of plate movement in moving rock material through the Earth and shaping its surface.

In 7th grade the students have been studying atoms and the periodic table of elements as a review. They then compared atoms vs. cells and their place in the hierarchy of living things. Students have also been investigating the differences between plant and animal cells, cell organelles/functions, and cellular respiration vs. photosynthesis. Toward the end of the quarter, the students will be studying energy transformations, the Law of Conservation of Energy, and types of energy.

In 8th grade the students have been discussing the various levels of organization of living things, with a review of how atoms make up cells, cells make up tissues, tissues make up organs, and a focus on how organ systems overlap and combine to create fully complex organisms. The students investigated each of the major organ systems found in human beings, and discussed both the components of those systems and their functions within the body. The students participated in many lab activities about the body systems, including dissecting the eye to better understand its anatomy and function.

4 FROM OUR CURRICULUM LEADERS

Social Studies- Mrs. Joan Illemsky & Mrs. Jennifer Capp 8th Grade U.S. History

During the third quarter, students in their Social Studies classes will continue to explore, analyze, explain and distinguish content that is both challenging and intriguing. In 8th grade, students are examining the foundations of our system of government and how the experiences of pre-Revolutionary War colonial America impacted the development of the United States Constitution. Students will consider how this amazing document has managed to survive and adapt to changing conditions for more than 200 years. Students are also analyzing the rights guaranteed by the Bill of Rights and comparing those rights enjoyed by U.S. citizens with the rights of citizens in other parts of the world. This quarter, eighth graders also examining the issues faced by some of our early presidents and how similar issues are being grappled with today. As they say, history repeats.

7th Grade Civics

The 2nd Semester will be an exciting one for our 7th grade Panthers. Students will use what they learned about Florida's government on our field trip to Tallahassee as they compare and contrast the federal and state governments. They will hone their political skills and build supportive relationships with their classmates when they take on the role of Senators in the LCMS Senate by writing and passing bills that they have written. In addition, they will study the Judicial Branch and examine how the Supreme Court arrived at its decisions in several landmark Supreme Court Cases including *Marbury v. Madison* and *Brown v. Board of Education*. Students will continue to build on their vocabulary as they work with the primary sources of government through the Library of Congress. As in the first semester, students will be taking a 3rd quarter exam which will lead to the End of Course exam which will be given in May.

6th Grade World History

During the third nine weeks, the 6th grade students began by studying the history of the Israelites, the world's oldest monotheistic religion. We then ventured into ancient Greece and their way of life, wars, and culture. Finally, we closed out the quarter with the Romans and the development of the first great republic. We studied several primary and secondary source documents on the Citizenship in Athens and Rome as part of the DBQ project. The students now better understand how ancient civilizations such as Greece and Rome contributed to the infrastructure of our own government and society. We are looking forward to the last quarter when we will learn more about the fall of Rome, Christianity, and the Americas.

Spanish Beginning and Spanish 1 (High School Credit) – Mrs. Concepción Cranston

We have a great group of Spanish language learners here at Lawton Chiles! Students in both Beginning Spanish and Spanish 1 classes.

Beginning Spanish learners are slowly becoming familiar with the Florida World Languages Standards and the languages modes of communication. So far, students have been focusing of Interpersonal Communication by exchanging ideas orally and in writing. Students have learned the names and sounds of vowels and

consonants of the Spanish alphabet, and now they can pronounce and spell words in Spanish. Students are now able to greet people, introduce ourselves and exchange personal information such as name and origin, and use farewells in Spanish using culturally appropriate gestures. Students have also learned to talk about classroom objects in Spanish and to use classroom expressions to communicate their classroom needs.

Spanish 1 students began the New Year learning how to describe and compare clothing and shoes and to compare prices. They also learned about the famous market of Chichicastenango in Guatemala, traditional Guatemalan clothing and the worry dolls.

Students continued learning Spanish words and expressions to be able to talk about meals, food and beverages and to express the degrees of likes and dislikes in the context of Peruvian culture and traditions. Students used the languages lab to practice listening comprehension and speaking skills.

