A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

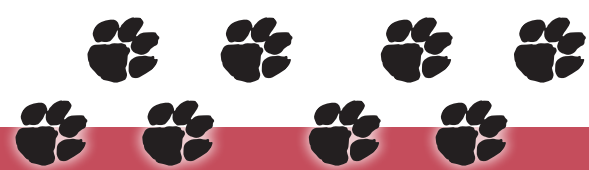
Dear Terrier families,

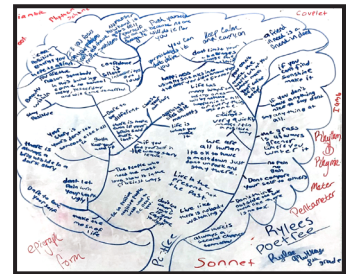


Mr. Marshall's Environmental Club is Cleaning up PCMS!

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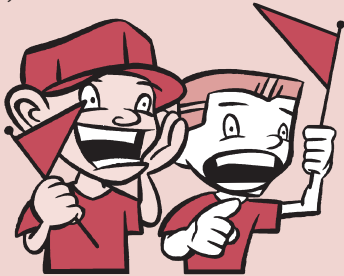
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SPIRIT WEEK

MATH NOTES

As Quarter 1 comes to an end, our eighth graders are busy graphing and analyzing equations written in slope-intercept form. This skill works with equations containing two-variables and builds upon the previous standard of solving equations. Many eighth grade skills require students to use knowledge gained from sixth and seventh grade, so it is imperative that they constantly review their warm-ups, notes, and homework in order to be successful.

Seventh graders completed their first math project for the school year, titled "Getting to Know You Graph". Students used survey questions from their classmates to create poster size circle graphs that displayed the results. The math standards that were used to complete this project include number sense (fractions, decimals and percents), collecting and organizing data, and measuring and drawing angles.

Seventh graders have also been busy studying integers, algebraic expressions, and equations. The curriculum is very intense, so reviewing and studying all year will be extremely important.

Our sixth graders started the year learning how to solve problems involving long division. They then learned how to use integers to represent real-world situations and how to order them on a number line. They are also studying exponents, order of operations, greatest common factor, and least common multiple. Students are currently working on operations with fractions and learning how to divide with and without models.

The math department is looking forward to a great year with your students and would like to remind all parents and guardians that we offer after-school tutoring on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons until 5:00 pm and Thursday mornings from 7:50 am - 8:50 am. To ensure a successful program, we ask that all students sign-up in advance (in the appropriate classroom) and come prepared with work to complete and/or questions about concepts they are struggling with.

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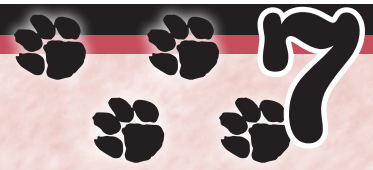


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PE NOTES

We have had a great start to the school year beginning in August with fitness activities. We focused on workouts with our students rotating to different stations targeting different body parts. We also began doing our Pacer assessments and circuit training, which will run throughout the course of the school year. The PACER assessment measures students' endurance while circuit training works out all muscle groups. We are trying to give our students a well-rounded knowledge of fitness so they can take what they learn and use it in their daily life.

In September, we began our indoor/cooperative games unit, which helps students work on sportsmanship, team-work, and cooperation. The games will be reviewed throughout the course of the school year. Students will be responsible for knowing the rules and procedures for these games for part of their Mid-term and final exams.

We will be heading outside to begin our training for the mile run in the beginning of November. We will do our "cross country" run and 40-yard dash in the end of October.

PCMS sports have begun! Basketball runs through October 19 with playoffs at PCHS, then volleyball starts with try outs at the end of the month (October 28). At the time this is being written both our boys and girls teams are undefeated!

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The holidays are here! The sights, the sounds, the smells, and family gathering! However, the holidays don't always bring joy to everyone. In fact, it can often bring feelings of dread, stress, and/or grief. How can the holidays affect people in that way? Well, often people have experienced some sort of trauma either during or near holidays, or the holidays may bring a specific trauma to mind during the holidays. There are many children who have been through trauma as well and have these feelings that they may not know how to express. So, if your child or a child you know has been through trauma, here are some ways that you can help them during the holiday season:

- Pay attention/Listen. Not all children are going to come out and explain to you how they are feeling and why. More often you will see the way they are feeling in changes in behavior. When you see clues from your child that something may be bothering them, open the communication instead of waiting for them to do so. Children don't often have the words yet to express what they are going through and how they are feeling, maybe offer some words through telling a story of someone else who has experienced trauma and allow the child some space to talk if they choose to. If your child does decide to open up, listen.
- Be the one. Most people who have faced trauma as a child and were able to come through that okay were people who can pin point someone in their life who was that one person who helped them through, who was there for them, who was a positive role-model, who encouraged them. You can be that one person for someone. If no one close to you has experienced trauma, there are other kiddos out there that could use you in a mentoring capacity. There are programs like big brother, big sister, that could open possibilities for you to be the one to someone who really needs it.
- Show you care/find resources. Sometimes trauma requires some resources. Counseling for example, may be something that a person experiencing or who has experienced trauma would benefit from. After listening to your kiddo, evaluate what type of resources may be necessary to make sure that your kiddo is safe, and that their needs are being addressed.

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
