

Principal's Message

Dear Parents,

This is the last edition of the year for **Tribal Chant**, our quarterly newsletter. As we head toward the end of the 2017-18 school year, I want to thank our parents and students for another successful year. I will be retiring at the end of this school year after 54 years as an educator. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve as the principal of Sequoyah High School for 14 years and to work with an outstanding faculty/staff, fantastic students, wonderful parents, and a supportive community.

We are rapidly approaching the end of the 2017-18 school year. Right now, the focus of your student should be on a strong finish **and you can help**. Your attention and involvement in this effort will reinforce the importance you place on your child's education. **Please take the following steps to support your student during this critical time.**

- **Reinforce positive and successful school habits.** Attention in class, homework, test preparation, and attendance are key factors.
- **Regularly access and review your student's grades in Canvas.**
- **Help your student create a plan** to improve current weaknesses and prepare for final exams.
- **Be aware of tutoring and study assistance** classes available at the school and encourage your student to participate.
- **Help your student to stay focused.** 'Coasting' is a natural, but deadly tendency.

Your involvement is a tremendous positive factor for a strong finish. Your interest, willingness, and dedication to helping your child succeed provides an unmistakable message. Your child will thank you for it – someday.

We are working to finalize student schedules for the 2018-2019 school year. Students have had the opportunity to select their elective courses with their counselor and they were given a Course Verification Form to use to review their selections with their parents. If a student is interested in taking classes through Georgia Virtual School (GAVS) during the 2018-2019 school year, they should fill out an intent form with their counselor by May 1, 2018. Student schedules will be released in late July through student email accounts. If you have questions regarding the scheduling process, please contact our Curriculum Assistant Principal, Matthew May (matthew.may@cherokee.k12.ga.us)

Final exams are only administered on the specific days that they are scheduled. Final exams for seniors are May 14-18. Parents of seniors and seniors should review the information in the **Senior Info section of the SHS website**. Final exams for all other students will be May 21 – 25. Students must be present for their exams – the only excuse that we accept for absences on exam days is an excuse from a doctor. If your student has violated the CCBOE Attendance Policy, students must apply for an Attendance Waiver.

Seniors will complete Attendance Waiver requests on May 1st. Ninth, tenth, and eleventh grade students will complete Attendance Waiver requests on May 18th.

A few issues that I want to mention that students and parents need to know: Summer School packets will be available in Student Services beginning May 1st to register for summer school. We will offer APEX classes on the SHS campus. Courses are also offered through the Polaris Program at Etowah East this summer. The dates for summer school are June 11th through June 29th. Upcoming juniors or seniors who are considering Dual Enrollment must see their counselor immediately. The deadline for fall participation has passed (an e-blast was sent to parents with the deadline in March and it was also posted on the SHS website). The deadline for applying for Spring 2018 and Summer 2018 was e-blasted to all parents and it is also posted on the SHS website. Any online course that a student is considering taking this summer must have prior approval. Students must see their counselor for this approval. Any online credit to be considered for promotion to the next grade must be received in Student Services by July 27, 2018.

I hope that everyone had a safe and restful Spring Break and has returned ready for a successful finish for this school year.

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Sequoyah Automotive Technology Successful at Skills USA Competition

The Sequoyah Skills team competed March 23rd and March 24th. For the first time in school history, we have a State Champion in the Automotive Service Technology Contest. Spencer Mann competed in the Automotive Service Technology Contest, run by BMW, Subaru, Honda, and Mercedes Benz. There were ten stations. Each station had a scenario at that the student had to perform the following: interpret the directions, show proper procedure, and demonstrate knowledge in each area. These stations were unknown until the time of the contest. There was some TOUGH competition, including the defending state champion from last year. Manufacturers judged each station and Spencer's overall score gave him the title of State champion. Spencer will now represent the state of Georgia June 25-29 in Louisville, Kentucky.

Jacob Allred finished third in Power Service Technology. This is small engine technology, small landscaping engines. Honda and Briggs and Stratton sponsored this and contestants had 10 stations. Jacob had the third best score and still has two more years.

She was recognized by the Cherokee County School Board and Superintendent of Schools at the Board's Feb. 15 meeting.

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
Sequoyah Singers Women

Sequoyah Singers Women, the most advanced choral ensemble at Sequoyah High School, performed at the 2018 American Choral Directors Association Southern Division in Louisville, Kentucky. They were selected to perform through a rigorous audition process from choral groups from eleven states, representing the best of hundreds of choral programs. Students in Sequoyah HS's choral /choir groups are regularly selected for GA All-State Chorus, Reading Chorus, and the Governor's Honors Program in Voice. Many students come into the choral program with no previous choral or vocal training. The Sequoyah Singers Women have received superior ratings at evaluations, festivals, and competitions in Georgia and around the United States.

Josh Markham is the Choral Director at Sequoyah HS in Canton, GA. He holds degrees in Music Education from Shorter College and the University of Georgia. Influential teachers include Martha Shaw, John Ratledge, Bill Caldwell, and Greg Hucks. The Sequoyah Singers Women and Sequoyah Men's Chorus have both been featured at GMEA conventions. In the past four years the Sequoyah Boys Quartet has won back-to-back state championships and two state runner-up finishes at the GHSA State Literary Meet. Mr. Markham has presented interest sessions at both GMEA and ACDA Southern Division. He serves as an AP Reader in Music Theory for The College Board and as a Rater for the Praxis Music Exam for ETS.

Victoria Hunter Wins First Place in The Cherokee County Optimist Club Deaf and Hard of Hearing Oratorical Contest

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

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2017-18 Sequoyah Swims & Dive Team

This year's season was quite a successful one with records broken and championships won. The Sequoyah girls team finished 9th at the 2018 GHSA State Swim & Dive Meet placing higher than any other Cherokee County team. Four seniors on the women's team – Ansley Davis, Kristina Friedrichs, Rachel Renner, and Jordan Weems – have been essential components of this success.

Kristina Friedrichs has been the Cherokee County Invitational Meet Champion in the 50 Free for the past four years and the Champion in the 100 Free for the past three years. She broke the County record during the 2018 season in the 50 Free and 100 Free. Improving on her County Championship times at the GHSA 6 – 7A State Swim & Dive Meet, Kristina won 2nd place in the 50 Free (23.65) in the 6A division and 3rd place overall breaking the Sequoyah High School record for that event (23.65). Kristina also broke the 100 Free record at the same meet with a time of 51.83. Next fall, Kristina will be swimming for the University of Colorado.

Rachel Renner defended her State Championship title at the 2018 GHSA State Swim & Dive Meet. As Rachel is Sequoyah's first diver, she set the record board bar very high with a score of 527.45 at the 2017 GHSA State Meet. Upon graduation, Rachel will start her collegiate diving career with the University of Tennessee.

Jordan Weems also contributed to the point total at the state meet by finishing 7th in the 100 Free (54.47) and 8th in the 100 Back (1:00.51). Jordan currently holds the Sequoyah High School record in the 100 Back with a time of 58.23. Sophomore Emma Gelatt also finished well at the state meet finishing 7th in the 200 Free (1:57.22) and 12th in the 50 Free (25.56).

The 400 Free Relay Team of Emma Gelatt, Ansley Davis, Jordan Weems, and Kristina Friedrichs placed 3rd at the state meet in the 6A division and the same group won the event at the 2018 Cherokee County Invitational Meet.

With these four strong senior girls graduating this year, sophomore Emma Gelatt is poised to take on a leadership role. She will be helped by freshman Grant Davis who will certainly bring excitement to the 2018-19 season. 
