Message from the PRINCIPAL

The 2018-2019 school year is complete, and we look forward to what is in store for our Pirates for 2019-2020. Our recent senior grads really set the bar with their accomplishments in the classroom and on the field.

- 44% of the seniors had a weighted GPA of 3.5 or higher.
- 40% of the students enrolled in at least one Advanced Placement course.
- Over 76% have taken at least one honors level course.
- 71% were enrolled in some type of Flagship course or Classroom to Career course.
- 45 students earned an industry certification with an employable skill.
- Over 86% of students took the standardized SAT or ACT.
- 39% of students took a dual enrollment course.
- Approximately 40 students earned or will earn their Associates degree from Daytona State College this summer.
- 78% of our grads are college bound.
- For the fourth year in a row, Matanzas High was recognized by US News and World Report as one of the top high schools in the country. New this year at the Ship, we will be adding Homeland Security

Courses from ERAU. This ties into our Law and Justice Flagship. In addition, our AICE program is expanding to include five new courses for students seeking their AICE International diploma. In the spring, our construction program will receive a boost with the renovation and construction of a new lab for the flagship in building 10.

All of this points to the expanding offerings and opportunities for our students and community. I look forward to seeing all of our Pirates return to the Ship on August 12.

NEWS FROM THE CLINIC

- 1. Please be advised medical records will be audited by September 30, 2019. If not in compliance with Flagler District policy and Florida Department of Health, students could face unexcused absences until files are complete.
- 2. An UPDATED Emergency Contact form is needed for EACH school year.
- Medication to be administered at school:
 **MUST be signed in by a parent/guardian with the nurse in the clinic
 - and the appropriate form completed. **Prescription medication must have a District Order Form completed by the ordering MD.

(Forms can be picked up in the clinic.)

- 4. ALL Diabetics MUST have a DMMP from their physician on file in the clinic. (Multiple forms are needed for the carrying of and administration of all related treatment.)
- 5. Proper forms are needed for students who need to self-carry EPI-Pens, inhalers or diabetic treatments.
- Information on Flu shots will be forthcoming.
 Please be sure to inform the clinic of any medical conditions for which

your student may require treatment.

TRACK & FIELD RECORD BREAKERS

The Matanzas High School Track and Field Team concluded yet another great season on May 4th at the FHSAA State Track & Field Class 3A Championships held at the University of North Florida in Jacksonville. Ja'Dashia Catlin competed in the 400M run with a time of 59.01. This season, Ja'Dashia broke two Matanzas High School records in both the 400M run with a time of 58.42 and in the 300M run with a time of 41.67. Shanell Pusey also competed at the State Track & Field Championship. Shanell ran in both the 300M and 100M hurdles with respective times of 48.50 and 17.17. Shanell also broke two Matanzas High School records this season, one in the 300M hurdles with a time of 46.74 and the other in the 100M hurdles with a time of 16.06. The Girls Track Team placed Runner Up at the Class 3A District 6 Championship held here at The Ship, while the Boys Track & Field Team placed third.

We had 25 student-athletes compete in the Class 3A Regional 2 Championship, experiencing a level of competition that was new for many of our student-athletes. 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Advanced Placement Changes Parents & Students

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AP[®] students do college-level work in high school. And if they score a 3 or higher on the exam, they can earn college credit. To help them make the most of this opportunity, beginning in the 2019-20 school year, the AP[®] Program is introducing new resources and processes designed to help students earn college credit and placement.

The AP experience will largely remain the same – students will still sign up for classes at the same time, and exams will still be administered in May – but there are a few changes students will notice throughout the 2019-20 school year. Here's what you need to know:

- FALL COMMITMENT: Students will be asked to register for AP Exams in the fall. AP Exams will continue to be given in May.
- **EXAM COSTS:** The exam fee isn't changing. However, there will be two new fees: a \$40 fee for late registration (after Nov. 15) and a \$40 cancelation or unused exam fee.
- **NEW RESOURCES:** Students will get personalized feedback through new digital tools that provide daily support for every AP classroom. Their teachers will be able to track their performance throughout the year using monthly personal progress checks.

To get ready for the coming school year, students should sign up for a College Board account. All College Board programs are connected through one account, so if you created one for the PSAT/NMSQT®, SAT®, or College Board Opportunity Scholarships, you are all set. You'll just need to have their username and password available. Parents can learn more at parents.collegeboard.org.

AP STUDENTS TO-DO LIST

Here is what students need to do to prepare for the 2019-20 AP school year.

BEFORE THE SCHOOL YEAR

- Students visit apstudent.collegeboard.org to learn more about AP courses and exams.
- Students without a College Board account should create one and set their password. They'll need their username and password when their AP classes start in the fall.
- Students who already have an account should make sure they know their username and password.

FALL 2019

- First week of class: Teachers will give students a join code for each of their AP classes. Students use their College Board username and password and join code to enroll in their class section.
- October/November: Schools submit exam orders. **SPRING 2020**
- March: Schools submit any changes to their exam order and order exams for students in spring courses.
- May: Students take AP Exams.

SUMMER 2020

• July: AP Exam scores are released.
