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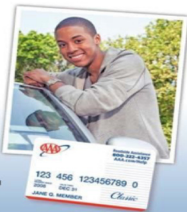
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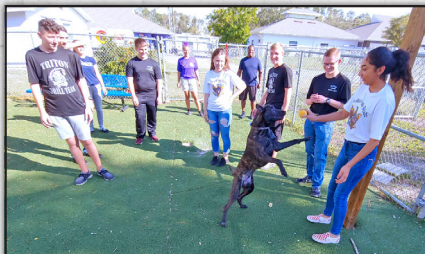
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Mariner ROTC

Mariner Leadership Academy hit the ground running after the holiday break, with Drill, Marksmanship and JLAB team going into their season.



Scabbard and Blade members raised donations of dog and cat food, toys and beds for the Gulf Coast Humane Society. During the holiday break, members personally delivered the donations and spent time with some of the rescue pets at the shelter, while learning more about their mission.

The Drill Team made a statement at the SGM Richardson Memorial Drill Meet Jan. 12 in Sarasota. This first meet of the season brought 24 teams from throughout Florida to compete in Color Guard, Drill and Exhibition events. Mariner brought home 13 trophies, including five 1st place, and an overall 3rd place at the meet.

The JROTC Academic and Leadership Teams brought their A-game at the District JLAB Bowl Jan. 17. After two months of competition, the top four teams in each category went head-to-head in a Jeopardy-style format. In the end, the Academic Team emerged as District Champions in 1st place and the Leadership Team in 3rd place in the county.

Next up for the Drill Team was the Brandon High School Drill Meet Jan. 19 against 32 schools in a "Bring Your Best Competition". The team placed in four of the eight events and 3rd Place Overall. On Feb. 2, the Drill Team, placing 2nd overall out of 24 schools at the Lisa Pauchey Drill Meet in Tampa. The competition was tough, but the Fightin Tritons persevered bringing back five 1st and 2nd place trophies.



The Triton Raiders took their best to the Iron Knight competition Feb. 2 at UCF. There were 55 teams competing, and all of our teams finished in the top 5, with Females and Mixed placing 1st. Although the Males placed 2nd, there was only a 12-second difference between them and 1st place. Female Team 2 placed 3rd, and Male Team 2 placed 4th.

The Triton Brigade Marksmanship Team launched its season at the Island Coast competition, as part of the 2019 King of the Cape Tournament. To help the team gain experience, the Triton team consisted of only JV members. Jakeb Williams, Hannah Martin, Dylan Hornsby and Stone Bernardo performed extremely well, finishing 4th as a team.

The team continued on to place 2nd in both the second and third matches of the Cape Marksmanship Tournament. Mason Dennard, Sarah Gerega, and Alexis Davis have consistently placed in the Top 5 in each match. As competition moves forward we expect to close out the Cape tournament strong leading into the county marksmanship match and return to state competition.



The Drill Team proved once again that they are the District Champions at the District Competition Feb. 23. During a grueling day of heat and mental toughness, our Tritons stripped away from the opponents 20 trophies. Among the victories were six 1st Place, five 2nd Place, and five 3rd Place finishes, qualifying for State Competition taking place April 13.

On March 30, the Drill Team competed at the JROTC National Drill Competition in Virginia and went up against

102 high schools and more than 2,000 students from all over the United States. The team placed an incredible 4th in the nation after competing in six areas of Drill; Regulation, Exhibition, Inspection, Color Guard, Individual Exhibition and Dual Exhibition.

Exhibition Solo 3rd in the Nation, Zach Disalvio Exhibition Dual 3rd in the Nation, Kevin Hernandez and Dylan Covell Armed Inspection 4th in the Nation Armed Platoon 6th in the Nation Armed Exhibition 7th in the Nation Color Guard 15th in the nation. We move to our State competition at George Jenkins High School on the 13th of April, "Go Tritons".

Interact Club wrapped up their annual Autism Awareness ribbon sales, making \$116, which will be donated to Autism Speaks. This annual sale was started four years ago and has grown in donation amount each year. This year we ran out of ribbons before the end of the two-week sale! We are so excited to be able to contribute to such a worthy cause.

Our next project will be Pennies for Patients, formerly Pasta for Pennies. This is a three-week campaign, which allows students to donate in their classrooms. 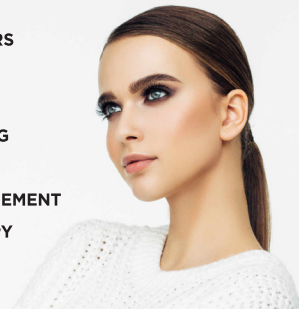

Graduation Tickets

Tickets are required for all guests attending graduation, regardless of age.

The quantity of tickets received will depend on the number of graduates in the Class of 2019 who participate in the graduation ceremony. The tentative number of tickets per senior will be 6 tickets.

