Thank you for a great start to the school year. We have all persevered through the most challenging start to any school year in history. The spread of COVID-19 and the subsequent shift to remote (or distance) learning has created a new reality in K–12 education. At Venice High School, over 500 Venice High School students initially selected to participate in remote learning. This current reality has presented an opportunity for our staff to develop new tools and skills that will best serve students academically, socially, and emotionally.

School leaders and staff recently finalized the creation of school grade goals and a school improvement plan. Each is intended to provide a specific set of actions that will guide VHS in our efforts to maximize academic growth and achievement. These plans emphasize the need for all stakeholders to work together in support of our students. When implemented with fidelity, all VHS students will be challenged and learn at a high level so that they may graduate college and career ready. The plans are grounded in a belief system that is aligned to the Sarasota County School District's priorities, strategic actions, and major goals. Venice High School has enjoyed a highly successful fall athletics season. Our fall athletic teams have yielded the following results to date:

- Volleyball is heading into district play
- Football is currently 4-1 and will play North Port in the 1st round of playoffs 11/13 at Venice
- Swimming will be heading into the district meet at end of October
- Boys and Girls Golf qualified for regional play
- Boys and Girls Cross Country will be participating in the district meet

Looking ahead, midterm exams for all classes will begin on Wednesday, January 13, 2021, through Thursday, January 21, 2021. Makeup exams will be held on the professional day, January 22, 2021. Guidance Corner

Seniors are finishing their college applications and waiting for acceptance letters. Please make sure that you are visiting the Rotary Futures College Resource Center to receive expert help on your college applications and scholarship applications. Please speak with your counselor or one of the counselors in Rotary Futures to help with post-secondary planning. We have information on STC (formerly SCTI), vocational schools, colleges, universities and the military.

If your student has not passed the FSA ELA or one of the EOC tests, we encourage you to see your counselor to find out about websites that offer test preparation. The fall FSA ELA scores should be available prior to the winter break. Students may use an acceptable ACT or SAT concordant score to meet graduation requirements. Please see your counselor if you have not passed the FSA ELA, yet.

VHS continues to be a testing site for the ACT and SAT. Students can register online or obtain a registration form in the guidance department. Students that are planning to attend a 4-year university will need either an ACT or SAT score for admission. Please see your guidance counselor if you need assistance with registering for a test.

Please know that the SUS (State University System of Florida) does not count ALG 1A and ALG 1B as 2 separate math credits for university acceptance. The SUS will count this combination as 1 math credit.


The following teachers are teaching out-of-field in certain subjects for 2020-2021 school year:

It is important to note that the district requires "out-of-field" teachers to actively pursue certification requirements.



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Students that will be taking DE classes need to see their guidance counselor asap in order to make sure that they have all of the necessary paperwork and test scores in place for their spring courses. The final deadline for enrolling in spring classes at SCF is November 30, 2020. Remember that some History and Science classes at SCF only count as .5 high school credit.

The graduating class of 2021 will need to make sure that they have met the 26 credit requirement and have passed the FSA ELA, passed the Algebra 1 EOC and have taken the Geometry, Biology, and US History EOC. The 2021 graduates will also need to have an online course and at least a 2.0 gpa.

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Message from our Assistant Principal for Administration

Greetings VHS Families,

It is mandated that districts provide students in grades six and above a minimum of five hours of mental health education, annually. The mandate is in partnership with Florida's First Lady Casey DeSantis' initiative *Hope for Healing Florida*, which is a website that compiles mental health resources for students and parents. We are excited to collaborate with you to support children's and families' mental wellness.

We are excited to announce that this year, Sarasota County Schools are partnering with Evolution Labs, utilizing, their digital program called Suite 360 Mental Health & Prevention. The content consists of 8 lessons that are less than an hour each. These lessons will be grade-specific and completed on any internet-connected device Each lesson includes a printable home resource page so that you as the guardian are aware of the instruction around mental health that your child is receiving.

Studies reveal more about how screen time and social media impacts teenagers mentally. Additionally, such a quick shift in lifestyle due to the pandemic has increased the need for these supports.

The mandated mental health curriculum will include:

- Recognition of signs and symptoms of mental health disorders;
- Prevention of mental health disorders;
- Mental health awareness and assistance;
- How to reduce the stigma around mental health disorders;
- Awareness of resources, including local school and community resources;
- The process for accessing treatment;
- Strategies to develop healthy coping techniques;
- Strategies to support a peer, friend, or family member with a mental health disorder;
- Prevention of suicide; and
- Prevention of the abuse of and addiction to alcohol, nicotine, and drugs.

Important Class of 2021 Video Presentations

Financial Aid Presentation Video

This presentation is very important for all Seniors and their families. It reviews the entire financial aid process, FAFSA completion tips, why the FAFSA is important, and how the results are used. The presentation also reviews the Scholarship process and how to get prepared for "Scholarship Season."

FAFSA Federal Aid Application Assistance

The FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) opened on October 1st. It is very important for Seniors seeking financial aid for their post-secondary education to complete the FAFSA as soon as possible after October 1st. Please watch the Financial Aid Presentation video to understand the financial aid process and tips for completing the FAFSA. Go to RotaryFutures.org > Events > Financial Aid Presentation. Rotary Futures can help Seniors start the FAFSA, and then student can go home to complete the application with their parent(s.) To get started, students must have a Social Security Number (SSN) to complete the FAFSA (but parents are not required to have an SSN.) For help any day, seniors need to make an appointment at RotaryFutures.YouCanBook.Me

FAFSA Help Workshops

Rotary Futures will hold FAFSA Help Workshops to help VHS Senior families. These limited 1-Hour appointments will be held on Thursday, November 5th, and on Tuesday, November 10th. Appointments times are 4:00, 5:00 OR 6:00 pm and are limited to only 3 families per hour. Only 2 people from each family may attend—1 student, 1 parent. 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Important Changes to Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Requirements for the Class of 2021 and Beyond

The Florida Bright Futures Scholarship portal on the Florida Shines website has been eliminated, but Rotary Futures is able to assist students with their Bright Futures status. Students may make an appointment to review their Bright Futures status. Go to RotaryFutures.YouCanBook.Me We are happy to email the status report, too. NOTE--Bright Futures is only updated twice per year, after each semester.

