Tarpon Springs Middle School (TSMS) implements a Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) system for classroom and school wide behavior systems. CHAMPS strategies and routines are used as the foundation for our Tier 1 processes in the classroom. As a part of PBIS, Tarpon Springs Middle School implements a token economy system where students earn "PBIS Rewards" for contributing positively towards our school learning community. Rewards is an automated system to help manage the PBIS initiative at our school. With PBIS Rewards, teachers can reward students anywhere at any time. Students use the PBIS Rewards point system to purchase items at the Spartan store and for entrance into a school event. Additionally, students are awarded points based for modeling TSMS' guidelines for success: Be Respectful, Be Accountable, and Be Productive (RAP). For example, one point is given to students for modeling one behavior expectation, two points for modeling two behavior expectations, and three points for modeling three behavior expectations. Students may use points every Friday in the school PBIS Store in the front office and the PBIS store will be open each Friday from 9:10 am to 9:35 pm.

STUDENTS DROPPED OFF EARLY OR PICKED UP LATE — LIMITED DUTY OF SUPERVISION

Pursuant to Sec. 1003.31, F.S., students are subject to the control of the school during a reasonable time before and after the student is on the premises for attendance at school or for authorized participation in a school-sponsored activity, and only when on the premises. School Board Policy 6.20, Supervision of Students, says that supervision is provided 30 minutes before school begins and 30 minutes after school ends Casual or incidental contact be-tween school district personnel and students on school property does not result in a legal duty to supervise outside of the 30 minutes. However, parents must be advised in writing twice per year, or by posted signs, of the school's formal supervisory responsibility and that parents should not rely on additional supervision. Because the "Code of Student Con-duct" is published only once annually, we recommend that a notice be posted on school premises.

SCHOOL SAFETY TIPS

As the fall/winter holiday seasons get closer we would like for everyone to enjoy a safe and happy holiday season. There are many things we can all do to ensure our safety is a priority for us and others.

With Thanksgiving approaching fast many families will be traveling local and far. In Florida, there have already been over 300,000 traffic crashes reported in 2018. There have been over 2,000 traffic fatalities in Florida this year with almost 200,000 reported injuries that resulted from a traffic crash.

So what can you do to increase your safety while traveling?

Wear your seat belt! Not only can it save your life but it can also reduce or eliminate injuries overall.

Travel within the speed limit range and as conditions and traffic flow will allow. That means if the speed limit is 55 miles per hour, do 55 miles per hour or less but not too slow because that too can create a hazard for others. Speed is a serious factor for preventing and creating traffic crashes. Traveling too fast can compound a situation that prevents you from being able to avoid a crash. Traveling too slow creates a hazardous situation for others to include yourself.

Pay close attention to posted school zones and school bus stops. The fines for ignoring these are extreme but it's worse if someone is injured or killed because you failed to obey these laws.

Drinking and Driving will be strictly enforced with special and proactive campaigns by law enforcement throughout the holiday season and into the New Year. Simply, if you drink, do not drive. If caught, it can cost you thousands of dollars and may cost you your job. You could also kill yourself or someone else. If you plan on drinking always have a designated and sober driver or an alternate form of transportation available because it's just not worth it.

In Florida, if you travel on a roadway with two or more lanes that allow movement in the same direction, Florida law (F.S. 316.081 (3)) requires you to travel in the right-hand lane if the driver knows or reasonably should know that he or she is being overtaken in that lane. Staying in the prohibited lane creates problems for both you and others around you so be aware. With the clocks being set back, it will get darker earlier. So remember your vehicle lights need to be on 30 minutes prior to sunset.

Always lock your doors. If your vehicle is unoccupied, the doors should be locked and the windows should be up. This is the number one cause of burglaries.

Keep valuables out of sight. Put them in the trunk (if you have one) or under a seat. If someone can look in the window and see something valuable they could break a window and take it without entering the vehicle and this can happen in seconds.

Never ever leave a spare key to your vehicle inside the vehicle it goes to. This is another common occurrence.

Secure any and all firearms. Never leave a firearm unattended or where someone else can get to it. If you have to leave it in your vehicle for an extended period of time, ensure it is secured or rendered useless should someone else get a hold of it.

