

### Principal's Message

Mariner Family,

I am writing to inform you of exciting news. As of January, 2020 we added three new Exploratory Courses to our Master Schedule. These three additions will result in our students having a greater variety of coursework and a more well-rounded educational experience. This will mean that your student may have seen a schedule change in January. It is important to note that middle school course work, outside of the core curriculum, is exploratory based, rather than elective. Exploratory classes are assigned to students and designed to provide them with an introduction to a variety of courses.

Murdock Middle has had a long history of providing our students an introduction to visual arts. I am pleased to announce that as of January 2020, we began offering Art. Our Art classes are designed to encourage students to learn about a variety of art mediums, as well as explore their own creativity.

In addition to Art, we added two STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Exploratory Courses. The STEM class will be project based. We are also transitioning our current Research Course into a second STEM Class. This enables us to offer hands on learning to more of our students. Although we are offering two STEM courses, the content and projects will be unique to each course.

In order to provide our students with this well-rounded curriculum, we need to reduce the number of Physical Education sections. The State of Florida requires all middle schools to offer their students one semester (half a year) of PE. We will meet that requirement. In addition, some of our 8th graders will still be able to take the Wellness Course. While we realize it takes some adjusting whenever we make changes to our Master Schedule, we also recognize the short-term disruption is well worth our improved course offerings. We are proud to offer our students a greater variety of coursework and a more well-rounded educational experience and ask for your continued support.

### Media Center News

Although the weather is warm, it's still a great time to cozy up with a good book.

Students are welcome to visit the library during the school day to check out books, work on research projects, and enjoy a little quiet reading time. In addition to the school day, the Media Center is open in the morning before 1st period. During this time, students can work on homework, read, check out books, do personal research, catch up on current events, and grab a quick game of Chess or Uno.

We now have ebooks and audio books available! Students can access these materials using Overdrive, which is on Classlink, or by using the SORA app on a smartphone. The SORA app is a free download. We have about 30 titles available and are adding new ones each month.

Students who complete the challenge will receive a free ticket to a Stone Crabs home game and the opportunity to purchase discount tickets for family and friends. ### Drug Free Charlotte County

A New Year's resolution can bring both excitement and fear. We are excited because we are hopeful about changes and growth. Yet, often there is a fear associated with change because of the possibility of failure. Our kids also experience these same feelings of excitement and fear. We can help ourselves and our kids remove that fear and be successful in achieving our resolutions by following a few simple steps.

First, let's take a look at the 3 main reasons why many people never reach their resolution goals:

A goal is never really set. Many people examine the things they would like to change, improve, or grow in and have no problems with expressing those ideas. However, until it becomes a goal, complete with steps and a timeline, it is still just a thought. In order to achieve a goal, it is vital to write it down, plan out your sub-goals or steps, and to create a timeline by which you plan to achieve each sub-goal to get to your main goal. Keep this somewhere that you can look at it regularly to keep your goals in mind.

Your goal is not meaningful, measurable, or realistic. There are many things we may have in our mind that we should do, but it does not have value to us personally. Without having a goal that is significant to us we will lack the passion needed to push through the difficulties in achieving that goal.

- 1. A goal should also be measurable. My father always used to say to me, "Goals worth achieving are never easy". As an adult I can now see such truth in that. When we work toward our goals, we are going to hit snags and hiccups and times when we are going to want to give up, because it is hard, especially when it comes to long-term goals. However, when you measure your progress toward your goals, you can see how far you have already come and that can help push you through those difficult patches.
- 2. When creating your goal, you need to consider if your goal is realistic. Are you giving yourself enough time to reach the goal? Do you have the supplies needed to reach your goal? Have you done the research required?



3. You don't reward yourself. Motivation is a real struggle for most people when working towards a goal. We know that there is something great once




we reach the goal, but sometimes that can be too far away to keep us motivated. It is important to reward yourself each step of the way, particularly with each sub-goal so that you can stay motivated. Plan ahead of time what your rewards will be and make sure that it is something you will enjoy and look forward to. Then always keep that reward in your sights to help you stay the course.

### Next, let's talk about how achieving your goals helps your kids in 3 main ways:

- 1. You're a roll model! When your kids see you setting and achieving goals in the right way, it gives them the confidence to give it a shot as well. It let's them know that it is possible, and it is a behavior that will help them become successful, just like you. Don't be afraid to show them or talk to them about times when you have made mistakes along the way or experienced challenges, this will help encourage them as they experience their own challenges.
- 2. Your kids will have confidence in you helping them create their own goals. They have seen you do it, so you are their live-in expert. They are more likely to listen to what you have to say about setting and achieving goals, and they need your help in this. Make sure to talk to them about being flexible and being able to adjust their goals if they hit a snag. Check in with them from time to time and see how they are doing toward reaching their goals to remind them they are important to you too.
- 3. Setting goals in their own life will help them gain a sense of purpose, and this is also great quality time together. You can enrich this process with experiences that can bring their goals to life. These are moments with you that they will cherish as they get older as well.


