Yellow Jacket Family, we are having a great school year and preparing our students for all of their assessments. Student assessments provide both formal and informal information about how and what students are learning. Assessments have a great focus in the classroom than ever before and play a unique role in the learning process. Our teachers at St. Augustine High School are focusing on 4 best

practices that help prepare our students for assessments. These are as follows:

- 1. Review and Practice Many teachers find that holding review sessions. issuing practice tests, and teaching test-taking skills to be the most effective strategies of assessment preparation. Practice tests are frequently used because well-designed practice tests support learning, serve as a review, and builds students' test-taking skills. Additionally, our teachers have implemented periodic benchmark assessments as a predictor of student performance on state assessments. Teachers have used the results of the benchmark assessments diagnostically to guide their instruction.
- 2. **Differentiating Instruction** Small group instruction, peer tutoring, and web-based programs are some of the most popular strategies teachers use to prepare students with diverse learning needs for testing. Small group instruction enables teachers to focus on the particular needs of the group. Peer tutoring benefits both students because one student gets extra help while the tutor gets to develop skills that reinforce learning. Web-based programs allow teachers to focus on specific content for a group or individuals to help prepare them for assessments.
- 3. Engage and Motivate At SAHS, we believe that learning should be rigorous, but FUN. Teachers report that interactive content, such as games and competition, helps engage and motivate students. Additionally, enabling students to monitor their own progress keeps them involved in their learning and makes them feel successful as they watch their individual results improve.



Growing in the Garden

Saint Augustine High School celebrates the many talents of all of our students. Amy Arnow takes time to engage her students in hands-on science instruction by having them use their gardening talents. Two years ago, Amy received a grant through Blue Schools which gave her the funding to build two raised gardening beds. For the raised beds she and the students start with seasonal plants, starting the winter garden in October, planting a variety of lettuces. kale, collards, radishes, broccoli. "Everything is started from seed, that way when we harvest the kids can see the size of the seed compared to the plant we pick," Amy shared. "Cucumbers, snap peas, green beans went in last week and sunflowers go in next week, that way the kids can see them flower at the end of the school year and have vegetables, too." The students culminated the harvesting activity by inviting staff to come by and be served a salad grown fresh in their own garden to kick off the new year. They served



the staff with great pride and professionalism. The next project is to plant gerber daisies for the kids to take home for mother's day. What a beautiful gift for our students to be able to share. The gardens do so much more than simply teach students about cellular respiration, food groups, and nutrition. They teach the students how to work together, how to give to others, and how to care.





Academy of Aviation & Aerospace

The Academy of Aviation and Aerospace currently has 9 students enrolled in the Northrop Grumman HIP (High School Involvement Partnership) mentoring program. Juniors participate in 10-12 virtual sessions focused on products, technologies, and workforce skills. They join in on 2-3 activities per year on-site at Northrop Grumman, St. Augustine. Seniors

work with mentors (technicians, engineers, administrators, etc.) on-site to develop a hands-on project in the areas of STEM (Science, Technology, Mathematics, and Engineering). Students will present their projects at the end of the 2022-23 school year. Our academy continues to partner with Northrop Grumman with a common goal of providing workforce opportunities for our students.

Academy of Law & Homeland Security

This fall, our academy sent 12 seniors to tour the St Johns County Sheriff's Office new facility. Students toured the Communications Center and the Intelligence Department, they participated in the Use of Force Simulator and even were able to do a ride-a-long on the driving course with Certified Deputy Sheriffs. Students attended the North Florida Criminal Justice Alliance competition, held in Orlando Florida, the first 5 days of February. It was held at a resort on the grounds of the Universal Studios, where they relaxed and enjoyed 2 days of fun in the sun at the Universal Studios parks. We took 20 students on this trip, bringing back 13 medals from the 22 contests at this event.



Academy of Future Teachers

The Academy continues to have a strong chapter in the Florida Future Educators of America. This year we sent 16 students to the Statewide

competition in Orlando, Florida. Students competed in lesson planning, educational research, video design, public speaking, and display board creation. They also participated in a series of workshops relating to the field of Education.

This year we have 10 seniors who are completing dual enrollment college courses related to the teaching profession. Concurrently, they are completing internships with mentor teachers in middle schools and elementary schools around St Johns County. They plan to sign a Memorandum of Understanding with St. Johns County School District. This MOU provides them with incentives for employment with St Johns County School District after they complete their high education degrees.


