

School Nurse - IMPORTANT

Due to the recent "Parents' Bill of Rights", F. S. 1014.06 – Parental Consent for Health Care Services, parents must give written consent in order for their child to access health care while at school. This consent will allow the school nurse to provide care and treatment to your child for injuries and illnesses, and when necessary, emergency health services performed until Emergency Medical Services arrive on campus. Should you decline consent for these services, you will be notified any time your student has such a need, and you will be responsible for arrangement of care outside of the school setting. This consent will remain in effect until your child transfers to another school district, graduates, or you indicate in writing that you wish to rescind this consent for school health services.

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St Augustine High School Registration Information for Incoming 9th Graders

Freshman Orientation: Ninth grade orientation information for the 2021-2022 school year will be posted to the SAHS website by the end of the 2020-2022 school year. Please check the SAHS website http://www-sahs.stjohns.k12.fl.us/ for updates.

Community Service Hours: In order to be eligible for the top level of the <u>Bright Futures Scholarships</u>, students must log a minimum of 100 community service hours by the time they graduate from high school. All Bright Futures community service hours must be performed at non-profit organizations. Any hours performed after July 1st during the summer after 8th grade, can be added to your high school transcript. <u>Community Service Hours are not required to graduate from high school</u> but <u>ARE</u> required for Bright Futures eligibility and can be helpful when applying for other college scholarships.

Summer Assignments: All AICE and Honors level English classes will have a summer reading assignment. All summer assignments will be posted to the SAHS website http://www-sahs.stjohns.k12. fl.us/ by the end of the current school year. Students should be aware of their summer assignments and **complete them BEFORE the first day of school.**



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MEdia Center News

As part of Literacy Week, the Media Center hosted author, Taryn Souders, to meet and have lunch with Sebastian students. Ms. Souders is the author of Coop Knows the Scoop, one of this year's Sunshine State Young Readers Award novels. She also wrote How to (Almost) Ruin Your Summer (an SSYRA book in 2017), Dead Possums are Fair Game, and Whole-y Cow! Fractions are Fun. She spoke to the students about how she started as a writer and her process for writing, specifically a murder mystery, since the novel is based on a murder mystery. Students were able to ask the author questions regarding her work. During the lunch, she played a several rounds of Murder Bingo. Several lucky students won an autographed copy of her novel, Coop Knows the Scoop. Ms. Souders is currently working on another young adult mystery novel. Thank you PTO for funding the grant for Ms. Souders visit.

On March 4th, Sebastian battled all of the middle schools in St. Johns County during a virtual Battle of the Books competition. Battle of the Books is an annual competition that tests student knowledge of the 15 Sunshine State Young Readers Award. Students competed for 1 and a half hours but, sadly, Sebastian did not bring home the win. Swiss Point won after the final challenge with Liberty Pines Academy. The Sebastian team comprised of Taylor Pelchat (team captain), Sophia Barnard, Riley Pangle, Riley Glidewell, Lindsey Morris, and alternates: Kevin Moe and Lucas Cruz.





Science Corner

Students have been heading outside to learn about parts of Florida's native flora and fauna, as well as invasive species. Students ask questions and make observations about species found around our school campus, and then attempt to identify them using field guides or technological resources.

There has been a high emphasis on edible plants to ensure student engagement and interest. So far, we have found





and consumed pennywort (Hydrocotyle sp.), romerillo (Bidens alba) flowers, and are waiting for southern dewberries (Rubus trivialis) to fruit.

Students have also been collecting plant specimens to be placed in an herbarium for the school. Students have been instructed on the proper technique used for pressing plants to preserve them, and the steps required to ensure a well-constructed herbarium.

When outside exploration is unavailable due to weather concerns, we have been observing water samples and dissected flowers under the school's microscopes. During these observations, students have found nematodes, tardigrades, and other microscopic organisms.



Mara Varju won the "United States Environmental Protection Agency Award" for outstanding research in the field of Environmental Engineering with her project "What color is best for powering Solar Panels?"



Language Arts

In our eighth grade English classes students have been enjoying the graphic novel version of Tolkein's classic *The Hobbit*. Students have been having a good time particularly with Gollum's riddles, as we've solved each day by day in class. They even had the chance recently to make their own riddles, which their classmates will try to guess the answers of! Seeing students flex their writing skills and try to stump their fellow eighth graders has been a treat.









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Steam Update







6th Grade - CAD Unit - Tiny House Projects

Students learned to create both 2D and 3D CAD designs using FloorPlanner. com. Teams worked through criteria and constraints to provide a design solution for their "clients". Students then scaled the designs to create cardboard models.

7th Grade - Hydraulic and Pneumatic Claws

After learning a bit about the concepts of hydraulics and pneumatics, students put their knowledge in action to make cranes and claws. The goal was to be able to pick up an empty cup or soda can. This project required students to research existing design to formulate a plan of their own.

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
