IMMUNIZATIONS FOR RISING 7TH GRADERS

Florida Statute requires that all students entering 7th grade have the **Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis)** and all other required immunizations. <u>Proof of immunization must be provided to</u> the school prior to your child starting 7th grade. In order to pick up your child's schedule and digital device for the 2019/2020 school year, we must have received your child's <u>immunization</u> record (form DH680).

Don't wait until next fall! Please bring a copy of your child's immunization record (form DH680) to the school's front office as soon as possible.

Please plan ahead if your child does need an immunization. You can get immunizations free of charge at the Orange County Health Department at 832 West Central Blvd., Orlando, FL 32805. You may also get the immunization at your doctor's office, or any walk-in/urgent care clinic.

CLUBS & ORGANIZATIONS

Youth in Government:

The following students attended the 14th annual Youth In Government assembly in Haines City, where they met up with 140 other students from around the state to debate ideas, not people. These junior legislatures learned how to craft a bill this year, and how to defend it with solid research about the Florida statutes. We simulated how the legislative branch is structured through first and second committee, and by debating the bills within the House of Representatives and Senate chambers. 13/14 students advanced through the first two committees where fellow delegates rated their bills on feasibility and debate ability. Then, we debated on 11 bills in each chamber on Saturday. The big surprise came on Saturday night at dinner when we found out that delegate Sam Bernbaum's bill was chosen as the TOP bill in the house, and was debated on Sunday. His bill about making the ballots uniform in each county across Florida was passed by a large margin. During our closing ceremonies the following students were recognized:

- 8th graders, Omar Chehab, Stella Dalton, Derrick Dunn were invited to participate in YCorps this summer, which is a service project around the state for one week.
- 7th grader, Sam Bernbaum was recognized with the first on the docket for the house. Which meant that his bill was the number one rated bill in first and second committee in the house.
- 8th grader, Stella Dalton was awarded the "lookout" prize from her villa, meaning she has a great future in Youth in Government.
- 6th grader, Jack Fissell was given the perseverance award in the house.

My favorite part of this weekend was how many compliments we received from the high school mentors about our delegation being so polite and well prepared. Thank you for your support of this program.




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SOCIAL STUDIES

In 6th grade we are wrapping up our unit on Ancient Greece where we have been learning about the conquests of Alexander the Great and how he used brilliant military tactics to defeat much larger armies than his. After this we will learn about Ancient Rome. Students will be learning about Roman architecture, how the Roman style of government influenced the United States, daily life in the Roman Empire, and the reasons for the fall of the Roman Empire.

OCPS SUMMER READING INITIATIVE



The OCPS Summer Reading Initiative is designed to prevent the "summer slide," which occurs when students who do not read over the summer lose a percentage of the reading skills they developed during the previous school year. Students, parents, and educators are encouraged to visit OCPSReads.ocps.net to obtain reading lists by grade level and to search for books, apps, interactive literacy websites, e-books, parent resources, and literacy events around town. Students may also access the Beanstack App through Launchpad and can register for the OCPS Summer Reading Challenge through the website. This challenge encourages students to read and log their minutes electronically. This summer we are challenging OCPS students to read 5 million minutes. Our top school and students will be awarded prizes. The theme this year is "A Universe of Stories...What's your Story? #OCPSReads". OCPS Social Media will share the literacy message and encourage families to have students read this summer. We will ask our families to upload pictures and videos using #OCPSReads to share stories about reading, including why they love reading, their favorite book and why, or a quick preview of a book they think everyone should read. We encourage district staff to attend as well. We will fill our social media pages with a love for reading and sharing our universal stories that bring us together.

The summer break provides a much needed rest from the rigors of school life, but a complete disconnect from education can make the start of the new school year more difficult for your student. Consider a few ways to engage your child in activities that stimulate learning and provide an opportunity to enhance your relationship. Pick two or three of the following summer opportunities and commit to achieving a common goal with your child. READING: Read two books with your child over the summer. Each of you select a book, read it independently, and talk about it. Everyone identifies different meanings and ideas. These conversations lead to insights, not only about the books but perhaps more importantly, about each other. You may discover that some of your child's interests and perceptions surprise you.

MOVIES: See two movies with your child over the summer. Again, each of you pick a movie, see it together, and talk about its effect on you. The benefits of these conversations cannot be overstated. It's not uncommon to discover a point of view that you had never considered. As a result, you will become closer to your child. Many movies are adaptations of popular books or series. Watching them may motivate your child to read the books or others with similar or opposing themes.

HOMEWORK: Yes, yards must be tended, cars washed, kitchens cleaned, and trash taken out, but perhaps there are budgets to be discussed, correspondences to write, and bills to be paid. If appropriate, you might consider getting your child involved. Practical applications of math, reading, and writing skills reinforce the importance of education. These skills are vital for a fulfilling life!

TAKE A CLASS TOGETHER: Does your student have unexplored interests or passions? There are free online courses in art, music, dance, woodworking, gardening, writing and composition, etc., not to mention math, science, and technology. Encourage your child to select an online class of interest and complete it together. There's no way to predict undiscovered interests and talents.

FUN and GAMES: Consider some outdoor activities. Go hit a bucket of golf balls, or try surfing/water skiing. Host a game of 'Capture the Flag' at home or try paintballing. (Can you remember the joy of besting mom or dad?) Introduce games and activities that you remember from childhood. Encourage your child to practice his/her research skills by looking up rules, tips and strategies before engaging in the activity. If they really enjoy it, have them look further into opportunities for continued involvement. These activities develop and improve communication and social skills. There are numerous parks and recreation centers nearby to play any game or sport inexpensively.

These types of activities not only support the learning process but enhance relationships. Summer is a wonderful time to recover, relax, and reconnect. Make a point of including opportunities to reinforce and develop your child's education. Enjoy your summer!




