## MESSAGE FROM PRINCIPAL SPARGER

As we begin the second nine weeks of the school year, it is important to celebrate the successes of the first quarter. Some of the **accomplishments include:** one senior qualified as semi-finalists for the prestigious **National Merit Semi-Finalist (Harleen)** and **nine qualified as commended scholars (Jack, Jarrod, Adam, Matt, Katie, Paige, Felicia, Destiny and Alejandro)**; seven outstanding juniors were selected for the **FUTURES Tomorrow's Leaders Program (Sia, Meryl, Leah, Bilal, Tanner, Veronia, and Victoria)**; successful **National Honor Society (NHS)** and **International Baccalaureate (IB)** inductions were held; two of our fall **sports teams** were conference champions (**Boys Golf, and Ladies Cross Country**); and we had a very successful **Homecoming Week**. For the first nine-week grading period, nearly **250 of our students earned straight "A" grades** and approximately **1600 earned honor roll status**.

New this school year is the introduction of **Office Hours**. Every day (except Wednesday) all teachers are in their classrooms **during the first 30 minutes of lunch (11:54am - 12:24pm)**. *No appointment necessary!* Students can stop by their teachers' classroom to make-up assignments, ask a question about their homework, determine work missed during an absence, or seek clarification on an assignment. Students are encouraged to take advantage of office hours before a grade

The faculty has selected **Todd Palmer** as **Spruce Creek High School's Teacher of the Year** nominee. Mr. Palmer came to Spruce Creek High in 1990. During his tenure, he has taught the gamut of English classes as well as other English teachers the art of writing poetry. His own poetry has been published in a variety of publications. In 1991, Mr. Palmer took over our tennis programs and has now amassed **23 conference and 19 district championships** as well as **18 State final appearances**. He now has the privilege to coach with his twin daughters and one of his assistants is a former player. Mr. Palmer will compete for the title of **Volusia County Teacher of the Year** in January. We congratulate **Coach Palmer** on being selected to represent our amazing faculty.

We want to extend our appreciation to our parents and community members for the many volunteer hours you offer our students and school. The success of our school is due to a combination of **wonderful students, a dedicated faculty and staff, and the support of our parents and community**. ## CTE Highlights

CTE stands for Career & Technical Education. At Spruce Creek we have a variety of CTE programs, Culinary Arts, Information Technology, Robotics, Finance, Promotional Design, and Digital Video Technology to name a few. The federal legislation passed the Perkins V bill in 2018 to provide additional funding and opportunities for students enrolled in CTE programs. As we enhance these programs, we will share updates with our community. Five of our Culinary students attended the FRAELF Prostart workshop at UCF Rosen School of Hospitality in September winning 1st place in the Mystery Basket Competition. This opportunity earned the school and students, culinary equipment they will take with them when they graduate. Chef's Rudd's Nutrition and Wellness course has a new website at [www.chefruddsroom.weebly.com](http://www.chefruddsroom.weebly.com) providing benefits to students, parents, faculty and staff. Check out the recipes. The Academy of Finance placed 12 students in paid internships during the summer in the areas of government, insurance, accounting, not for profit and entertainment. Promotional Enterprises offered 5 student's internships over the summer designing t-shirts to sell during the school year to earn money for the program. We look forward to continuing the professional benefits provided to students enrolled in CTE programs.

At the pre-show to our homecoming game on October 18, 2019, Principal Dr. Todd Sparger presented flowers and a plaque to three Distinguished Hawks with Deborah Keith, committee chair, assisting. This school year is the fifth anniversary of The Distinguished Hawks Awards. The three winners included Distinguished Hawk Faculty member: Judson Rogers, Distinguished Hawk Alumni Andrew Chapman, and Distinguished Hawk Volunteer/ Supporter: The Johnson Family.

**Judson Rogers** taught chorus at Spruce Creek in the late 70's early 80's. He founded the professional choral group called Bel Canto Singers and led the group for 37 years. In 2014, Mr. Rogers passed due to kidney failure. Standing in for him to accept this award posthumously was Evelyn Rogers. She is his sister-in-law who lives in Oak Hill. She will ultimately give the plaque to Mr. Roger's only living sibling, a sister Eleta Reese, who lives in Wisconsin. We honor Mr. Judson Rogers for spreading joy through his love of music.

**Andrew Chapman** was named Distinguished Alumnus for the 2019-2020 school year. He graduated in 2006 from Creek and has been extremely successful in the world of dance, specifically, the Metropolitan Opera, and many award-winning dance films. He is a production manager at 92nd Street Y and a certified Dance Education Laboratory Instructor in dance filmmaking. As Managing Director for FSU at NYC, he schedules an immersive experience for seniors in FSU's dance program. 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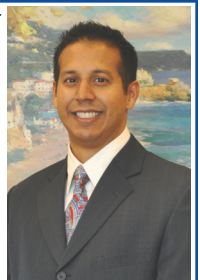
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## South Asian Club
