## Free Meals Provided During School Closures



The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and USDA have approved meal service during this time of unanticipated school closures. This program focuses on areas of eligibility based on economic need. Please note the following:

- Meals will be provided through a walk-up and drive-thru service in the parent drop off loop at the participating locations. At Sebastian, this will be in the bus loop in the back of the school.
- The meals will be provided to children 18 years or younger. Children must be present to receive meals.
- Children may receive meals at the nearest participating site, even if it is not where they attend school. This eliminates the need for families to drive to multiple schools.
- Each day, lunch for that day and breakfast for the next day will be provided at the same time.
- All school sites will operate from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., March 23 – April 14.

## SMS Greenhouse Opens for Learning!

With electricity and water now in place, our students have begun planting in the greenhouse! The first plants to arrive last month are dwarf Cavendish banana plants, which will be tended in the greenhouse until they are large enough to transplant outside to create a composting area called a "Banana Circle." In addition, students are growing tomatoes, spring onions, cilantro, and jalapenos, all from seed, experimenting with different types of soil, moisture levels, and light levels to find the perfect growing environment. When the plants come to fruition later this spring, students will toss up a tasty pico de gallo with their produce. SMS will hold a "Greenhouse Grand Opening" on Wednesday, April 29 at 8:30am; all parents and the public are invited to attend.

## Inquiry Hour = Project-Based Learning

Based on ideas generated in a joint meeting of faculty, parents, and business partners last fall, students have been working diligently this spring on a variety of projects during their weekly "Inquiry Hour." Project ideas were developed on the novels that students are reading this semester; examples include:

6th Grade – *Hatchet* by Gary Paulsen

- Designing and building a flashlight (Engineering)
- Composing music as a representation of a weather incident (Humanities)
- Stock Market 101 (Math)

7th Grade – *Peak* by Roland Smith

- Developing an escape room based on the novel's setting (Math)
- Art for Emotional Well-being (Humanities)
- Energy House – researching different ways to power a house and creating a 3-D model (Engineering)
- Plotting and understanding your personal carbon footprint (Math)

8th Grade – *Night* by Elie Wiesel

- Converting an old school bus to a tiny home (Engineering)
- Creating a "Student Survival Handbook" for middle school (Humanities)
- Gardening for anxiety reduction (Math)
- Planning (weaving with plastic bags) to create hats/blankets for shelter and warmth (Humanities)

Project-based learning is a hallmark of the educational experience offered at Sebastian Middle School. An important component of that learning is the opportunity for students to develop public speaking and presentation skills. We hope you will bring the whole family to hear students present their projects during Inquiry Hour Exhibition Night (date TBD).
