ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL, CURRICULUM & INSTRUCTION

This is a very busy and exciting time of year for students and parents. For seniors, the reality of graduation is approaching. For underclassmen, we are beginning to think about important assessments and picking classes for next year. All students will receive a "DRAFT" copy of the course request sheet for next year. Counselors will meet with students and explain the scheduling process. The students have the opportunity to take these forms home and discuss course selection with their families and mentors. Students can use these forms to assist them when scheduling one on one with their counselor. Students will begin meeting with counselor's right after spring break.

Good attendance is very important with state assessments coming up. Leading up to assessments teachers have important instruction and review activities to prepare students to be successful on these important assessments. You can find a document with testing dates on the school website. Students will receive testing passes with specific information about their testing dates and locations. FSA Writing tests will take place during the first week of April. The remainder of testing will occur in May. FSA Reading tests will take place in the beginning of May followed by US History EOC, Biology EOC, Algebra 1 EOC and Geometry EOC respectively. May will finish with underclassmen final exams through May 30th. It is important that students arrive to school on time daily.

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ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

As we complete the third quarter of the 2018-2019 school year, the English department would like to focus on the newly adopted program our 9th and 10th grade English/Intensive Reading teachers are using in their classrooms. This school year, students were introduced to Read 180, a program to help struggling readers who are reading below grade level. Read 180 provides a combination of digital media with traditional classroom instruction, although "traditional" is not so "traditional". While it does contain whole-group instruction and whole-group wrap-up, it also contains small-group rotations. These rotations involve a teacher-lead small group session, an independent reading session, as well as a small group session using an adaptive computer application. All of the classrooms were provided with laptops to implement this program to the fullest! Our ultimate goal is to see fluency and comprehension gains, which will benefit the students as they prepare for their upcoming FSA exam. All 9th and 10th graders will be taking the FSA Writing exam the first week in April, followed by the FSA Reading exam the beginning of May.

WORLD LANGUAGES, FINE ARTS, AND MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Any parents looking for inexpensive ways to get their kids to practice their bilingual skills outside of the classroom might consider instituting a Foreign Language Movie Night in their household. Far from being a meaningless distraction, foreign movies contain intellectual riches the likes of which are not normally found in domestic films. For example, foreign films often show us a slice of everyday life in another country as well as how to use the target language in authentic ways. In addition to this, many movies made outside of the Unites States often feature different styles of storytelling than Americans may be used to. French movies, for starters, are famous for their open-endings that leave it up to the viewers to decide what might happen next to the characters. With smaller budgets and fewer special effects to lean upon, foreign directors frequently have to think of different ways to keep their viewers engaged.

The best part, though, of creating a Foreign Language Movie Night is the potential cost savings. The Collier County Public Library system has a vast catalogue of foreign movies, all available, of course, free to any cardholders. A couple delightful titles to get started in French include "Le diner des cons" (The Dinner Game) and "Les Compères" (Comdads). Happy viewing!





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SCIENCE DEPARTMENT: OUR UNIQUE SQUIRREL.

When I first moved down here in July, I took notice of a squirrel that lives near my home. It had a different, lighter, coloration and seemed to be a bit larger than the gray squirrels I was used to back in New Jersey. At the time, I thought it was just an off colored gray squirrel. It was not until recently I learned it was a fox squirrel. Very specifically, Big Cypress Fox Squirrel, Sciurus niger avicennia, a threatened and protected species that lives in southern parts of Florida.

You may have seen a fox squirrel, right here at Lely High in the courtyard. While she seems friendly, it is very important not to feed her or pet her. She is a wild animal and most likely, what you are having for lunch is not part of her natural diet of nuts, seeds, fungi, fruit and buds. Feeding wild animals is never a good idea. It makes them lose their natural fear of us. It may cause an overcrowding, particularly with birds, which increases the chances of disease spreading. They may turn aggressive when we do not have food to offer them.


So next time you see the fox squirrel be sure to admire her from a distance.

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
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CTE NEWS

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
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






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ASPIRATIONS IN COMPUTING AWARD
