NATEF accredits automobile, medium/heavy truck, and collision repair and refinishing technology programs at secondary and post-secondary institutions. These programs meet industry-developed standards that result in students ready to enter the workforce or to continue their education. Since 1983, the NATEF process has resulted in accredited automotive training programs in all fifty states.

Construction Academy Launches ACE Mentoring Program

Imagine designing a state-of-the-art stadium, planning the construction of a suspension bridge, or transforming the vision for an urban center into a reality while you are still in high school. Thanks to the ACE Mentor Program of America (ACE), thousands of high school students around the country are designing real-life projects under the direction of some of the nation's top engineering and design professionals.

ACE is an after-school program that gives you a hands-on introduction to architecture, construction management, engineering and other construction-related careers you may consider if you're interested in designing and/or building just about everything around you, from schools, stadiums and concert halls to bridges, tunnels, shopping malls, and parks.

This is the fifth year out of the last six that SRHS has advanced to finals; the past two years we placed first in regional competition in the Class 2A Small Coed Division and scored high enough to advance directly into finals. Last year, our first year of having a coed team, not only did we place first at regionals but also placed third in the State. This year, our second year as a coed team, we can now boast a state runner-up title.

Health Care District School Nurse Message

Protect you and your family against the 'stomach bug' and other contagious illnesses. There are highly contagious viruses that can lead to diarrhea, vomiting, and stomach pain. Help prevent the spread of viruses:

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Seniors: Graduation Information (Jan. 2017 Update)

SHARE THIS INFORMATION WITH YOUR PARENTS/GUARDIANS

Obligations: As long as you owe money to SRHS you will not receive your graduation tickets OR your cap and gown. See Mrs. Smith in Student Services to take care of any obligations. Be sure to keep your receipt. (Note: You cannot purchase a prom ticket or attend end of the year activities if you have an obligation.)

Wednesday, May 10: Last day for seniors.

Thursday, May 11 & Friday, May 12 Senior Exams: If you are absent more than a total of ten days (1st hour) or five days (block classes), you **MUST** take your exam AND pass it regardless of what grades you have for the 3rd & 4th nine weeks. You must pass 3rd & 4th nine weeks.

Monday, May 15, Senior Field Day: Compete for fun prizes against fellow seniors from 10am-noon. More details to follow.

Tuesday, May 16, Senior Luncheon: Location, time and cost to be announced.

Wednesday, May 17, Senior Check Out Day 8:00am – 11:00am (Bring School ID or Driver License/ID)

Mandatory! Seniors will be given an appointment time according to last name. Seniors will be given a number upon arrival, at their appointed time, and be called by number to proceed to the booths. Seniors must be signed off at the first booth in order to move to the next booth. There will be booths for students to check their graduation status, pay obligation, pick-up cap and gown, graduation tickets, and turn in a graduation ceremony agreement. All obligations must be paid and cleared in order for the student to receive graduation clearance and pick up any graduation items. After completing the check-out students **MUST** leave campus. **SENIORS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO LEAVE THE GYM.** Senior check-out day is the only day to receive graduation clearance, pick-up caps, gowns and graduation tickets.

*Note: Check-out forms will be available during seniors' last week so that signatures can be obtained early which will speed your check-out process.

Thursday, May 18, Senior Awards Night, 7:00pm (Auditorium): Recognition, awards and scholarships are presented. Students receiving awards will be invited and must dress formally. (Cap & gown are not required.) Ladies should wear a dress or formal skirt and blouse outfit or pants suit with dress shoes. Gentlemen should wear dress pants, dress shirt, and dress shoes. All seniors should support their classmates by attending.

Friday, May 19, MANDATORY Graduation Rehearsal: Seniors are to report to SRHS auditorium by 1:15pm. Doors will open at 1:05 p.m. Wear regular, in dress code, school clothes. You **MUST** meet all graduation requirements to walk at the ceremony. Be on time. If a senior does not attend the graduation rehearsal, he/she will not participate in the graduation ceremony.

Friday, May 19 – after rehearsal: Extra Graduation Tickets: All tickets that are not picked up at Senior Check Out will be distributed one at a time in the auditorium lobby ticket booth.

Monday, May 22: Graduation: 12 pm (South Florida Fairgrounds): Graduates are to be at their designated area of the Fairgrounds no later than 10:30 am. All guests must have a ticket. The ceremony will begin at 12 p. Expo Center doors will close at 11:30 am and reopen at 12:15 pm.

Ticket Information: The Fairgrounds establishes the number of tickets to be printed. The number of people graduating from your class determines the number of tickets allowed per graduate. SIX tickets only will be distributed to each graduate at the Senior Check-Out. Tickets not picked up will be considered extra and distributed (one per student) to others requiring additional tickets on Wednesday, May 18, after rehearsal in the auditorium lobby ticket booth.

Herff Jones: Graduation Cap & Gown – To participate in the ceremony you **MUST** have a cap with a 2017 tassel and gown. The cost is approximately \$50. These are the only items you **MUST** have.

Announcements: Announcements are NOT invitations to the graduation ceremony. These are special printed announcements that you send to your relatives and friends announcing your graduation. Printed name cards are placed **INSIDE** your announcements so that the person receiving your announcement knows who sent it. The minimum order is 100.

