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From the Principal's Desk

Parents & Guardians,

With the 3rd trimester in full swing, we all get a brief pause for Spring Break. When we all return, the end of the school year will approach rapidly. At the end of every school year, there are numerous events and ceremonies that take place. I will be sure to communicate those events in a timely fashion in order to keep everyone informed.

One of the most important annual events is End-Of-Course Exams. On days we are administering End-Of-Course Exams, Maumee High School will operate on a delayed start. Below is the schedule of End-Of-Course Exams and an explanation of how the delayed starts work. Please mark these dates and talk with your student(s) about which exams they are taking this Spring. If you have questions, please do not hesitate to contact the Maumee High School Main Office for more specific information.



Students who are testing must arrive at MHS at the normal start time (7:40am). Buses will run at normal times.

Students who are not testing on one of these days may come in at the delayed start time. **Students who are not testing BUT rely on bus transportation, should catch their bus at the regular time.** The MHS cafeteria will be supervised for students who arrive at regular time but do not have to test.

For students taking End-Of-Course Exams, preparation is a key component to success. Their teachers have spent the past 9 months preparing students academically. Rude, Mean, or Bullying?

Bullying is an issue that we talk about a lot these days. No one should be exposed to bullying and those who witness these acts should report them immediately. The administration at Maumee High School aggressively investigates reports of bullying and works diligently to keep our students safe. What many people don't know is that bullying actually carries a very specific definition and that certain criterion must be met before someone can be disciplined for bullying. While we don't like it, people can be mean, rude, obnoxious, or not like each other without ever reaching the threshold of bullying. This guide has been developed by the Maumee City Schools to help students and parents determine the difference between mean behaviors, rude behaviors and bullying:

Rude = Inadvertently saying or doing something that hurts someone else.

From kids, rudeness might look more like burping in someone's face, jumping ahead in line, bragging about achieving the highest grade or even throwing a crushed up piece of paper in someone's face. On their own, any of these behaviors could appear as elements of bullying, but when looked at in context, incidents of rudeness are usually spontaneous, unplanned inconsideration, based on thoughtlessness, poor manners or narcissism, but not meant to actually hurt someone.

Mean = Purposefully saying or doing something to hurt someone.

The main distinction between "rude" and "mean" behavior has to do with intention; while rudeness is often unintentional, mean behavior very much aims to hurt or depreciate someone. Kids are mean to each other when they criticize clothing, appearance, intelligence, coolness or just about anything else they can find to denigrate. Meanness also sounds like words spoken in anger — impulsive cruelty that is often regretted in short order. Very often, mean behavior in kids (mean girls/mean boys) is motivated by angry feelings, personal insecurities, lack of self-worth, and/or the misguided goal of propping themselves up in comparison to the person they are putting down.

Bullying = Intentionally aggressive behavior, repeated over time, that involves an imbalance of power.

Experts agree that bullying entails three key elements: (1) an intent to harm, (2) a power imbalance and (3) repeated acts or threats of aggressive behavior. Kids who bully say or do something intentionally hurtful to others and they keep doing it, with no sense of regret or remorse — even when targets of bullying show or express their hurt or tell the aggressors to stop.

Bullying may be physical, verbal, relational or carried out via technology:

- **Physical aggression** was once the gold standard of bullying— the "sticks and stones" that made adults in charge stand up and take notice. This kind of bullying includes hitting, punching, kicking, spitting, tripping, hair pulling, slamming a child into a locker and a range of other behaviors that involve physical aggression.
- **Verbal aggression** is what our parents used to advise us to "just ignore." We now know that despite the old adage, words and threats can, indeed, hurt and can even cause profound, lasting harm.
- **Relational aggression** is a form of bullying in which kids use their friendship—or the threat of taking their friendship away—to hurt someone. Social exclusion, shunning, hazing, and rumor spreading are all forms of this pervasive type of bullying that can be especially beguiling and crushing to kids.
- **Cyberbullying** is a specific form of bullying that involves technology. According to Hinduja and Patchin of the Cyberbullying Research Center, it is the "willful and repeated harm inflicted through the use of computers, cell phones, and other electronic devices." Notably, the likelihood of repeated harm is especially high with cyberbullying because electronic messages can be accessed by multiple parties, resulting in repeated exposure and repeated harm. It is important to know that cyberbullying does not always fall under the school's purview. For this reason, it is important for parents to monitor and limit students' social media activity.

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GRADUATION 2023

SAVE THE DATE!!!! Historically Maumee High School Graduation has typically been held during Memorial Day Weekend. This year, the date for Maumee High School's Graduation Ceremony is going to be one week earlier than usual. **The date for the 2023 MHS Graduation is SUNDAY, MAY 21st at 2pm at the Stranahan.** In order to participate in the ceremony, seniors need to:

1. meet all local and state graduation requirements prior to the ceremony date
2. attend **graduation practice (Thursday, May 18th @ 9 am in the Stranahan Theater)**
***Any Senior who fails to attend Graduation Practice will not walk at Graduation
3. not be serving any consequence for discipline over graduation weekend
4. paid all outstanding school fees and fines prior to the ceremony date.