Seniors MUST complete the Florida Financial Aid Application (not to be confused with the FAFSA) to receive Bright Futures. Only Seniors may complete the application, and we encourage Seniors to do so ASAP. The application must be completed so the Senior is in the system to be evaluated. The first evaluation is done in February, and the FINAL evaluation for the scholarship is done in July 2021 after high school graduation. Students have until graduation to meet all requirements. Senior may take the SAT or ACT through June of their Senior year to qualify for Bright Futures.

To complete the Florida Financial Aid Application (Seniors Only), go to: www.floridastudentfinancialaidsg.org/,Under First-Time Applicants, click on Create Student Account. This is only step 1 of the process. After submitting the student account, you must click on a link to finish completing the Florida Financial Aid Application. After submitting the student account, the student will receive an email with their log in and initial password. After submitting the Florida Financial Aid Application, the student will receive an email in 2-3 days with instructions for logging in and tracking their evaluations.

Minimum Core Academic GPA:

- Florida Academic Scholar (FAS) = 3.5+
- Florida Medallion Scholar (FMS) = 3.0+
- Gold Seal Vocational (GSV) = 3.0+
 - ♦ AND 3.5 GPA in a CTE Pathway

Minimum Test Scores (note changes to test scores):

- Class of 2021 and beyond:
 - ♦ FAS: 1330 SAT CRW+Math only OR a 29 ACT composite score;
 - ♦ FMS: 1210 SAT CRW+Math only OR a 25 ACT composite score;
- GSV requires a minimum:
 - \diamond SAT = 24 Reading, 25 writing/language, and 24 math OR
 - ♦ ACT = 17 English, 19 Reading, and 19 Math OR
 - ♦ PERT = 106 Reading, 103 Writing, and 114 Math

Community Service Hours:

• FAS = 100 hours; FMS = 75 hours; GSV 30 hours

Flu Season/COVID & Good Handwashing

Flu season is upon us and can spread quickly. The flu is a respiratory illness caused by a virus which comes around every year usually during the fall and winter. Symptoms of the flu include fever, chills, sore throat, coughing, headache, body aches, and in some cases diarrhea and vomiting which could also be symptoms of COVID. COVID symptoms also include loss of smell/taste, fatigue, & shortness of breath. If your child has any of these symptoms, please keep him or her home from school and contact your health care provider. Your child should follow the health care provider instructions on returning to school. If a health care provider is not involved, student should be symptom free for 24 hours without the use of medication before returning to school. Students can help prevent the spread of the flu & COVID by washing their hands often and well for at least 20 seconds, covering coughs and sneezes, staying away from people who have the flu, not sharing food and drinks, getting the flu vaccine, & staying home when sick. Also remember good hand washing is the key to prevent the spread of infections and viruses including COVID. The best practice is to wash hands with warm soapy water frequently and before eating, after using restroom, and after coughing or sneezing into hands. Remember to also keep hands away from face (eyes, nose, mouth), and cough/sneeze into your elbow to prevent the spread of germs. It is not too late for everyone to get the flu vaccine to help prevent the spread of the flu. Also, if your child gets tested for COVID please notify the health room & have them stay at home until the results are back. Don't forget to wear your mask, social distance, & wash your hands regularly to help prevent the spread of COVID. If you have any questions regarding COVID, please call the school to talk with the RN or Health Room Aide.







2020-2021 VHS School Dress Code

This information is designed to address common questions and misconceptions about the dress code at Venice High School.

Administrators, teachers, and students worked together to establish a dress code that strikes a balance of what is considered reasonable and appropriate for a school setting.

We appreciate your support of the dress expectations that have been established and hope that this handout is helpful.

Student Dress Code

Please adhere to the following expectations during school hours and school-sponsored events:

- No short shorts (all shorts must be a MINIMUM of mid-thigh in length)
- ripped or shredded pants, above midthigh, may not reveal skin
- no saggy / baggy pants
- leggings and yoga pants are permitted if skin and undergarments are not visible
- no pajamas or slippers
- no clothing of an ethnic or racially offensive nature
- no tube / bando or see-through tops

PANTS, LEGGINGS, and EXPOSED UNDERGARMENTS

- Jeans with holes, shreds, and rips at mid-thigh or lower will be permitted.
- Shreds or rips above mid-thigh may NOT reveal skin.
- Pants must stay up without using a belt for assistance.
- Leggings and yoga pants are permitted if skin and undergarments are not revealing. **SHIRTS and TOPS**
- Strapless tops, backless tops, midriffs, and low-cut necklines are prohibited.
- Strapless and sleeveless tops may be worn with a cardigan or sweater that fully covers all areas appropriately.
- Shoulder straps must have a minimum width of a dollar bill.
- Undergarments must NOT display alcohol, drug, or sexual references.

HOODS

Hoods are NOT to be worn in the building.

SKIRTS, DRESSES, and SHORTS

Skirts, dresses, and shorts must be mid-thigh or lower, including athletic shorts.



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