Situational Awareness. What this means is always be aware of your surroundings to be able to identify situations that can pose hazards and dangers to you and others with you. If you are walking and paying attention to your cell phone you're not paying attention to your surroundings. Have a plan of escape should something happen. Run what-to-do scenarios in your head as you move around or if you are inside of a business. Having a predetermined plan will give you time and options should something happen. Have your keys ready to open your vehicle door. Briefly look inside your vehicle before getting into it. Teach your children about situational awareness so they can be prepared as well when going to school or going home.

Situational Awareness is not something that is part-time but a lifestyle. It doesn't mean you need to always be afraid of what's going to happen but simply always try and be prepared if something does. If you practice this it will become natural to you and you won't even notice that you're doing it.

Holidays are a time to spend with family and friends to enjoy yourself and create memories. Use these tips to help make those good memories become a reality instead of a lesson learned.

HOW TO APPLY

Step 1: Get a Parent I.D. and Password

- If you do not already have a User ID and password for your family, go to a nearby school and ask for one. Bring a photo ID with you.
- Only one User ID and password is needed per family.
- Step 2: Apply Online Jan. 9-18
- Log on to the Student Reservation System (SRS) on the district's website, www.pcsb.org, using your User ID and password.
- Select District Application Programs.
- Enter up to five program selections from the list of programs.

REMEMBER: Non-PCS students must deliver all documentation of program eligibility, to the appropriate program office(s) by the close of the school day on Jan. 25, 2019.

Step 3: Accept Invitations Feb. 13-22

- Log on to the Student Reservation System (SRS) with your User ID and password during this period to accept a program invitation. If you do not accept during this period, your child's invitation(s) will no longer be valid.
- Review your child's status in all programs to which you applied.
- It is not necessary to accept waiting list positions.
- If you accept any ONE program's invitation during the acceptance period, the student's name will be removed from all other lists, (except the centers for Gifted Studies) including waiting lists. You have the option to change your mind and select a different program before the Feb. 22, 2019 deadline.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q. May I apply to more than one program?

A. Yes, you may apply to up to five programs in order of preference (first ranked choice is the top choice). Priority preferences will only apply to the first ranked program (the top choice). There are some programs that have eligibility criteria that applicants must meet. The District Application Programs procedures manual contains the entrance criteria for each program. You can find it at www.pcsb.org/choice.

• You may only apply to one of the two Center for Wellness and Medical Professions Programs at Boca Ciega High or Palm Harbor University High or The Centers for Innovation & Digital Learning at Gulf Beaches and Kings Highway (based on student's address).

• For application area programs, parents may only apply to the program located within the application area in which they live.

Q. *How long can my child stay on a waiting list ifno invitation is received?* **A.** Applicants stay on the waiting list for all of the programs to which they apply until they accept an invitation to one of the programs. Accepting an invitation to a program automatically removes a student's name from all other waiting lists (except for the Centers for Gifted Studies). For grades K-7, waiting lists expire on March 1. For grades 8-12, waiting lists expire on the 11th day of the second semester.

Q. If I apply to a magnet or fundamental, does my child lose the seat at the current school?

A. No, students do not lose their current seat by applying to one of these programs. The seat is surrendered for the following year only if the parent receives and accepts an invitation to a program.

Q. Is there any advantage to applying early in the application period?

A. No, applications are NOT processed on a first-come, first-served basis. All applications received during the application period, Jan. 9-18, 2019, are randomized giving applications equal treatment.

Q. What happens if my child is invited to a program but I do not log back into the Student Reservation System (SRS) during the acceptance period? **A.** To guarantee your child's seat at the school from which an invitation was offered, you must log in during the appropriate dates to accept the invitation (Feb. 13-22, 2019). If you do not log back into the SRS system to accept an invitation during this period, your child's invitation will no longer be valid.

Q. If I apply to one of these schools and accept an invitation, can I change my mind and try to get into a zoned school instead?

A. You may, but there is no guarantee that a seat would be available in the zoned school. Students entering kindergarten, sixth, or ninth grade are assigned to their zoned school in most cases. Students in other grades will be assigned based on seat availability.

Q. Will I receive any official written notification if my child is accepted into one of these programs?

A. NO, you must log into the Student Reservation System (SRS) during the acceptance period, Feb. 13-22, 2019, to find out which school/ program you have been accepted to, then you either accept the invitation or take no action to remain on all wait lists.

Q. What can I do if I have a question or problem with the application process?

A. If it is a technical question about the online system, parents may contact the Tech Help center at (727) 588-6060 or email help@pcsb.org. For all other questions, call Student Assignment, (727) 588-6210.