Senior Class Website

Seniors are responsible for checking their email regularly and following the senior class website. All seniors - early graduates, MHS, MHS-PCC, and MHS-CBI - are responsible for knowing the details for their senior events in the final 1/3 of the school year. Event details and changes will be communicated via email and senior class website.

Senior Scholarship List in the Graduation Program

An important piece of the graduation program is the senior scholarship list. Every senior who receives a scholarship - whether they accept the scholarship or not - is recognized by name along with the scholarships awarded. We rely on the senior students and parents to provide this information as we may not always receive notice of scholarships that the students receive. Please bring a copy of any scholarship that your student receives to the guidance office at Maumee High School. You can also scan a copy of the letter and email to guidance secretary Michelle Leasor at mopaczewski@maumee12.org. We will make sure that all scholarships for which we have notice are properly listed by the student name in the program.

Senior Slides

Senior Slides were shared with each Senior in early February. Seniors need to fill in the answers to the six boxed questions. **YOUR ANSWERS MUST FIT WITHIN THE BOXES.** We will help resize, fit, and reformat the slides as you work on them. The senior slides and slideshow are property of the Maumee City Schools and we can add, edit or remove content without your consent. Completed slides are due by **MARCH 31st**. If you are part of the student council, NHS, or have a graduation honor, we will be adding that to your slide at a later date. Pictures must be a portrait style picture done by a professional photographer.

If a Senior does not complete their slide by **MARCH 31st**, then their slide will not be displayed and only a Panther Head will be used as a placeholder.

Get to work on these NOW and help produce a slide that your family will be proud of. Parents and Guardians should discuss this with their Senior in order to avoid an awkward moment at graduation and having to answer the question, "Where was your senior slide?" to your family members!

Medallions, Cords, Stoles at the Graduation Ceremony

Maumee High School ONLY PERMITS THE USE OF SCHOOL ISSUED MEDALLIONS, CORDS, or STOLES at the graduation ceremony. No other adornments will be permitted at the graduation ceremony. Caps are not to be decorated.

Medallions at the Maumee High School Graduation Ceremony are reserved for those students who have earned an Ohio Honors Diploma. Freshman, Sophomores, and Juniors who want to be recognized with this distinction at their graduation ceremony should ask their school counselor if they are on track to earn an Ohio Honors Diploma. Counselors can make sure that they are registered for the appropriate courses to be eligible.

Cords at the Maumee High School Graduation Ceremony are reserved for those students who are active members of the National Honor Society (gold) or the National Technical Honor Society (purple).

Stoles at the Maumee High School Graduation Ceremony are reserved for those students who have earned a National Merit distinction as a national merit finalist, semifinalist, or commended scholar.

Graduation Academic Recognition

Graduating students at Maumee High School receive individual academic recognition at the graduation ceremony based on the *Latin Honors System* and the earning of a *State of Ohio Honors Diploma*. Every student who earns an honors diploma will receive an academic medallion at the graduation ceremony and will be recognized by name for that award. The earning of an honors diploma is NOT based on taking any honors courses, it is simply the culmination of 4 years of a prescribed college preparatory curriculum. To earn a state of Ohio academic honors diploma, the student must complete any 7 of the following 8 criteria:

1. 4 credits of English
2. 4 credits of Math including Algebra 1, Geometry, Algebra 2, and a higher level math
3. 4 credits of Science including 2 credits of Advanced Science
4. 4 credits of Social Studies
5. 3 credits of the same Foreign Language or 2 credits in two different languages
6. 1 credit of Fine Arts
7. 3.5 GPA on a 4.0 scale
8. 27 Composite on the ACT

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After-School Tutoring

MHS offers supervised after-school tutoring and quiet study opportunities **every day from 2:30 - 3:30 pm**. Transportation home is provided at 3:45 pm for students who are eligible to ride the bus (live more than 1 mile from the building). At 3:30 pm, students who require a bus to take them home will be given a transportation ticket from the Supervising Teacher and can take that ticket to Wayne Trail to catch a bus. Bus eligible students who attend after-school club meetings may also catch the 3:45 pm bus at Wayne Trail.

Student Assessments and Academic Intervention Services

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
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M.H.S. Continues Positive Behavior Intervention Strategies

Maumee High School P.B.I.S. Update

This year Maumee High School has implemented our unique Positive Behavior Intervention Strategies (P.B.I.S.) Program. Now in our second year of full implementation, our program focuses on Four Main Behavioral Expectations (**Responsible, Open-Minded, Appreciative, and Resilient**) that are represented in our **R.O.A.R.** acronym. Staff have increased their attention to and efforts in recognizing students' positive behaviors. Also, much effort has been put forth in promoting **R.O.A.R.** throughout the school and incorporating the "Positivity Project" curriculum into targeted lessons in our 9th, 10th, & 11th grade homerooms. The senior class has had the opportunity to listen to guest speakers from the greater Toledo Community.

In the months of March & April the High School will transition to daily announcements about the importance of our Behavioral Expectations and providing students with ongoing examples of these expectations in our school building and on our school campus. Trivia Friday's in the cafeteria will focus on our Behavioral Expectations and students will have the opportunity to win valuable prizes.

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