Specialty/Optional Graduation Items: Thank you notes, jewelry, class keys, appreciation gifts, etc. can be purchased from Herff Jones. Class of 2017 Items – Senior shirt-in-a-mug, shorts, sweatshirt, key chain, bumper sticker, memory book and extra tassels are available every time Herff Jones is on campus. You get the item when you pay.

GRADUATION BEHAVIOR GUIDELINES: Seniors are to behave with dignity and consideration for their fellow graduates at all times before, after and throughout the graduation ceremony. Failure to follow

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behavior guidelines will result in the following:

1. The offending senior will NOT be allowed to attend Project Grad.
2. The offending senior will be banned from attending extra curricular SRHS activities 1st semester of the 2017-2018 school year.
3. The offending senior will not receive their diploma until attending a meeting scheduled with administration during the summer.

GRADUATION DRESS GUIDELINES

- A. The proper cap & gown dress code must be followed at graduation or YOU WILL NOT be able to participate in the ceremony.
- B. No shorts; No sneakers; No flip-flops; No jeans.
- C. Tassels are worn on the right side of the cap.
- D. NO GUM CHEWING!!!!
- E. CAPS SHOULD BE WORN SO THAT THEY ARE FLAT ON TOP.
- F. Avoid heavy clothing. With your gown over your clothes, it gets very hot!
- G. Conservative jewelry may be worn. No neck jewelry may be worn outside of the gown
- H. H. Good grooming is desirable and expected!
- I. **Ladies:**
 - A dress or dress slacks (black, dark brown or navy blue) must be worn. b. No shorts; No cargo pants; No khaki pants.
 - Dresses SHOULD NOT fall below the hem of the gown
 - Shoes should be a dark color: black, dark brown or navy blue.
 - NO CASUAL-TYPE SANDALS! Closed toe shoes are best, but dressy sandals are okay. Remember that you are walking a lot.
- J. **Gentlemen:**
 - No shorts; No cargo pants; No khaki pants.
 - Wear a light colored button down shirt (no polo/ golf type shirts).
 - Necktie is required, (no string ties please). No loud colors or designs. d. Black, dark brown or navy blue slacks. No jeans or khakis!
 - Black, dark brown or navy blue dress shoes with socks. NO SNEAKERS or casual
 - Dockside type shoes. Dress boots are okay if they are the correct color and clean!

Prom: Saturday, April 8 at the Harriet Himmel Theater, City Place - Information you need to know:

- Seniors on the obligation list will not be allowed to purchase a prom ticket.
- A "prom contract" WILL BE REQUIRED for each prom ticket purchased.
- Prom contract rules are strictly enforced.
- Prom guest must be 20 years or younger. Guests 21 or older will not be allowed to purchase a ticket or attend the prom – no exceptions.
- Non-Palm Beach County student guests will be required to get a background check run through the PB County Sheriff's Office.
- There are many restaurant options in the area. Plan to make dinner reservations at least 2-3 weeks ahead of time. Remember to allow at least 90 minutes for dinner and remember to factor in travel time if not eating at a local area restaurant.
- There will be appetizers and dessert items served at the prom.
- The crowning of the prom king and queen will be at 10:30pm.
- Prom ticket and school ID are required for entry. Non-SRHS students must show school ID or driver's license.
- Prom Tickets WILL NOT be sold at the door.

Project Graduation Celebration – Monday, May 22, 9:00 pm – 2:00am (gym): SRHS reserves the right to deny admittance to any SRHS graduate. The celebration is ONLY for seniors who graduated from SRHS earlier in the day. A photo ID is required for entry. Graduates are admitted from 9:00-10:00 pm and no one will be permitted to leave the celebration before the evening is over, unless picked up by a parent.

Community Service Hours: This is a mandatory graduation requirement. A minimum of 20 community service hours must be submitted and recorded through guidance.

Virtual Credit: This is a mandatory graduation requirement. At least one course credit must be earned online or through an online environment.

Grad Bash: Saturday, April 29 at Islands of Adventure/Universal Studios

- You may have been to Islands of Adventure/Universal Studios many times before but nothing compares to Grad Bash. There will be live entertainment by various music artists. Tickets will only be sold to SRHS seniors.
- The cost is approx. \$120 (TBD), this includes your ticket into Grad Bash and bus transportation to and from the event. See Mrs. Moylan or Mrs. Pelfrey for more information.
- Refer to the Grad Bash contract outlining the guidelines for attendance.
- If a senior is or has been suspended between August 17, 2016 and April 10, 2017, he/she will not be allowed to attend Grad Bash.
- Students not adhering to the dress guidelines will not be permitted to board the buses and will not be issued a refund.
- Arrive at SRHS at 4:00pm. Buses leave "The Ridge" at 5:30pm and are expected to return at
- 4:45am, April 30.
- For safety reasons and to prevent vehicular vandalism, students may not leave their cars parked overnight on school grounds.

- A. Smoking is prohibited in the South Florida Fair Expo Hall. B. The use of facility electrical outlets is prohibited.
- B. Food and beverages are NOT permitted in the main area. D. Flower deliveries to students will not be accepted.
- C. **Balloons and signs** are NOT permitted in the hall.
- D. Students participating in the graduation ceremony may NOT carry purses, cameras, or other items. Arrangements for security/storage of personal items should be made with parents. The convention center does not have secure storage areas.
