LORENZO WALKER TECHNICAL HIGH SCHOOL OPPORTUNITY


On Thursday, March 4th, our 8th graders had the opportunity to meet with representatives from Lorenzo Walker Technical High School. We learned much valuable information about how we can plan our future in one of their varied programs. Each program would give students not only a high school diploma, but also up to two years of college, paid for and finished by the time they left high school. The training received would put a student in a position of being hired right out of high school in a job that would help pay for their remaining two years of college.

Some of the exciting programs LWTHS offers are aviation mechanics, culinary arts, drafting, marine services, nursing, welding, heating, ventilation, air conditioning, refrigeration (HVAC/R), and many more.

If any of our students would like to take one of these programs at Lorenzo Walker after high school, not during high school, the cost would be over \$7,000. However, if a student takes the program while enrolled in CCPS, it is free to the student. That is a huge savings in time and money.

The reason we are bringing up these fantastic opportunities to all grades, 6, 7 and 8 is that it is never too soon to think of the possibilities offered to our student throughout our community. Please contact Lorenzo Walker High School for more information.

Spring In Naples



Annual Health Screenings

Thursday, March 11th was our annual 6th grade health screening. The Collier County Health Department visited NNMS for the day to check all 6th grade students' vision and hearing. Unless a parent opted their child out of the screening, their child was given the opportunity to have their eyes and hearing screened by very accurate, simple, safe testing. We are very thankful to our health department for this valuable testing.





Attendance

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other potentially serious difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10 percent, or about 18 days, of the school year can drastically affect a student's academic success.
- Students can be chronically absent even if they only miss a day or two every few weeks.
- Attendance is an important life skill that will help your child graduate from college and keep a job.

WHAT YOU CAN DO!

Make school attendance a priority.

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day, make that the expectation.
- Help your child maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- Don't let your child stay home unless truly sick. Complaints of headaches or stomach aches may be signs of anxiety.

Help your teen stay engaged.

- Find out if your child feels engaged by his classes and feels safe from bullies and other threats. Make sure he/she is not missing class because of behavioral issues and school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, work with your school.
- Stay on top of academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors if necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact vou.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- Encourage meaningful afterschool activities, including sports and clubs.



Communicate with the school.

- Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalties
- Talk to teachers if you notice sudden changes in behavior. These could be tied to something going on at school.
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not piling up.
- Ask for help from school officials, afterschool programs, other parents or community agencies if you're having trouble getting your child to school.
