



Principal's Message

Dear Parents,

I am pleased to announce that the Governor's Office of Student Achievement has awarded Sequoyah High School the **Greatest Gain Award** for having a three-year College and Career Ready Index **CCRPI Progress Score** that is ranked in at least the 93rd percentile. SHS was the only Cherokee County High school to have received this recognition this year and we have received it three consecutive years.

We have begun the 2018-19 scheduling process. We are planning to have our annual 10th grade Advisement Meetings for parents and their students in the media center on February 14 and 15 so that 10th grade parents and their students can jointly meet with their student's counselor and representatives from all departments to plan for 11th and 12th grade courses. Appointments for these meetings were mailed to parents on Friday, January 12th . Our counselors are meeting with all current 9th & 11th grade students to register them for their electives. We will send home with 9th, 10th , and 11th grade students, a copy of the courses they have selected for the 2018-19 school year after students meet with their counselors to select their electives. We will notify 9th, 10th, and 11th grade parents through an eblast when students are given there courses for the 2018-19 school year for you to review. If there are any problems, please indicate that on the form that is returned to the Homeroom teacher, because all course requests will be finalized and the master schedule will be developed. **Please be aware of all of the courses that your student selects during the scheduling process, as we will be unable to change courses that have been selected once the master schedule is developed and students are assigned into classes for next year.**

Each year during second semester all schools experience an increase in absences and late arrivals, and a gradual decline in academic performance. So prevalent is this trend that it has been referred to as the "Second Semester Slide". We are determined to improve this trend and **you the parents** can play a major role. **Here are three ways you can assure your student's continued success.**

- 1. Monitor your child's performance** by connecting with your online parent access account. Staying informed and engaged with your student's school life – and talking about it – has a tremendous positive effect.
- 2. Be Vigilant in making sure your student attends school every day and arrives on time. MAKE DAILY ATTENDANCE THE EXPECTATION.** Very few things have as much negative effect on academic performance as poor attendance. Be clear in your attitude towards attending school every day. In the working world, attendance is equated with dependability.
- 3. Re-establish your student's homework and study routine. Help him/her to reclaim the space and time meant for this important purpose.** Encouraging and supporting this vital activity will improve your student's attitude and performance at school and instill a work ethic that endures for a lifetime. **SET A SCHEDULE:** Establish a regular time slot for this important

daily activity. Seek your child's agreement and commitment to dedicate this time each day for homework and study.

These efforts; staying informed and talking about your student's progress, re-establishing a solid home-study routine, and making certain that your student attends every day and arrives on time will have an enormous positive result and eliminate "Second Semester Slide."

I would like to remind you of the school district's promotion policy. Students are promoted to the next grade when they have accumulated the following units:

- **End of 9th Grade** – 5 Units: must include one unit of English, Math, and Science
- **End of 10th Grade** – 11 Unites: must include two units of English and Math and one unit of Science
- **End of 11th Grade** – 17 units: must include three units of English and Math, two units of Science, and one Unit of Social Studies
- **All students must earn 23 units to graduate**

I know that this is early, but I also want to remind everyone that Final Exams for this semester for seniors will be during the week of May 14th and during the week of May 21st for all other students. Final Exams are not given early. They are administered on the day they are scheduled on the exam calendar that will be disseminated in May. **Students must be present for all exams.** The only excuse for an absence that will be accepted during this time is a documented medical emergency.

Keep your grades up!! Students and parents have access to grades and attendance through CANVAS to monitor student progress. Seniors, your graduation is at stake! If you are taking an online class other than GA Virtual School, be sure you have the online school send us the transcript by May 1. Also, remember that colleges can and do pull admissions offers to students if they don't like what they see on the final transcript.

Juniors: If you think you will apply to a 4-year college or university during senior year, take the SAT or ACT this spring. Get information on registering from the Student Services office. Any questions – see your counselor.

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Hot Rodders

Sequoyah High School's Hot Rodders team recently competed at Nationals... and now is ranked 25th in the U.S. and third in the State!

The eight-member team vied for honors and scholarships in the Hot Rodders of Tomorrow Dual National Championship held in Las Vegas. Only in its second year, the team moved up in the rankings from 39th in the U.S. to 25th, and earned \$10,000 in scholarships to various schools across the United States.

For the competition, students deconstructed a V-8 engine and reassembled it to manufacturer's specifications. Groups are timed on how quickly they disassemble and reassemble the engine in its entirety. The teams are scored on speed and accuracy.

The team members are: Jacob Allred, Adam Edwards, Kacey Hearn, Chaz Johnston, Jason Kissoon, Spenser Mann, Gaven Reamy and Thomas Warren; they are coached by Chuck Wilson, the school's auto tech instructor, and volunteer coach Ron Shultheis.

"This is only the second year for the Sequoyah Hot Rodders, and they have been working very hard to improve their time and decrease the amount of errors," said Principal Elliott Berman, who also presented the students with Principal Patches in recognition of their achievement. "It definitely shows, as Sequoyah is now listed among the teams to beat nationally. Congratulations to our Hot Rodders!"

Sequoyah Bands and Orchestra

The Sequoyah Bands and Orchestra Program broke several school records this year with the All State Band and Orchestra audition and selection process. Students participate in an initial audition. Based on the scores they earn, students are selected to participate in the District Honor Band or Orchestra event. Some of those students are selected to go to the second round of auditions. Based on these scores, students are selected for All State Band. The Sequoyah Orchestra program had twelve students selected for District Honor Orchestra. This event was held on November 16-18 at River Ridge High School. From those twelve, seven students were selected to audition for All State Orchestra, and one student was selected to participate in the All State Orchestra.

The Sequoyah Bands Program had 29 students selected to participate in District Honor Band. This event will be February 8-10 at Fannin County High School in Blue Ridge. Of those students, 16 were invited to the second round of auditions for All State Band, and four students were selected to participate in the All State Band. All of these numbers break the previous records for students selected for these prestigious events. The All State Band and Orchestra event is March 1-3 in Athens, Georgia.

The bands and orchestra will participate in the Large Group Performance Evaluations in March, and will end their year with a Spring Concert on May 4 at First Baptist Woodstock.

The Sequoyah Winter Guard program is in full swing, beginning their competition season on January 27, at Kennesaw Mountain High School. They will also compete at East Coweta High School, Kell High School, and end their season April 7 at the SAPA championship in Chattanooga, Tennessee.

The Sequoyah Marching Band of Chiefs will be going to New York City March 15-19. They will be participating in the St. Patrick's Day Parade, attending a Broadway show, and touring the city.




2018 Thespian Conference

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
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Recruiting Program for Dean Rusk Students - November 2017



Holly Springs and Canton Christmas Parades – December 2