Seniors will receive their tickets at the MANDATORY graduation practice on May 17 in the MHS Gym. **YOU MUST BE PRESENT TO RECEIVE YOUR TICKETS TO GRADUATION. ABSOLUTELY NO EXCEPTIONS!!**

All books must be returned and all fees & fines must be cleared up to receive any tickets.

Graduation Dress Code

The dress code for graduation is:

FEMALES - Wear a dress or skirt/blouse, & dress shoes. Attach your white collar to your gown. Sandals are OK to wear. Wear comfortable heels because you will be standing for a long time. No large dangling earrings or flowers are allowed to be worn. Caps must be worn level with tassel hanging to the right side. Ladies caps should NOT be perched on the back of your head. No flip flops allowed.

MALES - Wear a dress shirt, tie, dress slacks (dark color) and dark dress shoes or boots. No flip flops are allowed. Caps are worn level with tassel hanging on right side.

NOTE: Parents, please give the flowers to your child AFTER the ceremony, as they will not be allowed to carry flowers in the procession.

Senior Final Exam Exemption Criteria 2018-2019

There is no change in the Senior Final Exam Exemption Criteria for the 2018-2019 school year.

The following exam exemption policy applies to **seniors only**. If you have a **senior** who meets the exemption criteria, the student receives an X for the exam in FOCUS. This policy excludes Dual Enrollment, AP, IB, or AICE Exams.

Seniors who meet the following criteria are exempt from final exams:

- Only seniors can waive second semester exams.
- Student must have an A or B average in the class for second semester.
- Student must have no external suspensions during semester 2.
- Advanced Placement, IB, AICE, and Dual Enrollment exams must be administered. No exemptions can be given for these courses.
- When an exam is waived, the two nine-week grades for second semester will be averaged to obtain a semester average for the course.
- Only those seniors who meet the criteria as stated above will be exempt from exams at the end of second semester.

Relay For Life Of Greater Lee County

On April 6th, Tritons joined the Relay For Life of Greater Lee County "Passport Around the World" at Cypress Lake High School in an effort to end the war with cancer with the rest of the community. Teams lined the track and MHS had their "Walk About a Cure" booth ready to sell boomerangs and sea turtles cut out here on campus by Mr. James' Engineering students. The booth represented Australia with its kangaroo and koala bear painted by Mrs. Shamrock's art students. In addition, the "Road to Recovery" lap brought the Tritons in at Third place with a jeep design ready for the rugged terrain of the Outback to complete our Australian team. In addition, Sherriff Carmine Marceno (Lee County's 13th appointed Sheriff) even gave the Triton Australian Jeep a ticket and placed Morgan Russell in jail until funds were raised to release her! Wrestling

The team won back "The Best of The West" trophy by defeating all west zone schools and took runner up honors at the Lee County Wrestling Championship. The Triton wrestling team completed their season with a 14-3 dual meet record. The District meet produced 3 individual champions in junior, Ethan Duke at 132lbs., senior Christian Minto at 160 lbs. and senior Justyn Cordones at 220 lbs. The team qualified 11 wrestlers to move on to the Regional Finals in early March. Three wrestlers then qualified for the State Finals in Kissimmee on March 8 & 9th. Sophomore, Mack Koselke, wrestled hard and was only one match away from placing in the top 6 at 138 lbs. Team Captain, Justyn Cordones, lost an early match but battled back through the bracket at 220lbs to win 3rd place honors. Christian Minto broke the school all-time career win record with a 4-yr. total of 170 wins and only 5 losses. Christian dominated the 160lb. class during the 2-day tournament with 3 pins in 4 matches with one coming in the championship final. Christian finishes his wrestling career at Mariner as the only 4-time state placer with 3 of those as state champion. A great finish to a great year.

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The Thirst Project

The Thirst Project visited Mariner High School to educate Tritons about the water crisis on our planet. There are 663 million people on our planet that still lack access to safe, clean drinking water. Triton's watched a short presentation put on by students. The Thirst Project is a non-profit organization whose aim is to bring safe drinking water to communities around the world. Tritons were moved to tears during the presentation and participated in the Miracle Minute to raise money right on sight!



The Thirst Project's mission is to build a socially-conscious generation of young people who END the global water crisis. They educate students about the crisis and activate them to build real water projects all over the world. By providing a community with safe drinking water, disease rates can drop by up to 88% virtually overnight! Child mortality rates can drop up to 90% overnight! Clean water also plays an incredibly critical role in effectively treating and managing HIV/AIDS in rural communities.

During the presentation, students volunteered to lift a full five gallon jerry can and place it on their head. Most students could not get it above their shoulders! Women and children spend on average six to eight hours each day walking to fetch water. The average distance that women and children in developing communities walk to fetch water is 3.75 miles.

Why does the Thirst Project speak with students? "We believe that students are THE most powerful agents for social change in the world! STUDENTS will change the world!"
