LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear PJHS Families,

Thank you!

This past school year has been tremendous for our students, staff members, families and our PJHS community. We cannot thank you enough for your support of your student, our staff members and our school. May brings mixed emotions to many people. An excitement for our current 8th grade students to enter high school and the next phase of their life. A calm for our current 7th grade students, knowing that there won't be quite as large of a transition next school year. And a sense of relaxation as everyone looks forward to warm weather and sunshine that the June, July and August months bring.

Our spring at PJHS certainly was eventful. In March, we featured Dr. Irene Butter, a Holocaust Survivor, as she presented her life story to our 8th grade students, who recently completed a unit on the Holocaust. I was inspired by our students' engagement and the thoughtful questions they asked of Dr. Butter. In addition, our 8th grade students spent a morning at Penta Career Center learning about the different programs and career exploration that Penta offers beginning their sophomore year. In April, our students had an opportunity to show their learning through the various Ohio state tests and we successfully navigated those assessments. 8th graders were treated to the annual FroshFest in which they experienced what life at Perrysburg High School could be like next year as freshmen. The students came back excited, thrilled and perhaps a little less nervous about that transition.

Our 7th graders became the first class to participate in the YouScience SnapShot Career Inventory. The program will allow us and the students to see aptitudes of strength and possible career fields for the students in the future. This is a building block for career exploration for students as they continue their secondary education, grades 7 through 12.

Our PJHS Band Program held a successful Band on the Run at Levis Commons in May and both our girls and boys track and field teams claimed NLL Championships. Our Spring Spirit Assembly recognized students in Chess Club, Freedom Shrine, Girls in STEM, History Bee, Math Counts, Military Families, Mock Trial, Peer Mentors, Ping Pong Club, Power of the Pen, Rotary Essay, Science Fair, Show Choir, Spirit Squad, Student Council, WEB, World Language Club, Yearbook, and Youth to Youth.

The school year concluded with us being honored to present Outstanding Students in all of the content areas at our morning recognition ceremonies and then recognizing all 8th grade students

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

Thank you families for your continued support of our mission to assist the PJHS school community throughout the 2022-23 school year!



GIRLS IN STEM

Girls in STEM, along with students, teachers, staff and community members, continues to support the growth and development of PJHS's outdoor prairie/classroom. Currently, we are working on the design, measurements and facilitation of a student-led and developed mural. A big thank you for cross curricular involvement

with our amazing and very talented art teachers, maintenance crew, science, math, social studies teachers and staff members sharing tools and expertise with our student group members.

Some of our STEM classes will be offered an opportunity to highlight specific attributes of interest on customized signs and donated posts. We hope that all stakeholders will enjoy reading facts and stories related to prairie life. We appreciate the efforts of our STEM teacher and group of students!

Girls in STEM recently participated in The University of Toledo Girls in STEM Day. They spent the day working and learning from women leaders in STEM-related fields. PJHS Girls in STEM students had a chance to build a pipeline over obstacles and around requirements to achieve a specific goal. They developed water treatment stations to purify groundwater and runoff for drinking water applications in areas that may not have water purification systems. Our students built models to simulate an earthquake-resistant structure in areas prone to natural disasters. They met with pharmacists developing new medicines to fight ailments and created their own lip balm in cosmetic pharmacy. We ended the day with a panel of experts and a Q&A session where our students enjoyed receiving answers to so many possibilities about future opportunities.

Collaborative efforts reach beyond the classroom. Girls in STEM wishes to thank Perrysburg Schools Foundation, Perrysburg School Board, our administration, Sherwin Williams and countless others all volunteering time and energy providing our students with authentic learning experiences that will foster a deeper understanding in knowledge and application.

MOCK TRIAL

As this article is being written, the students are getting ready for their dress rehearsal at the Perrysburg Municipal Court and the Middle School Mock Trial Showcase in Columbus. These students have put in extra practice time recently, both in person and on Zoom, to polish their trial practice skills. They recently scrimmaged the Independence Middle School team over Zoom.

Alex Ban, Allison Harrold, Kara Luce and Lucas Sackman portrayed prosecution attorneys who

elicited testimony and introduced exhibits in an effort to show, beyond a reasonable doubt, that Warden Walker committed the offenses of child endangerment and felonious assault. On the other hand, Mackenzie Frye, Rollin Kossick, Zachary Meyer, and Jackson Rihaplayed defense attorneys who also called witnesses to the stand and introduced exhibits to demonstrate to the court that the State had failed to meet its heavy burden of proof.
