We here at Naples High are so very proud of the many outstanding scholars we have the opportunity to work with on a regular basis. This quarter, we would like to highlight Adriana Dotres' notable achievement. Adriana recently represented our Golden Eagle family at this year's Laws of Life Essay/Speech Contest where participating high school scholars were asked to reflect on a role model in their lives that has helped them "understand the importance of practicing the Laws of Life" with an emphasis on either respect, responsibility, kindness, perseverance, self-discipline, or fairness.

Adriana, inspired by her father's unyielding commitment to his goals, chose to center her speech on perseverance. "I wrote about my dad, Victor. Well, I chose to write about him because he has overcome a lot of challenges in his life, and he has always reached to do better about whatever he was doing. For example, he always wanted to run for office. So, he ran in a few small elections, and even when he would struggle, he always stayed in the race. Because of his perseverance, he was given many opportunities, such as being on a public art committee."

Adriana's Laws of Life speech not only stood out amongst her classmates here at Naples High, she was also recognized at the district level. Dotres was selected as one of ten finalists, ultimately finishing among the top four high school speechwriters.

The 11th-12th grade English Department by the numbers:

- 10 11th grade students improved their FSA reading score to meet graduation requirements.
- I7 AICE Global Perspectives and Research AS Level students completed the recordings of their eight-minute individual Component 3 (Team Project) presentation after extensive research, collaboration, and a reflective paper.
- **24** AP Research students completed the recordings of their twenty-minute presentation and oral defense based on their 5,000-word research report.
- 38 AP Seminar students completed the recordings of their eight-minute Individual Multimedia Presentations (IMP) based on their 2,000-word Individual Written Argument (IWA).
- 61 English 4 Honors used a menu of differentiated options to compare and contrast themes of short stories.
- 63 AICE English Language students studied contemporary English language through the use of pamphlets, brochures, and other real-world readings.
- 85 AP English Language and Composition students completed their college entrance portfolio, including an academic resume and the Common App essays.
- 86 AP English Literature students sat for their AP exam in hopes of earning college credit.
- 123 Grade 11/12 students worked to improve reading comprehension through word roots and prefixes/suffixes.
- 223 English 4 students examined how powerful and deceptive words can be through the use of George Orwell's 1984.
- 230 English 3 students read and analyzed Arthur Miller's The Crucible.
- 901 Students and teachers working hard to finish the year strong.

Science Department

Mrs. Miranda's forensic science class students will start building, Crimes Scenes Dioramas. This project is based on the work of Frances Glessner Lee (1878-1962) in which she crafted her extraordinary "Nutshell Studies of Unexplained Death"—exquisitely detailed miniature crime scenes—to train homicide investigators to "convict the guilty, clear the innocent, and find the truth in a nutshell." These dollhousesized dioramas of true crimes, created in the first half of the 20th century and still used in forensic training today, helped to revolutionize the emerging field of homicide investigation. Lee, the first female police captain in the U.S., is considered the "mother of forensic science" and helped to fund the first-of-its kind Department of Legal Medicine at Harvard University when the field of forensics was in its infancy. Mrs. Miranda will showcase their work on the NHS social media websites.



NHS Academy of Health Science


Biomedical Science at NHS

This Academy focuses on developing students' abilities to solve real world problems affecting human health. They learn both the conceptual and hands on procedures utilized by biomedical professionals today. Upon completion of the 3-year program provided by Project Lead the Way, Naples High School



students are given the opportunity to complete an industry-recognized exam in Biotechnology.

The curriculum is presented in a format that steps away from traditional learning and puts students on a path of discovery. Students first perform various activities which allow them to familiarize themselves with



concepts and tools, next they are asked to apply this information to complete a project, then ultimately students are asked to apply all they have learned to a novel, real world problem.




This 2021/2022 academic year marks the inaugural year at Naples High School of the first year of this exciting opportunity, Principals of Biomedical

Science! We started with a crime scene investigation which led to exciting labs where students practiced technical skills like blood type analysis and DNA fingerprinting!



We took a slight detour from molecular genetics and looked into human body systems to investigate cause of death with histological analysis of brain tissue for CTE effects and heart dissections looking for anatomical defects. The course invites students to play the role of medical



his background in innovation. Throughout the course students are asked to investigate careers, discuss the educational requirements, roles they

provide and reflect on their own interests. The students were given further exposure to career opportunities at the Collier County First Responders Career Fair!

We then moved our experiences back into the classroom where we learned about epidemiology and the process of isolating and identifying



organisms responsible for nosocomial infections in a hospital. They performed the lab procedures expected of a lab technician in epidemiology inclusive of gram staining! These activities were followed by a visit to NCH where the students got to explore their



simulation unit and learn about nosocomial infections directly from the professionals in our community. This program is unique and ready to grow with the launch of our second year, Human Body Systems, in 2022/2023!

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
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
