Language Arts- Dr. Stacey Smith-Davis & Mrs. Alyssa Rose

Our school year was off to an interesting start as we completed a unit on Fears and Phobias. Through these lessons, students focused on identifying theme, central idea, and tone. They compared the theme and tone of the short story, "The Ravine," with the poem, "Life Doesn't Frighten Me." We then moved into non-fiction articles to learn more about fears and phobias - what they are and how they are different. Please ask your child: Is fear real or imagined? This was the guiding question that students had to answer by collecting and ranking evidence from two sources. Through this activity, students planned and drafted an essay in preparation for their first WriteScore assessment. The results of this assessment will guide teachers as we plan and prepare future writing lessons.

Throughout the first months of school, students in seventh grade Language Arts worked tirelessly to further sharpen their writing skills through in-class lessons and independent practice. The texts and standards focused on in class were theme and central idea using such texts as "The Flight of Icarus" and various Disney/PIXAR shorts. Students were able to devise a theme statement and analyze the development of plot structure through these texts. We started reading S.E. Hinton's classic novel, The Outsiders. Through the text of the novel, teachers are able to extend the lessons of the Florida standards and apply reading comprehension techniques and higher-level thinking questions to students. Students may find it beneficial to have their own copy of the novel to read in class and at home. It is not required to have the book, but in the past, it has seemed helpful to our students to have a copy of this novel. We look forward to having high-level discussions about the implications of your choices based on the themes of the novel.

The 8th Grade Language Arts Department during the months of August and September began its academic journey in preparing our students with our Frameworks curriculum standards for Quarter 1. Students began the year by analyzing a classic short story, "Marigolds," by Eugenia Collier. Students continued this analysis of the coming of age theme with excerpts from Maya Angelou's I Know Why the Caged Birds Sings and "The Scarlet Ibis," by James Hurst. Students also began to learn how to better analyze poetry and write academic responses to literature. In addition to prose and analysis, students began a nonfiction examination of informational texts with a heavy focus on the authors' use of evidence, elaboration and argumentation strategies. Outside of the class, students were encouraged to continue reading high interest independent novels. In addition to reading, students had the opportunity to practice writing for the Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) essay component. On a final note, students are continually encouraged to use eCampus and Skyward on a daily basis. With high school around the corner, please continue to encourage your rising high schooler to seek help if needed. We would like to collectively thank all of our students for their continued efforts and wish them the best of luck this coming school year!

These sites are very student friendly and provide additional resources to use; such as, lesson tutorials, practice tests, and much more. Algebra and Geometry students also have access to Math Nation, which provides more examples and opportunities for students to practice EOC style questions. The Math teachers are here to support you and your



student. Most teachers are available to help individual students before or after school, Please contact your child's math teacher for more information. Finally, we will be forming competition teams for all grade levels. These teams will meet during homeroom and compete in the spring with other county middle schools. Science- Mrs. Terra Nystrom

Sixth grade students have been studying the hierarchy of matter and examining the chemical and physical properties of elements as determined by their subatomic particles. The unit began with a study on the contributions made to the atomic theory by scientists throughout history and then moved into atomic parts and understanding how elements are the "building blocks" that make up everything. Students then examined the relationships among atoms, elements, molecules. compounds, mixtures, and solutions.

Seventh grade students have been working on experimental design and creating experiment posters. They then moved on to the Change Over Time unit, where they learned about physical and chemical weathering, physical and chemical properties and changes in matter, the law of conservation of mass, and how the rates of chemical reactions can be altered.

Eighth grade students have been studying motion, forces, and energy, and how these three concepts interrelate. The students used Vernier Probeware to track their movements using motion sensors and applied this knowledge to graphing distance versus time. They examined how balanced and unbalanced net forces can alter the motions of objects. Students also discussed kinetic energy and potential energy and how the energy types transform as an object moves. Advanced and gifted 8th graders continue to work on their science fair projects. Starting in October, the students should begin their experiments and collect their data. Please help your student stay on top of their due dates.

