Principal's Message

Welcome back students and parents. Even with a couple of days off of school due to Hurricane Idalia, the Lemon Bay staff is excited for the 2023-2024 school year and we are off to a great start.

The staff had a great six days of preparation for the 23-24 school year and once again our focus this year is based on a question we pose to all our students.

"Are you working toward graduating on time, career ready?"

It is our goal that students come to school each day with this question in mind and it is my expectation that our Lemon Bay staff prepares each day to help students achieve this goal. To help students achieve this goal, we are providing each student with a planner. We hope that students will bring the planner with them each day to record their daily assignments and homework.

Student safety is our number one concern and I know it is yours as well. As a reminder:

- Students are required to wear ID badges every day to school. We ask for your help in reminding them to wear them to school every day.
- General student access to campus starts at 6:40am.

- Student drop-off for all students should only take place in front of the school.

Principal's Message

- I am sure you are aware, CCPS has a new policy regarding electronic device use during instructional time. As a reminder:
- Students are not permitted to use electronic devices such as cell phones or ear buds during instructional time.
- Instructional time is defined as "bell to bell" (when class starts and finishes).
- Students must keep their cell phone in their backpack, purse, or pocket during instructional time.
- Students are able to use electronic devices during the fiveminute change of class as well as at lunch.

Here are some helpful suggestions for a successful year.

- ATTENDANCE, ATTENDANCE ATTENDANCE.... Studies have found that students attending school daily have greater success in school and are more likely to graduate. Teachers prepare lessons for each school day and students attending school regularly will be able to keep up with the progression of learning in the classroom.
- Access FOCUS weekly to monitor your child's current grades and attendance. Students will have classwork and homework that will help them prepare for the tests they will take in each of their classes to show learning is occurring. If students start to fall behind, it can be very difficult to catch up. Lemon Bay is currently offering tutoring for one-hour (2:30 – 3:30) Monday through Thursday.
- Access FOCUS to learn the results of the accountability tests your child may be taking throughout the year. On all exams, level 3 and above represent proficiency, while levels 1 and 2 indicate your child did not earn a proficient score. Remember that the 10th grade FSA and the Algebra I EOC

are the only two tests students are required to pass in order to earn a high school diploma. If your child did not earn a proficient score on either of those tests, know that they will have multiple opportunities to be re-tested. However, you should discuss with your child a plan for improving their test score. If you need assistance with this task, please make an appointment with your child's guidance counselor.

- Encourage your child to get involved in extra-curricular activities. He or she could join a club, try out for a sport, or participate in band, chorus, theater, or NJROTC. Involvement in sports, activities, and clubs will help students feel more a part of the high school and data has shown that students who are involved in high school have better attendance and grades. We had a great club day for students on Friday, Sept. 1st and hopefully your child was able to find a club they were interested in being part of.
- Finally, speak with your children about actively engaging in their education. If they have questions or feel they are falling behind in class, they should speak up and ask for help. If your children have questions about graduation requirements, they should schedule an appointment to talk with a counselor. If your child has concerns about safety issues, they need to approach an administrator. My door is always open to students, and so are the doors of all members of our administrative team. We want to know if our students, or parents, have concerns, so that we can work together to resolve those concerns.

The entire staff is looking forward to a great school year.

Student conflicts occur on any high school campus. Those conflicts typically result in a difference of opinions. Overcoming differences and embracing diversity is what we believe makes Lemon Bay High School a great school for our students. Our students strive to support each other and demonstrate kindness and compassion. Our school district and school take a strong stand to ensure bullying behaviors do not occur. Keep in the mind, the following "RIP" acronym if you are unsure if bullying is occurring and should be reported:

- **R** = Repeated (occurs more than once)
- I = Imbalance of Power (is the victim perceived as younger, weaker, less smart, or less socially accepted)
- **P** = Purposeful (it was deliberate or intended, not accidental)

What is Bullying? Bullying, which includes cyberbullying, occurs when a person or group of people repeatedly hurt, embarrass, or frighten another person. Cyberbullying means bullying through the use of technology or any electronic communication regardless of whether the bullying occurs on or off school grounds. Examples of cyberbullying include but are not limited to: text/ instant messaging, e-mails, creation of a webpage impersonating another person and/or other electronic means through the internet.

Bullying is not:

- An altercation between equals
- Good natured playful teasing among equals or peers
- An isolated incident

You can report a bully situation on our school's website using the "Report Bullying" button. You can also talk to an Assistant Principal about a situation you feel needs reported. Remember, we are here to help!

Ms. Reid's Biology and Environmental classes completed the rainbow test tube lab to help us learn how to use lab equipment properly and practice using the metric system.



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


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Charlotte Technical College Electrical Class at LBHS

The purpose of this program's curriculum is to prepare students for employment in the electrical contracting industry. The cluster of competencies in the Electrical program focuses on broad, transferable skills and stresses the understanding of most aspects of the electrical industry. Upon completion of the following: OCP A Electrician Helper, OCP B Residential Electrician, and OCP C Commercial Electrician: students will have the knowledge and skills to find full-time employment in their respected industry.

This course is currently running for two class periods at Lemon Bay High School.

The first period class is brand new to the program and being introduced to basic construction skills and basic electricity. There are hands on and group projects throughout the coursework. Life skills are also implemented as the class learns their "job-site" roles in the classroom and what that would look like in a job-site setting.

The second period class is being introduced to electrical circuits and also has the same hands on and group projects as the first period class.

It is awesome to be a part of this new program and share these important life skills with the students!

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
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Marine **Conservation Club**
