The Language Arts Department has started the year off strong! Teachers began by diving right into FSA data to identify areas of strength and weakness to design lessons that support the needs of each class. Your student has been working hard — identifying story elements and plot lines in fictional text, looking for textual evidence that supports inferences and arguments in non-fiction text, and exploring creativity and language with all types of writing assignments. Please be sure to check FOCUS gradebook on a regular basis to be sure that missing assignments aren't having a negative impact on your child's grade. In addition to any assigned homework, all language arts teachers encourage reading on a regular basis. A minimum of 20 minutes of reading each night can have a profound impact on a student's overall success.

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3 Tips for Parents to Teach Healthy Study Habits to Children in Middle School

Parents can help their students by monitoring sleep time and developing consistent study routines that help their pre-teens and teens stay on top of due dates and deadlines. It's important for parents to be in the know. They need to have an idea of the upcoming expectations or projects, because parents are the ultimate prompt.

- 1. Set a schedule: Studying should be part of your student's daily routine, not something he or she tries to cram in the night before a test. Advising students to parse out their study time over the course of the week, rather than letting due dates dictate their study time, will produce better results. Preparing for tests ahead of time can reduce anxiety, and finishing assignments ahead of schedule can be rewarding for students. Parents and students should write testing/project dates and major deadlines on a calendar or planner to serve as a visual reminder.
- 2. Eliminate distractions: Cell phones, Facebook, and TV can quickly interrupt a productive study session. Curb your teen's temptation to tune in, text, or update their status by shutting down any unnecessary electronics during scheduled study times. Especially cell phones, it's like their third eye at this point. That's such a distraction. Since students often need a computer to complete online assignments or type papers, parents should periodically check in with their studious teens. It's pretty easy to gauge if they're going onto social media sites versus typing out an essay.
- **3. Break it up:** Maintaining focus during a two-hour study session may be challenging, so know your teen's limits and divvy up study time accordingly. Being aware of their attention span can help you structure their study time so that it will be successful. Parents might also set milestones for large projects or important tests such as midterms or final exams. Don't attempt it all in one piece, but break it up into smaller tasks.

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Important Information for Parents Regarding Head Lice

Dear Parent/Guardian,

Welcome back to a new school year! This letter is being sent to the parents of all students in grades pre-K through 8 to help you identify and prevent head lice in your child. Any time children come together, such as at the beginning of the school year, at sleepovers, social groupings such as Girl/Cub Scouts, sports activities, camp, etc., head lice cases commonly increase. Most transmissions occur in the home and community settings. The parent or guardian has the ultimate responsibility to ensure children are free of lice and nits. It is recommended that you check your child's head weekly for lice and/or nits.

What are head lice and nits?

Head lice are tiny, wingless insects that live close to the human scalp and feed on blood. Generally found around the ears and at the back of the neck, the adult louse is about the size of a sesame seed. The adult female lice lay eggs (nits) that are smaller and silver in color and are usually found within ¼ inch of the scalp. They may be hard to see and "stick" to the hair shaft. They may be mistaken for dandruff. When the nits hatch, they cause itching and discomfort but do not spread disease.

How is head lice spread?

Lice are most commonly found in young children due to frequent, close contact with each other. Lice are usually spread by direct head-to-head contact when one person has an active case of lice. They do not fly, jump or swim. They do however, crawl. Head lice cannot survive for very long off the head. Therefore, lice are not usually spread by contact with personal items such as hats, brushes or combs. Lice are not a sign of poor hygiene. If someone in your child's class develops head lice, there is no reason to panic and automatically assume that your child will "catch" head lice.

How do I know if my child has head lice or nits?

The signs that a child may have head lice include: an itchy and inflamed scalp; the feeling that something is moving in the hair; visible lice crawling on the scalp or hair. If your child has any of these signs or symptoms, he or she should be examined by a health care provider or the school nurse. Head lice move quickly and can be hard to see.

What do I do if my child has lice or nits?

- Please notify the school and keep your child home until he or she is treated. Talk to your child's health care provider about appropriate care. Resistance to some over-the-counter treatments has been reported. New prescription treatment options are available. Private companies also provide lice treatment and/or removal services. A parent must accompany the child upon return to school after treatment. Staff members will check to be sure there are no live lice. The child may not return if live lice are still present.
- Once a child has been treated for lice or nits, frequent re-checks will be done to ensure that treatment was effective and lice have not recurred.
- Teach your child not to share combs, brushes, barrettes, hats, towels and other personal items.
- Teach your child to avoid head-to-head contact during play and other activities.