Social Studies- Mrs. Joan Illemsky & Mrs. Jennifer Capp

As the midpoint of the first quarter passes, our students have adjusted wonderfully to the routines and coursework of a new year. All grade levels have maintained the focus on building students' academic vocabulary and developing each student's ability to work and learn in a cooperative learning environment.

In 8th grade, students examined how the first Americans adapted to their environments. Students identified why Europeans explored and established settlements in the Americas. Students then focused their attention on the English colonies in North America. They considered the similarities and differences among these colonies. In the pre-AP classes, the students examined multiple documents in an attempt to answer the question: Why did so many Jamestown colonists die?

Our 7th grade students are enjoying the Civics curriculum. Civics students started the year learning about United States citizenship. They enjoyed learning how they became U.S. citizens either through birth or their parents and they learned that not all their peers are citizens. Students are now aware of the responsibilities and obligations of citizens. If you have a jury duty experience, they would love to hear about it! We then turned our focus to political parties and our first Document Based Question Activity for the year. Students enjoyed working with primary source documents and historical campaign data. The first Nine Week Exam will be given in early October.

Our 6th grade students have begun studying the World History curriculum. First, they began with a review of basic geography skills, which will continue to be utilized as students examine different periods of world history. They also examined what history is and why it is important to study history. Students learned who early humans were and how civilizations first began. Our semester will end with students studying the first river civilization, Mesopotamia, along with our first DBQ of the year. This research activity and essay is related to Hammurabi Code. Looking forward to 2th second quarter, we will be studying the ancient civilizations of India, China, and Egypt.

Students participating in the National History Day competition this year will tackle the theme of Breaking Barriers in History. They have spent time researching possible topics for their project. Topic choices are as varied as the students themselves. They have also made the important decision of whether or not they will work with partners and, if so, who those partners will be. The next step is to begin drafting the thesis statement for the project and then research, research, research.

Physical Education- Mrs. Patricia O'Neil

Students have been working from moderate to vigorous conditioning activities. While in motion, classes are exploring fitness-related and health related skills components. It is the goal of the Physical Education department for students to understand the importance of physical fitness while students are identifying movement skills.

Some housekeeping notes: remind students they are responsible for dressing out daily, participating in class activities and to work to increase personal knowledge of skills. It is the student's responsibility to keep their items secure in their locker. LCMS is not responsible for lost items. Students need to speak with any physical education teacher for assistance or concerns. Uniforms may be purchased online at 'My School Bucks' on the LCMS website. Keep an eye out for our Dry-Fit t-shirts we will be adding to our uniform options.

Classes engage students in activities which are sequenced with appropriate skill progression in football, tennis, kickball, hockey and volleyball. Focus of class units concentrate on game rules, cooperative learning skills and development of movement components. Student development works to increase flexibility, muscular strength and muscular endurance. These components are enhanced with activities to create speed, agility, balance and coordination. The physical education department will begin Pacer testing after Thanksgiving to measure student growth in the Fitness and Health related components. All teachers have the Pacer audio in their ecampus and can be downloaded for student/family engagement.

Spanish Language Learners – Mrs. Cranston

Bienvenidos/Welcome! We have a great group of Spanish language learners here at Lawton Chiles! Students in both Beginning Spanish and Spanish 1 classes have been successfully engaging in conversations in Spanish since the beginning of the school year! Our first goal was to be able to greet people, introduce ourselves and exchange personal information such as name and origin, and use farewells in Spanish using culturally appropriate gestures. Students wrote their first dialogue using the vocabulary and expressions that they had learned, and later performed it for their class. Students enjoyed the creativity and enthusiasm of their classmates as they presented their dialogues, and at the end, we all celebrated success with a big round of applause!

