STEM Coach Letter

The Greek Philosopher Diogenes said, "The foundation of every society is the education of its youth." Here at Sebastian Middle School, we have the responsibility, and privilege, to help mold that foundation. Through our STEM and Information and Communications Technology (ICT) classes we introduce students to a plethora of different career-oriented topics, in doing so, we begin to light a spark and interest that not only develops many skills but can lead to life-long career pathways.

To help ignite student interest we hone in on things important to them such as pop culture. When we are learning a 3D design program, we have students design a skate park, sneaker store, or their dream house. If we are teaching audio engineering, the students compose their own music that they can later make into a ringtone or alarm for their parent's phones. To teach coding, we have students code games like Minecraft in Mr. Huffman's class.

In addition, we integrate these skills and topics into the other core classes. In 7th grade ELA students read "The Boy who Harnessed the Wind." by William Kamkwamba and Bryan Mealer. Then in STEM class students worked on building a wind turbine. In social studies with Mrs. Sims and Mr. Stevens, students learned about the systems of government and then created their own websites using the skills they learned in STEM class. In 6th grade social studies students will learn about the Greek and Roman empires and then work on designing and 3D printing miniature columns, temples, and sculptures. These are just some of the many examples of interdisciplinary connections we make here at our amazing school.

We have evidence of success when students want to learn the skills, when they go home and work on their projects without being given homework, when they call us over to show us their latest creations with enthusiasm, and when they tell us they want to pursue a career on the topic we introduced. Recently, St Augustine High School declared that they had an uptick in their aerospace academy enrollment from Sebastian. While interviewing their freshman class, many attributed their interest in aerospace to their 8th grade STEM classes.

Sebastian, a Cognia STEM certified school, continues to move forward and upward creating those foundational building blocks that carve out career pathways for this generation, and the ones that follow. We are deeply grateful to the community members who serve on our STEM advisory board who continue to help us strengthen our study to career correlation and continue to make Sebastian an exciting place to learn!

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Next Level Coding

In addition to 7th and 8th grade students learning about building web sites and developing game sites that prepares them for State of Florida Industry Certifications, students are also learning how to program in a computer language called Python.

The above chapter one game project is from a seventh-grade student taking Computer Science Discoveries. Throughout the year, students' progress through four chapters from Ozaria.com learning how to program using the computer language called Python.




Chapter two has the students make a story using several different characters. The below picture is from another seventh-grade student.



Both students took ICT 1 in sixth grade. These students learned how to learn block coding and basic text coding using a program called Codemonkey.com in addition to taking Industry Certifications in Cyber Security Essentials, Word Processing Essentials, and Multi-media Essentials. Each of these three distinct curriculums each take approximately one quarter to complete. CodeMonkey offers students the ability to learn other computer programming skills.

CodeMonkey offers students in ICT 1 the opportunity to build basic games and solve problems. The picture below is from a sixth-grade student that is coding a winter skiing game from Codemonkey.com. Embrace winter! Create a skiing game with our monkey the skier. Avoid bumping into the flags scattered along the route and reach the finish line before losing all lives.



Our goal is to prepare students for high school classes in the Aerospace Academy at St. Augustine High School. Mr. Portelos, our STEAM Coach, was informed that students that were in our ICT 3 class for school year 2022 – 2023 was very prepared for advance computer programming classes in high school.

ICT 3 last year integrated into the curriculum Coding in Minecraft by Prodigy, learning the program language called JAVA Script. The Industry Certification for this program is the hardest certification offered at Sebastian. This program by Prodigy was offered at only one middle school in the county last year and supported financially by the St. Johns County District CTE office. Thirteen eighth grade students passed this industry certification last year.

For the school year 2023 to 2024, this program is being offered to our ICT 3 students, and a group of seventh grade student in CS Discoveries that are learning the Python computer programming language.

All these programs that are utilized in conjunction with the set curriculum are funded by Sebastian Middle School, and financial support of our business partners from St. Augustine.

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Biodiversity Club Partners with Local Industry to Help Environment

Biodiversity club teachers Ivannia Moreno-Alvarez, Jennifer Taylor and STEM Coach Frankie Portelos began building industry relationships with First Coast Technical College (FCTC) and Guana Tolomato Matanzas (GTM) National Estuarine Research Reserve. The three visited the greenhouse agriculture center at FCTC and acquired pots and plants, including datil peppers, mustard, dill, bell peppers and more. The plants have been set up with an automatic watering system in view of the school community, who can then watch the progress undisturbed. The team's goal is to use the school's greenhouse to prepare the milkweed and other flowering plants for a pollinator garden in the school's courtyard in the spring.

The team then visited the GTM reserve to learn how they can help support the erosion efforts. GTM donated a 115-gallon tank that the team, cleaned up and turned into an aquaponics system so they can grow mangrove seeds and spartina grass. Both plants are great for holding soil together and decreasing erosion. At a later point, the spartina and mangrove seedlings will be returned to GTM for planting.

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Media Center and STEAM

In December, Ms. Barnard borrowed Ozobots from Instructional Resources and Media Services to collaborate with several classes and incorporate STEAM lessons. With 6th grade math, Ms. Taylor and Ms. Propst integrated Ozobots into a review of integers, using the color codes to move the robots down number lines. In art classes, Ms. Hagy reviewed the elements of art and had the students use code to “gallery walk” the Ozobots. During Access Units rotation in the Media



Center, the students practiced coding and created a track for the Ozobots to race around. Finally, Ms. Torboli’s Unique Skills students coded the Ozobots to create words using root words and suffixes. They had to identify if the word that the Ozobot generated was an actual word or a made-up word.

3rd Annual Sebastian Chili Cook-Off

December 6th marked the 3rd Annual Sebastian Chili Cook-Off. Ten teachers and staff entered chilis of all varieties. Teachers and staff voted at the end of the day. Ms. Houck won 3rd place with her green chicken chili. Mr. Stevens placed 2nd with his Cincinnati style chili. Ms. Hagy won 1st place with her traditional chili. A big thank you to Uptown Scratch Kitchen for providing a \$50 gift certificate to our 1st place winner. The Media Center hosted the cook-off and Ms. Barnard 3D printed the trophies.

Who Tries to Plant Without Soil?

The self-contained ESE unit that's who! With the help from The Garden Ladies (Gloria and Lynda) from the Agricultural Center Master Gardener Program, the Unit brought the garden inside this year. We are trying a technique called hydroponics which is growing plants in a liquid nutrient solution. The meaning of Hydroponics is "hydro", meaning water, and "ponics", meaning labor. The water is doing the work here and enabling the fast growth of plants. We grew lettuce and had enough to make a giant salad for Thanksgiving.