Students in Reading classes have worked all year reading and analyzing challenging and interesting fiction and non-fiction texts. Students' practice the skills research has shown to make them better readers, including predicting, questioning, clarify and summarizing as they read. It is important that all students try and read 20 minutes a night to build their endurance, expand their horizons, and enjoy connecting to books and articles they find interesting.

This is the second year Chiles is utilizing iReady to practice skills and track progress toward learning gains. Students using iReady need to log 45 minutes per week and do their best on the lessons. The programs can be accessed at home through ePassport, "The Portal." Lessons are set at students' current reading levels and are designed to help students reach their growth goals. Reading teachers meet regularly with students for data chats so please ask your students to share their results with you—they continue to make great progress! On January 30th, we celebrated students who made gains on their midyear diagnostic with a Level Up Party! Congratulations to all students who are making progress with their reading skills.





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FROM THE FRONT DESK...THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW...

Early Dismissal Of Students

When signing a student out early, you must be present (no prior phone calls), **show a picture ID and SIGN your child out**. We will then start the process of releasing your child from class. Please allow at least a 20 minute wait and plan accordingly for appointments, **especially at dismissal time.** Students **will not** be called out of class after **3:30 P.M.** (**2:30 P.M.** on Wednesdays). Please make an effort to schedule appointments, etc. around the school day.

Only those **listed** on the front office card will be allowed to sign your child out. Please list all possible relatives, friends, and older siblings that may pick up your child. Remember that emergency cards and front office cards are updated each school year – last year's cards are not valid. If a different situation arises, **a note signed and dated by the parent/guardian along with a photo copy of your Driver's License** is required to release a student. If any additions or changes need to be made to your student's card, please be sure to contact the front office.

Item Drop Off

A large part of middle school is helping our students become independent. We ask that parents refrain from dropping off forgotten items to the front office (homework, PE clothes, projects etc.). We know there are occasional emergencies and we will work with those on an individual basis. At no time should a parent be delivering food or beverages to the student during the school day nor should delivery services be used to provide food or beverage during the school day. If a student forgets their lunch, they just need to let an adult know and our Café manager will ensure they are properly fed.

Messages

Any messages to students need to be received by the office no later than 3:00 p.m. (2:00 pm on Wednesday). All messages are delivered at the beginning of each period. Please make every attempt to discuss transportation issues with your child **prior to the start of the school day.** Please have a contingency plan in place (example, rainy day transportation changes, father and/or mother day pick up, students picking up/or not picking up younger siblings, etc.)

Late Arrivals

If tardy, a parent must come in with their child to sign in with the time, reason, and parent signature. If parent cannot come in, the child must have a signed note from the parent with the reason. A doctor's note is acceptable. Students arriving after 9:10 am must check in at the Administrative Center, Bldg. 1, before going to their classes. A pass will be issued to the student. The student must present this pass to enter class. Students are expected to

be in class and in their seats before the tardy bell rings at 9:15am. Tardy policy will be enforced and consequences will be provided as necessary.

Student Pick Up & Drop Off Procedures

At Lawton Chiles, our first priority is to maintain a safe and orderly environment. Please adhere to the following procedures:

- Car riders are to be dropped off and picked up at the Sanctuary
 Drive entrance car ramp ONLY. Please do not drop students
 off on the bus ramp as this may delay our busses. Also,
 please do not drop students off at the 419 entrance to the
 school. Signs alerting visitors to this procedure are posted at
 the entrance to the bus ramp. Please follow the directions of
 staff on duty.
- Please do not park on the pick-up ramp and exit your car. If you must exit your car for any reason, please park in a parking space.
- To ensure the safety of our students during arrival and dismissal times please use additional caution when driving on to campus. The posted speed limit is 15 miles per hour. Please look twice for students and staff members while allowing them to cross the road when it is safe.
- 4. For those students riding a school bus students may ride ONLY their assigned bus. Students will not be permitted to ride home with a friend unless an EMERGENCY situation arises. Emergency situations do not include sleepovers, the desire to play with a friend, or needing to work on a project. In order to receive an EMERGENCY bus pass, EACH student is required to have a note written and signed by parents. The note will need to be delivered to the Dean for POSSIBLE approval.


Visitors/Dividends

A note will still be required when your child returns. Please be sure your child is on time for school. A daily attendance record is kept and both tardies and absences are recorded.