Spanish learners are slowly becoming familiar with the Florida World Languages Standards and the language modes of communication. So far, we have been focusing on Interpersonal Communication by exchanging ideas orally and in writing.

Students have learned the names and sounds of vowels and consonants of the Spanish alphabet, and now they can pronounce and spell words in Spanish. This bolsters their self-confidence, energizes them and increases their success in learning Spanish.

Spanish students have also learned to talk about classroom objects in Spanish and to use classroom expressions to communicate their classroom needs, and they can ask someone for their phone number, their birth date, the date and the time and respond to those questions when someone asks that information of them.

Technology- Mrs. Barbara Miller

- 6th, 7th, and 8th graders will take one of the following semester long computer courses:
- 6th grade: iChallenge (Mr. Smock)
- 7th grade: iJourney (Mr. Thomas)
- 8th grade: iConnect (Mr. Jackson & Mrs. Miller)

Students will engage in online lessons, as well as face-to-face instruction. The courses are accessed through eCampus. Students will have the opportunity to earn their IC3 Certifications at the completion of iJourney and iConnect. All three courses offer UCertify Certifications. iJourney fulfills the state required Career & Education Planning component. iConnect is for high school credit and satisfies the .5 virtual credit graduation requirement.

Reading- Mrs. Elizabeth Darcy

Did you know that reading skills can improve student performance in all core content areas? Students taking Reading can expect to increase their proficiency by at least one grade level, and those students that are highly motivated can improve beyond one years' worth of growth. One tool Reading teachers use is i-Ready. Students taking Reading have completed their first i-Ready diagnostic for this school year. The diagnostic scores provide specific information to teachers, students, and families about areas that students can work to improve their skills. Students have developed goals and action steps based on their i-Ready diagnostic. Please ask them about their goals. Teachers use this information to design lessons and create teacher-led station rotations to focus on interventions to help students increase their competence and confidence in reading comprehension and vocabulary. Students are required to complete 45 minutes of Reading in i-Ready per week and they can access the program from home through the Portal. Reading teachers also require students to read for pleasure- any text of their choice- and complete logs to document what they have read. Reading regularly (20-30 minutes per night) helps students to improve fluency and comprehension. Good readers often predict, question, clarify, and summarize what they read. Please ask them questions along these lines to help students practice these reading strategies regularly. Students will take a second i-Ready diagnostic in December to determine their growth and create new goals and action plans.

From The Front Desk...Things You Should Know...

EARLY DISMISSAL:

When signing a student out early, you must be present (no prior phone calls), **show a picture ID and SIGN your child out.** We will then start the process of releasing your child from class. Please allow at least a 20 minute wait and plan accordingly for appointments, **especially at dismissal time.** Students will not be called out of class after **3:30 P.M.** (**2:30 P.M.** on Wednesdays). Please make an effort to schedule appointments, etc. around the school day.

Only those **listed** on the front office card will be allowed to sign your child out. Please list all possible relatives, friends, and older siblings that may pick up your child. Remember that emergency cards and front office cards are updated each school year – last year's cards are not valid. If a different situation arises, **a note signed and dated by the parent/** guardian along with a photo copy of your Driver's License is required to release a student. If any additions or changes need to be made to your student's card, please be sure to contact the front office. Students cannot be released to leave early without the presence and signature of an authorized adult.

ITEM DROP OFF:

A large part of middle school is helping our students become independent. We ask that parents refrain from dropping off forgotten items to the front office (homework, PE clothes, projects etc.). We know there are occasional emergencies and we will work with those on an individual basis. **At no time** should a parent be delivering **food or beverages** to the student during the school day nor should delivery services be used to provide food or beverage during the school day. If a student forgets their lunch, they just need to let an adult know and our Café manager will ensure they are properly fed.

MESSAGES:

Any messages to students need to be received by the office no later than 3:00 p.m. (2:00 pm on Wednesday). All messages are delivered at the beginning of each period. Please make every attempt to discuss transportation issues with your child **prior to the start of the school day.** Please have a contingency plan in place (example, rainy day transportation changes, father and/or mother day pick up, students picking up/or not picking up younger siblings, etc.)

