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#### CAMBRIDGE AICE SCHOOL

We are thrilled to announce our status as an approved Cambridge AICE School! Port Charlotte High, Centre UX 494, will offer students the opportunity to earn the AICE Diploma beginning in August 2019. Students who earn the diploma automatically receive full Bright Futures (FAS), a \$40,000 + scholarship. Students do not need to attain a minimum G.P.A. or SAT / ACT score to qualify for the diploma.


# Advantages of the Cambridge AICE Diploma, AICE Courses, and AICE Exams:

- attaining the AICE Diploma prior to the beginning of the grade 12 year allows for an increased chance of receiving college of first choice
- entering AICE 5.0 weighted coursework in grade nine, ten, and eleven, allows for higher grade point averages attained in high school, increasing our PCHS students' status when compared to other high school students in the State of Florida.
- passing scores on AICE exams are accepted as credit at most colleges and universities in the United States and abroad.
- taking AICE courses and exams in grades nine and ten increases proficiency in Advanced Placement courses and exams.
- many of the AICE courses PCHS is onboarding in the 19-20 academic year are taught by seasoned Advanced Placement teachers with proven examination pass rates
- select PCHS AICE courses will offer the opportunity to attain industry certifications
- students sitting in AICE courses and taking the subsequent exams will be better prepared for college and the workforce



#### BOSTON INTERNATIONAL MUN CONFERENCE

On February 5th – 11th, the PCHS Model UN Academic Team traveled to Boston to compete in Boston University's International MUN Conference. Sixteen PCHS delegates competed against 102 other schools and over 1500 students from across the entire country and around the world. During the closing awards ceremony (in an event where less than 10% of students receive awards for their performances) all 16 PCHS delegates were so honored. Some of the top U.S. teams and top teams from China and Mexico attended. In the end, Port Charlotte was announced as the #1 BEST SCHOOL DELEGATION of the entire conference for its excellent performance across all committees. Our students represented their school and our community with great honor, integrity, and professionalism. They worked incredibly hard in preparation and during the many hours of the 4-day conference.

- Winning First Place Best Delegate gavels were seniors Zoe Ortiz and Noah Reid, and sophomore Anthony Bellino.
- Winning 2nd Place Outstanding Delegate Awards were seniors Maddy Odenweller and Marc Johnson, and junior Carson McNamara.
- Winning 3rd place Honorable Mention awards were seniors Vance Herbener, Bana Jarrah, Logan Deveau; juniors Anna Belevitch and Michelle Bifaretti; and sophomores Jordan Gulledge and Jonah Katz.
- Winning the Best Position Paper Award in his committee was senior Simon Nease.
- And winning a Verbal Commendation was first year senior, **Megan Corn**.

#### FGCU MUN CONFERENCE

On April 14th, for the 16th time in the past 21 years, the PCHS Model UN Academic Team won the **Best School Delegation Award** at the Southwest Florida Model UN Conference, topping several of the country's top teams. That put the PCHS team's 2018-19 head-to-head record against high schools from across the country and the world at 145 wins against one loss, and that loss was avenged this week.

- Winning First Place BEST DELEGATE GAVELS in their respective committees were: seniors Simon Nease, Zoe Ortiz, Maddy Odenweller and Logan Deveau, and junior Anna Belevitch.
- Winning Second Place Outstanding Delegate Awards were Seniors Marc Johnson, Bana Jarrah, Megan Corn and Noah Reid, junior Carson McNamara, and sophomore Jordan Gulledge.
- Megan Corn was awarded a \$1,000 scholarship as the conference's Best First Year Senior Delegate.
- Marc Johnson was awarded a \$1,500 scholarship for career excellence.
- Seniors Maddy Odenweller, Logan Deveau and Simon Nease all receive \$2,500 scholarships for career excellence.

That is three top conference championships this year led by our dynamic senior leaders.

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
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#### THE TEEN BRAIN

Ever wonder why your teen does things? I know I often think, now why in the world did my teen make that decision? The truth of the matter is that the teen's brain is not fully developed. In fact, the part of the brain responsible for decision-making (the pre-frontal cortex), risk taking, and judgement, is not developed until around 25 years old. Therefore, not to make excuses for our teens, but it may not be entirely their fault that they made a poor choice.

Another thing to know about this time of amazing brain development is that it is affected by many different things. Eating healthy, getting enough sleep, managing stress, are all-important factors to protecting the brain and helping it to be as healthy as possible. More than those basic health factors though, the brain development can be negatively affected using Marijuana. Dr. Jodi Gilman explains that Marijuana use during adolescence can affect memory loss significantly more than Marijuana use as an adult and can be a big cause of depression in adolescents. Dr. Frances Jensen tells us that because the way the teen brain is developing, it is more vulnerable to damage than the adult brain and that the teen brain can get addicted faster and stronger than an adult can to substances.

Therefore, when we think about the teen brain still being under development, especially the parts that are responsible for decision-making and risk taking, and we think about the serious side effects of substance use on the teen brain, it is vital that we make efforts to help protect their brain. Dr. Chelsea Neuman gives some great tips to help our teens. She says that we should 1) talk to your teen – setting clear expectations about not using Marijuana with consistent consequences 2) Monitor activities and friends 3) Maintain openness to talk.
