Please join me in congratulating the Class of 2024. We also salute their families, friends, and all those who have contributed to their success. Through their commitment to academics, the arts, athletics and community service, this class has contributed greatly to our school's overall excellence. As evidence of this, US News and World Report recently ranked Spruce Creek High School as one of the best high schools in Florida and among the top in the Nation and the #1 High School in Volusia County. Graduation for the Class of 2024 will take place on Thursday, May 23rd at 7:00pm at the Ocean Center. Consider this partial list of accomplishments of the Class of 2024 in the areas of academics, the arts, and athletics:

- 595 Seniors are part of this graduating class
- 98% of the students graduated on time
- 70% are college and career ready by passing a college-level course or earning industry certification
- 75% were enrolled in at least one honors level course
- 52% of the class had a GPA of 3.5 or higher
- 45% were enrolled in at least one AP or IB course
- Over 50% were recommended for some level of the Bright Futures Scholarship program
- Almost \$6.2 million worth of scholarships were awarded
 - 122 Students are eligible for the IB Diploma
 - 80% of the class are college bound

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- 42,000 hours of documented community service were provided to our community
- 2 National Merit Scholarships Awarded
- 8 National Merit Commended scholars
- 16 earned an Associate of Arts degrees from DSC in addition to the HS diploma
- 80% took the standardized SAT or ACT and their average scores exceeded district, state, and national averages
- 23 students placed at the Regional Science Fair and 6 qualified for the State Science Fair
- 1 team qualified for the International Science Fair
- Envirothon Team finished 2nd in the State competition
- 2 seniors earned the Applause Award and 3 were Volusia Select Winners
- 6 students were selected to the All-State Band and Jazz Band and 1 to the All-State Chorus
- 4,150 Advanced Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) tests were completed
- U.S. News & World Report ranked SCHS in the Top 7% of all high schools in the Nation and Top 5% in Florida and #1 in Volusia County
- Approximately 90% of our student body is enrolled in an arts related course at some point in high school
- Sports teams: 10 Conference champions, 6 District champions and 1 Regional Champion
- 2 individual State Champions in Olympic weightlifting and an additional 7 lifters placed in the Top 10
- Competitive Cheer and Boys Weightlifting teams finished in the Top 10 at the State Championship
- 25 out of 26 sports teams qualified for the All-Academic Team Championship, 2 teams finished in the Top 10
- 15 seniors signed letters of intent to continue their sport at the college level

End of School and Summer Reminders

Final exams for students in grades 9 - 11 will begin on Tuesday, May 28 and conclude on Friday, May 31. For the first three days, two exams will be given each day with the final exam for the day concluding around noon. On Friday, May 31 only one exam will be administered and will conclude around 10:00 am. Students choosing to check-out after their last exam for the day will need to bring a separate note for each day containing the student's name, alpha ID, parent name, signature, and phone number. These notes are to be brought to the dean's office at the time of check-out. Students remaining on campus will follow the printed bell schedule for the day. School buses will pick-up and drop off at their regular times. Students are reminded to return all textbooks and laptops, and clean out their lockers before leaving for the summer. Any items left in student lockers after May 31 will be discarded.

For students who were not successful with one or more classes, please contact your school counselor for summer options to make up those credits. These options may include Volusia On-Line School, the Credit Recovery computer lab, or Florida Virtual School. Other students may qualify for an Algebra or Biology review course during the month of July. Those students who did not pass or take the English Language Arts (ELA), Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology, or United States History EOC exams will have an opportunity to take those tests over the summer. Dates for these exams will be the week of July 22. Please contact Mr. Kevin Clark, our Summer School administrator, at extension 37807 for more information about summer opportunities.

Please continue to check our website, listen to phone messages, and check your mailbox for important information during the summer months. We are planning to mail home the final report card near the middle of June. Included in that envelope will be important information regarding orientation for the 2024-25 school year. The first day of school for all students will be on Monday, August 12, 2024.

During the summer, the main office will be open Monday - Thursday from 8 am - 4 pm and will close daily from noon - 1:00 pm for lunch. The guidance office will also have limited hours during the summer. Please be sure to call the school ahead of time during the summer to make an appointment to see a school counselor.