LATE ARRIVALS:

If tardy, a parent must come in with their child to sign in with the time, reason, and parent signature. If parent cannot come in, the child must have a signed note from the parent with the reason. A doctor's note is acceptable. Students arriving after 9:10 am must check in at the Administrative Center, Bldg. 1, before going to their classes. A pass will be issued to the student. The student must present this pass to enter class. Students are expected to be in class and in their seats before the tardy

bell rings at 9:15am. Tardy policy will be enforced and consequences will be provided as necessary.

STUDENT PICK UP & DROP OFF PROCEDURES:

At Lawton Chiles, our first priority is to maintain a safe and orderly environment. Please adhere to the following procedures:

- Car riders are to be dropped off and picked up at the Sanctuary Drive entrance car ramp ONLY. Please do not drop students off on the bus ramp as this may delay our busses. Also, please do not drop students off at the 419 entrance to the school. Signs alerting visitors to this procedure are posted at the entrance to the bus ramp. Please follow the directions of staff on duty.
- 2. Please do not park on the pick-up ramp and exit your car. If you must exit your car for any reason, please park in a parking space.
- 3. To ensure the safety of our students during arrival and dismissal times please use additional caution when driving on to campus. The posted speed limit is 15 miles per hour. Please look twice for students and staff members while allowing them to cross the road when it is safe.
- 4. For those students riding a school bus students may ride ONLY their assigned bus. Students will not be permitted to ride home with a friend unless an EMERGENCY situation arises. Emergency situations do not include sleepovers, the desire to play with a friend, or needing to work on a project. In order to receive an EMERGENCY bus pass, EACH student is required to have a note written and signed by parents. The note will need to be delivered to Mr. Linquist for POSSIBLE approval.

VISITORS/DIVIDENDS:

All visitors must report to the front office to sign in and get a name tag before going on to any other location on campus. Students are not allowed to bring visiting friends or guests to school to spend the day at any time. For special circumstances or questions, please contact Mrs. Emerson in the front office, 407-871-7050.

EXCUSED ABSENCES:

Students are required to bring a written note from a parent or guardian and turn it to either the Front Office or their first period teacher when they return to school after being absent. Phone calls are not acceptable. If a child will be absent for a length of time, please contact attendance and/or teachers to let us know the situation so homework, etc. can be arranged. A note will still be required when your child returns. Please be sure your child is on time for school. A daily attendance record is kept and both tardies and absences are recorded.

PLANNERS:

One of the best sources of LCMS information will be found in the student planner. All students received a planner during the first week of school. Please encourage your student to use their planner every day.

Skyward, eCampus, and ePassport

Skyward, eCampus, ePassport what is my child talking about? Skyward is the official grade book where all grades are entered. This will show each child's grades as well as any missing assignments. To receive Skyward access, please fill out the Family Access form which is located in the Parents/Skyward section of LCMS website. Please bring the completed form along with your photo ID to the front office, as we are only able to provide access to parents/ guardians with custody. We will then send you your Skyward username and password via email. If your child is coming from an elementary school to LCMS, your login carries over. Your child will login to SCPS computers using their student ID. They will create their own password within the first two weeks of school. At home students will login to The Portal https://www.scps.k12.fl.us (top righthand corner) to access eCampus courses, Skyward, online textbooks, Office365, etc. Every course at LCMS has an eCampus page. eCampus courses have all of the students' assignments on the calendar, a syllabus, course information, etc. You too can have access to your child's eCampus courses and view when you child's assignments are due. Visit http:// www.lcms.scps.k12.fl.us/Parents.aspx and click on sign up for eCampus here. There's also additional tech information on Office 365, ePassport and more. Did you know your child has access to Office365 on up to 5 devices?
