As this year comes to a close, we would like to acknowledge all of the success and accomplishments Wellington DECA has made as a chapter, even with the unexpected obstacles and hardships. This year has been a challenge for all students and teachers; however, our DECA members with their passion and motivation refused to let this stand in their way. 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Debate Good News

The nationally recognized Wellington High School Speech & Debate Team took home more than 150 trophies, plaques, ribbons, gavels, and accolades during its 2020-21 Virtual Season.

The successful year culminated with a record 16 students competing at the national speech and debate championships in May and June. Ten Red Dawn Debaters represented Wellington at the National Catholic Forensic League's "Grand National" Tournament (also known as CatNats) over Memorial Day Weekend, and six more competed at the National Speech & Debate Association National Tournament June 14-19 (the same days as the final week of classes this year). Those students were:

- CatNats: McKenna Wickers, Isabella Tombari, and Harrison Winton (Oral Interpretation of Literature); Samuel Johnson, Gonzalo Pardo Zambrano, and Colin Gibson (Extemporaneous Speaking). Lillian Paulitz and Emma Stanfield (Dramatic Performance); KJ Benham (Oratorical Declamation); and Daniel Melton (Original Oratory).
- NSDA: Jaiden Lagalo-Blinston (Dramatic Interpretation); Nicholas Raney (Foreign Extemporaneous); Emma Stanfield and Lillian Paulitz (Humorous Interpretation); Daniel Melton (Original Oratory); and Samuel Johnson (World Schools Debate, as part of a hybrid district team which included students from Park Vista and American Heritage Boca/ Delray). McKenna Wickers (Program Oral Interpretation) and Kieran Abesamis (Lincoln Douglas Debate) also qualified, but were unable to compete at the tournament. In addition, Coach Paul Gaba represented the Florida Oceanfront NSDA District as its Coach of the Year.

Senior Kieran Abesamis was recognized by Coach Paul Gaba with the annual "Spirit of Debate" Golden Gavel, which is presented to a student who represents the six pillars of the NSDA Code of Honor: Humility, Equity, Integrity, Respect, Leadership and Service. The honor is bestowed regardless of tournament successes during the student's career.

BRIGHT FUTURES SCHOLARSHIP UPDATE

At the completion of the seventh semester, many seniors were identified as eligible for one of the Bright Futures Scholarships. In order to qualify, students must apply for the scholarship at www. Floridastudentfinancialaid.org. The deadline to meet the testing requirement for Bright Futures has been extended to December 1, 2021 for the Class of 2021.

FINANCIAL AID FOR COLLEGE

Students and parents are encouraged to submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to the processing agency as soon as possible. The FAFSA is required for federal financial aid consideration. FAFSA applications are available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS

Students must have 20 hours of community service as a graduation requirement. Community service opportunities are posted in the 11th & 12th grade student support centers. All students must complete the 20 hour requirement in order to receive a parking pass in the 2021/2022 school year.

Students can also take advantage of the following: Palm Beach County Community Angel Network is a free interactive directory of nonprofit organizations in Palm Beach County that are seeking volunteer service from people in the community. **Visit PBCCAN.org and click on Volunteer Directory for volunteer opportunities OR Text 41411 and enter keyword: PBCCAN to have "up to date" events and volunteer opportunities sent right to your phone.

All of the Bright Futures Scholarships require documentation of community service. Florida Academic Scholar - 100 hours, Florida Medallion Scholar - 75 hours. Community service log forms are available in all student support centers. Completed forms must be submitted to the 11/12 Student Services Office for documentation on the student's transcript.

SCHOLARSHIP BULLETIN

DUAL ENROLLMENT & EARLY ADMISSION AT PALM BEACH STATE COLLEGE

Requirements: Have a minimum 3.0 unweighted GPA (3.2 GPA for early admit), have "college ready" test scores in English, math, reading, and writing on the ACT, SAT, or PERT. Students must attend a mandatory Palm Beach State Information/Advising Session prior to enrolling in courses. Students must submit an application to Palm Beach State College and then go online to complete orientation. You cannot become a Dual Enrollment or Early Admit student without proper paperwork from the school counselor.

- Once you have received your "Conditions of Admissions" letter by email, follow the instructions to log in to your Panther Web account and to activate your college email account.
- Complete the online orientation at https://www. palmbeachstate.edu/dualenroll/orientation. aspx.
- Meet with your school counselor to complete the Dual Enrollment Permission and Registration Form.
- Please see your school counselor by June 18, 2021 to submit the paperwork for Fall 2021 registration.

SUMMER PROGRAMS

Many colleges and universities throughout the United States offer high school students the opportunity to take summer courses on their campuses for enrichment purposes. Please note that credit earned in an accredited post-secondary school, not a part of the dual-enrollment program, will not be included in HPA calculations. Prior approval from the Principal is required for all summer college programs. Your child's school counselor can assist with summer opportunities.

SUMMER SCHOOL FOR CREDIT RECOVERY

WHS will have an online summer school program from June 28th – July 22nd. Students should plan to attend Monday – Thursday from 7:30 am to 12:30 pm. ALL 9th, 10th, and 11th grade students are eligible to attend IF THEY NEED TO RECOVER AN ACADEMIC CREDIT. This program is not for acceleration. No transportation is provided during the summer. A student must see his school counselor prior to registration to ensure the student has academic credits needed for graduation that need to be recovered.
