Please join with me in congratulating the **Class of 2023**. We also salute their families, friends, and all those who have contributed to their success. Through their commitment to academics, the arts, athletics and community service, this class has contributed greatly to our school's overall excellence. As evidence of this, *US News and World Report* recently ranked Spruce Creek High School as one of **the best high schools in Florida** and among the **top in the Nation**. **Graduation for the Class of 2023** will take place on **Saturday**, **June 3rd at 7:30pm** at the **Ocean Center**. Consider this partial list of accomplishments of the **Class of 2023** in the areas of **academics**, the **arts**, and **athletics**:

- 582 Seniors are part of this graduating class
- 94% of the students graduated on time
- 75% were enrolled in at least **one honors level course**
- 70% are college and career ready by passing a college-level course or earning industry certification
- 55% of the class had a GPA of 3.5 or higher
- 45% were enrolled in at least one AP or IB course
- Over 50% were recommended for some level of the Bright Futures Scholarship program
- Almost \$6.7 million worth of scholarships were awarded
- 80% of the class are college bound
- 37,000 hours of documented community service were provided to our community
- 2 National Merit Scholarships Awarded
- 3 National Merit Commended scholars and 6 National Recognition Program Winners
- 2 seniors received a nomination to the US Naval Academy and 1 to the US Military Academy at West Point
- 23 students earned an Associate of Arts degree from DSC in additional to their high school diploma
- 80% took the standardized SAT or ACT and their average scores exceeded district, state, and national averages
- 18 students were recognized at the **State Science Fair** and 7 won **first place** in their category
- 2 seniors earned the Applause Award and 3 were Volusia Select Winners
- 4 students were selected to the All-State Band and Orchestra and 1 to the All-State Chorus
- 4,150 Advanced Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) tests were completed
- U.S. News & World Report ranked SCHS in the Top 2% of all high schools in the Nation
- Approximately 90% of our student body is enrolled in an arts related course at some point in high school
- Sports teams: 8 Conference champions, 9 District champions and 4 Region Champions
- Boys Weightlifting were two-time State Champions in Traditional and Olympic
- Boys and Girls Tennis teams both advanced to State Final Four

End Of School and Summer Reminders

Final exams for students in grades 9 – 11 will begin on Tuesday, May 30 and conclude on Friday, June 2. For the first three days, two exams will be given each day with the final exam for the day concluding around noon. On Friday, June 2 only one exam will be administered and will conclude around 10:00 am. Students choosing to check-out after their last exam for the day will need to bring a separate note for each day containing the student's name, alpha ID, parent name, signature, and phone number. These notes are to be brought to the dean's office at the time of check-out. Students remaining on campus will follow the printed bell schedule for the day. School busses will pick-up and drop off at their regular times. Students are reminded to return all textbooks, laptops, and clean out their lockers before leaving for the summer. Any items left in student lockers after June 2 will be discarded.

For students that were not successful with one or more classes, please contact your school counselor for summer options to make-up those credits. These options may include **Volusia On-Line School**, the **Credit Recovery computer lab**, or **Florida Virtual School**. Other students may qualify for an **Algebra** or **Biology** review course during the **month of July**. Those students who *did not pass or take* the **Algebra 1**, **Geometry, Biology**, or **United States History EOC exams** will have an opportunity to take those tests over the summer. Dates for these exams will be the week of **July 17**. Please contact **Mr. Kevin Clark**, our Summer School administrator, at **extension 37807** for more information about summer opportunities.

Please continue to check our website, listen for phone messages, and check your mailbox for important information during the summer months. We are planning to mail home the final report card near the middle of June. Included in that envelope will be important information regarding orientation for the 2023-24 school year. The first day of school for all students will be on Monday, August 14, 2023.

During the summer, the main office will be open Monday – Thursday from 8 am – 4 pm and will close daily from noon – 1:00 pm for lunch.

The guidance office will also have limited hours during the summer. Please be sure to **call the school ahead of time during the summer** to make an appointment to see a school counselor.

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Guidance

Hello Hawk Families,

All Volunteer Hours must be turned in at the Guidance office on or before May 5th. Remember, hours cannot be carried over into next year, so please turn them in by the deadline. Any college bound student that has taken Algebra 2 or higher should register for the SAT and/or ACT for college acceptance and to meet testing requirements for a Bright Futures Scholarship. If you qualify for free/reduced lunch, see your School Counselor for SAT/ACT fee waivers. Also, make sure you are on track to complete two years of a foreign language (Ex.: French 1 and French 2) before the end of your Senior year. Juniors should continue working on volunteer hours, researching colleges, setting up summer college tours, or researching companies and working on their resumes for future employment during/after high school. Freshman and Sophomores, have you explored all the clubs, sports, and activities available at SCHS? Get involved! Finish the year strong with passing grades. Freshmen need at least 5 credits to roll up to 10th grade and Sophomores need at least 11 credits to be a Junior next year. Juniors will need 17 credits to be a Senior.

If you need to remediate any courses you did not pass this year or a prior year, talk to your School Counselor about summer opportunities to get caught up with your credits. The 1st summer school session at SCHS will be held June 12th through June 29th. The 2nd summer session runs from July 5th through July 27th. Summer school is Monday through Thursday from 9am until 12pm.

MAY IS BETTER HEARING & SPEECH MONTH

FACTS & TIPS: AS A TEACHER YOUR VOICE IS VITAL

To take care of your voice, follow these guidelines:

- AVOID YELLING
 - ▶ Use a non-verbal action to get class attention (clapping, blowing a whistle, turning the lights off and on , raising your hand)
- When speaking, concentrate on **good breath support**
 - ▶ If you run out of air, don't try to force yourself to speak. Take **frequent pauses & breaths**
- Keep your neck & jaw as **relaxed** as possible when you speak
- Avoid clearing your throat too often
- If you have to, do so gently to avoid vocal chord damage
- Keep your throat moist
 - Stay hydrated by drinking water throughout the day
- **Rest your voice**, especially when ill or tired
- Limit your intake of caffeinated beverages, reduce or quit smoking, and avoid smoke-filled environments
